He recently created a new website, <workingsmarterformacusers.com>, that is full of tips and tricks to increase your productivity. He is a proponent on working on one thing at a time. If you have to write an article for the HAAUG Apple Barrel, sit down and write. Write hard for at least twenty five minutes. Don't mess with email don't visit the web unless you need to do research. Turn off feeds from news services that will take your attention away from your task. After the twenty five minutes take a break, then get back on it. This is something that I plan on doing.

His next tip is to learn to type, keyboard, or what ever you want to call it. If you are not typing forty words a minute, you are behind the eight ball. You can take the test at typingtest.com to measure your speed. The site offers games and exercises to improve your speed.

Finally, and this is a big finally, use keyboard short cuts such as Cmd+S for Save, Cmd+C for Copy, and Cmd+V for paste. Hit the Cmd+S key combination to save your work frequently and you will not have to worry about losing your file if the computer locks up. The fewer times you grab the mouse, the more productive you can become.

AirPods are a Great Product!

I've been using Apple's various earbuds with iPods and iPhones for years. They have ranged from okay to pretty good as far as sound quality and comfort. They are nothing special, but they worked. And, I didn't mind getting them sweaty when I would use them on a workout because they weren't so great that I used them all the time. I wasn't using them for anything besides that and the occasional phone call (I don't like holding a piece of glass against my face so I usually use either speaker mode or the earbuds for longer calls).

Apple's most recent model, EarPods, were a definite improvement in comfort and staying in my ears. Still, they weren't perfect as far as that. For instance, while running especially on windy days, they would often fall out of my ears. Apple's new AirPods solve that problem, and more. It appears that the biggest factor in EarPods falling out of ears is not the shape as much as the cord. While AirPods have the same shape as EarPods, they don't fall out under the same circumstances as the EarPods. In fact, I have not had AirPods fall out of my ears at all, even after running with them every day for over six weeks as of this writing. I love that!

I can only give a subjective review of sound quality. Despite being a musician, I tend to be not very discerning at times regarding this, especially in noisy environments. The AirPods sound good and at the very least are as good as EarPods. You still can hear the same outside noises as with EarPods as they are also not sound-isolating.

My favorite feature is the convenience. I carry AirPods with

me all the time, even around the house, and pop them in my ears when I want a better listen to something on any of my iOS devices. This is easy to do because once you set AirPods up with your iPhone, your iCloud account registers them with your other devices and it is as easy as selecting them from Control Center on the other device. I can quickly select them as the output from my iPad when I am using that.

The one negative is that there are no controls. With EarPods, I can change the volume as well as respond to a call or invoke

Siri using the controller on the right cable. AirPods only respond to a double tap to invoke Siri (this can be changed to play/pause or to do nothing at all). I find it's easier to change volume using the controls on my iPhone or Apple Watch. It seems silly to pause what I'm listening to in order to change the volume. I would like to see Apple add other tap combinations like maybe three taps for volume down and four for volume up, all customizable via the Settings app on the iPhone.

Overall, I highly recommend AirPods. If EarPods were generally comfortable for you and you didn't have much of a problem with them falling out, it is likely that AirPods will be even better for you. They are simple to set up and use, and being cordless is much easier and more convenient. You won't have to think nearly as much about carrying your iPhone within the right distance when you want to listen to music or make a call. Just leave it on your desk, in your bag, or in your pocket. Who likes being tied down?

Board of Directors Meeting Minutes for January 21, 2017

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 S. Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas

Attendees: Phil Booth, David Jaschke, Clair Jaschke, Jack Adair, Steve Bridgham, Ryan Eisworth, Mike Epstein, Mike King

Call to Order: By President Phil Booth at 12:03 PM following the conclusion of the January Swap Meet. Phil announced that Marcy Spears has agreed to be appointed to the post of Secretary. She was nominated and approved by the Board. We had a fairly successful swap meet today. Phil indicated his appreciation of Ryan's work in organizing the Swap Meet. Also, the general membership approved the 2017 Budget as proposed by the Board by voice vote.

Monthly Reports

Secretary - Jack Adair: The minutes of the December 2016 BOD meeting were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report - Clair Jaschke: Clair reported that our checking account balance as of the end of December 2016 was \$3,839.25. Our savings account balance was \$10,003.96, for total cash on hand of \$13,843.21. All bills were paid and all funds deposited for December. The Texas Sales & Use Tax form that is required was filed. It is now time to upgrade the Account Edge software for 2017. The board approved the expenditure of \$159.00 to purchase the upgrade.

Membership - David Jaschke: Dave reported that we ended the month of December with 135 members, which

was the same as November, and down from 136 members (a difference of 1 member) from December 31, 2016. We had 8 renewal transactions total for December. This included 3 regular, 2 by web via Square, 1 new by credit card, and 2 lapsed renewals. This was not bad for a month that usually has low activity.

Programming Report - Steve Bridgham:

Next month will feature Bob LeVitus. Doug Smith has already made both his plane and hotel reservations. Phil asked for Dave Hamilton's E-mail address. Steve has been talking with Dave about the April meeting, which will be on April 22 and will most likely be held in the Pool House. At this point, March is open, we have another Swap Meet in July, and the rest of the year is open. We will tentatively put down a Home Automation presentation for March, either via Skype or a trip to Houston. The candidate is Josh Centers of TidBITS, which is the oldest Apple newsletter in existence. Josh authored the "A Prairie HomeKit Companion." In addition, we need to send our E-mails to Dwight Silverman and Lee Hutchinson to invite them to come back again.

Jonathan Magnus might also have interest in co-presenting the Home Automation presentation. We will likely schedule a programming summit next week at 6:30 on January 25 at the Midtown Cafe Express, 1101 Uptown Park Blvd.

We will also have to deal with the whole SIG issue once we move to the Pool House. There is no partitioning available there at all. We may start using our new

projector in that room.

HAAUG Electronic Communications

Systems - Ryan Eisworth: Ryan reported that the Apple Barrel was published on schedule. Ryan indicated that is still interested in content supplied from the members. There are still issues about e-mails; Phil did not get the right notification about registrations for the Swap Meet. We did have good success with the new Swap Meet forms on the website.

Ryan reported that our Swap Meet press release definitely got published in Southwest News. Ryan said he would continue to submit press releases to Southwest News and The Houston Chronicle, such as one for the Bob LeVitus presentation in February.

There was a discussion about possible sponsorship of Web advertisements in the future.

New Business

Phone Service: Ryan finished pairing us with Google Voice. The problem is that they still need to have a cell phone number paired with the account. We did get a volunteer from the board to supply the linked phone number. Our new number will be (832)-HAAUG37 (832-422-8437).

Sullivan Steak House: Phil got some correspondence from this business about possibly hosting a HAAUG event in the future.
