I've been SIG Leader for AppleWorks or TimeOut, its plug-in products, for over five years now. The days when 30 or 40 people attended the AppleWorks SIG are long gone. The greatest attendance in the past year was about a dozen, for the new version of AppleWorks that runs on a Mac. Most of the time there are just a few of us at the SIG.

We're still using AppleWorks because it does what we need to do, sometimes more easily than any other piece of software on any computer. But we know how to do those things already. There are not a lot of hot new topics to discuss. It's time the AppleWorks SIG be laid to rest.

An Apple II community still exists though it is shrinking. I hope we at HAAUG continue to serve it. At the September meeting eleven people attended the AppleWorks SIG. Most of them were there for the first time. Several of them had specific Apple II problems they needed solved, though none were specifically AppleWorks related. I am glad to continue to make myself available to answer members' questions.

A few observations on AppleWorks and the Apple II: The Apple IIe computer was manufactured, essentially unchanged, for 10 years. I believe it is the only computer ever to have experienced a price increase during its lifetime. It continued to be manufactured for a year after its successor, the Apple IIgs, had been discontinued. AppleWorks 5 was published a year after the machine on which it runs had been discontinued. People at ClarisWorks, the closest thing to a successor that AppleWorks has, get very tired of hearing, "Why can't it? AppleWorks can."

Memory And It's Uses

On the Macintosh, most people run word processors or spreadsheets and seldom have *any* trouble with memory. With the Mac operating system, most memory is available to any program at any time and there is no concern about where certain bits of software need to be (unlike on a Windows machine where certain software has to be in Low Memory, cannot be in Extended Memory, etc). But there are ways of getting more out of the available memory.



If you look at the About box below, at the Microsoft Word line, you can see that Word has been given 2,048K to run in, but only half of that line is shown to be used, since half the line has a "progress bar" in it. When you open documents that progress bar will expand to fill a small additional part of the allocated space; so some RAM stores the program itself and some is reserved to load working files. Also note that SimpleText has 512K to run in, and only a small part of that is being used.



By putting the lines end-to-end, you could get an idea of how the memory is being used. It is sort of a memory map. (Computer people give me the benefit of the doubt here, I know that this is not an actual memory map, but for the purposes of explanation it is an approximation.)

When you run a program it will take the next available space in RAM. When you get close to filling up your RAM, you can't run any more programs.

As an example, word processing files normally take very little RAM. Word is shown taking a little over 2 Meg and that will load a **very** large document. But they will take a lot more room when they are printing. There are temporary files that they generate to send to the printer. Graphics and other pictures take a lot of RAM since they contain information about brightness, hue, etc. for each picture element or "pixel" in the picture; they also take a lot of memory to print. Movies take up very large amount of memory. They are color graphics that change constantly. So you can't just allocate the minimum amount of memory to a program that will allow you to open it. You need to give it some working space. This is done with the Get Info dialog box, you select Get Info (command-i) on the application itself.

You will also need more RAM if you want to run more than one program at a time. Why would you want to do that? So you can easily share information between them. You can have a database showing status of parts while you type an activity report or you can select a graphic object in a drawing program and then put it into a document via the Clipboard. The other option is to run one program, when you run into a question, quit one and open another, copy down some information, close the second and open the first again, etc.

When you quit a program, it releases the RAM that was being used and you can now load another program into that memory. However, memory also can become fragmented, and you might have

plenty of memory to load a program but your RAM might be split up into too many pieces to allow the program to run.

For instance, if you load up all of your RAM and then quit a program, it may release memory that is not right physically "beside" the System in RAM. In that case, if the System needs to put up a dialog box it will try to retrieve it from disk and display it, and may run out of room allocated to the System. Then you get one of those dialog boxes we saw in spite of the fact that you have unused RAM.

An Example

Let's say you have a Mac with 8 Meg of RAM and you are writing a letter about a project. So you have Word open, and you run Excel to total up costs of a couple of different options. Now you want to run 4D to check the availability of parts on a networked database so you can put in the fact that we have all the parts available. You are going to run out of RAM in a hurry and get some dialog boxes like we saw earlier.

Play along with me now and don't suggest that you use a different Mac with more memory!

To run the programs that you need, you could quit Word, Excel, and 4D and use the Get Info dialog box to decrease the RAM allocated to them, so that you can run all three at the same time. But then you might not be able to open a database that you need, etc. The options are: go through a trial-and-error process of allowing the applications more room until you are able to open the ones you need and use them, you could get a memory optimization program that will do it for you, or you could go out and buy more RAM. Buying more RAM is the expensive way to do this.

In our About This Macintosh box earlier, Word had 2,048K and was not using all of it. Why not let Excel use that space to build a file to print? When we go back to Word later we can still open other files because there will be more than 8 megabytes of memory still available.

The "Next" command (as well as others) on the Palette will only be applied to the current (topmost) window.

<www.ssa.gov/> is the Social Security website which provides benefit and disability information, and forms. One form you can download is a PDF* to obtain your Social Security (SS) earnings record. It will provide an estimate of what you will receive from SS at retirement based on your estimate of SS earnings until retirement and at what age you plan to retire. We understand that you should obtain your record of SS earnings at least every three years so that SS records can be corrected if needed.

<www.usps.gov/> lets you find Aunt Tillie's zip code in Peoria if she left it off her return address. How much postage for an airmail letter of I.4 ounces to Lower Slobovia? Connect to the US Postal Services and get these answers and much more.

<www.innsandouts.com/> is the webpage of an Austin, TX company, Inns and Outs Corp., that lists more than 15,000 bedand-breakfast establishments in the US. Since many B&Bs are not located in metro areas, there is an interconnect with MapQuest to obtain a map for individual locations.

<www.w3.org/N/> gets entry to the Virtual Library. If you can't find it here, the information isn't available anywhere. A combination of search engines that link to all sorts of data bases, catalogs of libraries and informational web pages. I was able to find the judging criteria for Miniature Schnauzers very easily. Search to your hearts content without having to scroll through 10 entries at a time to find the 711th.

<http://infospace.com/mytown/ mytown.html> The October 13 Sunday Chronicle blurbed this one. It is handy for some limited searches, but you have to be patient as there are many entries to scroll through. When it works, you can order your pizza from the nearest site or find a barbershop close to home, et cetera.

InternetConfig and ICeTEe InternetConfig1.3
