Spell Catcher - A Writer's Delight

When I wrote about the Kensington Turbo Mouse 5.0, I called it "elegant."

Well, I just learned more computerese...that is to say, I now understand the meaning of another computer term. That term is **robust** and I suggest that it describes Spell Catcher by Cassady and Greene.

Whoa, you say, how can a program that checks your spelling be classified as robust?

Step right up and I'll tell ya about it. How about a program that checks your spelling as you type? Spell Catcher (SC, let's call it) makes a cute little sound (or a long, ugly one if you prefer) immediately if it doesn't recognize a word you just typed. I think it may even improve my spelling! Or, if you don't like to be bothered as you're banging out that masterpiece; you can turn off sound, do a "select all" and it will check the document word by word after you've finished.

How about a spell checker that you can select every application in which you want it to work? Now you can check your spelling in SuperPaint, SimpleText, or when you're preparing e-mail in real time on the HAAUG Heaven BBS or your Web browser.

How about a spell checker that also has a Thesaurus built right into it? I think I might even learn some more new words like "robust." (I do wish you could highlight a word you've just typed in the text, go to the Thesaurus and it would fly to the nuance-alternates. But

you need to type in the word into the Thesaurus, or copy and paste it which seems like an extra step to me - a minor inconvenience, needless to say, considering the snappy availability of a Thesaurus when you're writing.)

And did I tell you about the shorthand feature? You create a shorthand glossary, enter abbreviations and tell SC with what words you want those abbreviations to be replaced. For example, you type "btw" and SC replaces it with "By the way." (This is not the easiest feature to set-up.) Once you do, you'll never be able to type "btw" again without SC instantly changing it to "By the way." I know...I couldn't type a "y" and a "t" together like it was a word for this article because it immediately gets changed to "Yours truly."

SC can also correct capitalization errors, substitute curly quotes when straight quotes are typed (as in SimpleText), and substitute an Em-dash when double hyphens are typed. SC also has a feature called Ghostwriter that saves all of your keystrokes to disk even if you've forgotten to save, foiling the evil Mr. Electricity's efforts to mess with your mind and your work.

Really now...if Spell Catcher isn't robust for a spell checking program, then what is? All this for a price of about \$53 delivered mail order.

System Requirements: Mac Plus or greater with at least 1 MB free RAM, 1.5 MB Hard Disk space, and Sys. 7.0 or greater recommended. SC with Control Panel and Preference takes up about 1.06 MG on disk.

Go out and get members. Most Macintosh owners in Houston do not know that HAAUG exists. Help us change that.

My second hard gulp came when the facilities chairman gave his report. As you know (at least I sincerely hope that you know) we meet once a month at the University of Houston. Our rental cost for that one day meeting is in excess of \$1,000. I also learned that, though we pay in advance, the space we reserve can be preempted by University administration. This kind of thing (not exactly the same but still due to their right of eminent domain) led to the cancellation of last December's meeting and the dance we had to do between two floors last month.

If you fire up your computer (who uses calculators and fingers anymore), you learn that over \$17 of your annual dues (\$12000 ÷ 695) is used to pay the rent for 12 meeting days at the University of Houston. We brainstormed for a bit last night and Joe Cornelius is looking for alternate meeting facilities but again, you can help. Do you know of a facility that we might get cheaper which will accommodate our meeting? If you do, or

think you might, please get in touch with Joe via e-mail on HAAUG Heaven or by phone at (713) 448-7218. We need to meet and we need to save some bucks.

After that, it was my turn to hit the directors head on between the eyes. I couldn't think of a way to make it gentle then, and I can't think of a way to make it gentle now. I have accepted a job in the United Kingdom. I will be moving to Poole, Dorset, UK on April first. Rex Covington, who has served as my First Vice President, has agreed to (and has been appointed by the board to) fulfill the remainder of my term. Rex has exhibited creativity and aggressiveness in fulfilling all HAAUG duties assigned to him. I could not be leaving the reins of leadership in more capable hands. I know you will all support Rex as you have supported me. Please make him feel as welcome as you have made me.

Macintosh Logic Board Batteries

Macintosh computers tend to be used for many years, and so some problems that do not affect Windows users can bother the Macintosh user. One problem is the lifetime of the logic board battery. Many Windows users will not ever have this problem, since their computers will need to replaced long before the motherboard batteries will lose their charge. For instance, how many people still use 80386s? But many people are still very comfortable running 68030 and even 68020 Macs. Macintosh computers will still be usable after 5 or more years - so the batteries will die when the computer still has years of life left in it.

What is this battery? What does it do? Why do we have one? The logic board battery (the term motherboard is used on PC computers) is normally a lithium battery. Some versions have an alkaline battery, and I'll discuss them. The logic board battery (on most versions of the Macintosh) powers the SoftPower circuit - when you press the keyboard button to turn on the Mac, the battery supplies power to start the computer. The battery also supplies voltage to keep a small bit of memory alive that remembers settings like the time, the desktop color depth (256 or Thousands of colors), etc. This is the Parameter Random Access Memory or PRAM. If the Mac didn't have this battery, it wouldn't remember these settings when you turned it off.

What is the symptom of the problem? The first symptom is that the Mac will forget the date - it starts up and the clock is set to 1956! No, it is not a timewarp back to my birthday, it is the battery losing it's charge. The next symptom is that the computer may fail to start up when you press the button. However, in many cases, if you press the button twice in quick succession, the Mac will start up.

Who should worry about this problem? Anyone with an older Macintosh - that means anyone with one of the 680X0 CPUs. If you have an LC, a Quadra, a Centris - this problem will affect you.

How do you solve this problem? You

need to replace the battery! It is in a small holder on the logic board - and on most older versions of the Mac (with the exception of the "classic" style) it is real easy to get to the battery. On most Macs, you will see a small (1/2 AA) battery in a black plastic cage on the logic board. There are exceptions - the Mac II and the Mac IIfx have two 1/2 AA batteries, and the Quadra 630s (and their siblings like the Performa 630 as well as many of the newer PowerMac computers) have a larger battery (the alkaline one) that is held on with velcro. This battery is easier to replace but doesn't last as long. But before you open your Mac, remember that there are a lot of sensitive components inside that can easily be damaged. Many users can replace the battery easily, but if you are not comfortable working on the inside of your computer you can ask a technically-oriented friend to help you or you can take your computer to a service shop. If you have a "classic" style Mac, you should take your computer to a service shop since you can get a nasty shock if you are working inside of one of them. You can't get shocked by a Macintosh component computer's CPU box.

Where do you get this battery? Most electronics parts stores have them, though many of them don't know that the battery is used in a Mac. Just go in and ask for a Maxell ER3S 1/2 AA, a Tadirion TLD 12 94, or a replacement for them. The battery is also used in smoke detectors and some video equipment. The alkaline battery is a Rayovac Computer Clock Battery, model

Now - how about "watching" while I replace a sample battery? Here are the directions for replacing the battery in the Quadra 605 I have at home. First, make sure the computer is off and unplug all the cables going into the computer - but if possible leave the power cord plugged in. Take the cover off (this is very easy on the Quadra 605), put it aside, and locate the battery. The battery is near the center of the logic board in a black plastic cage. Note that there is some room between the end of the battery and the inside of the cage. Touch the power supply (the big

silver box on the right side) to eliminate any static electricity. Now gently put a screwdriver down the end of the cage between it and the battery. Wedge the cage out and away from the battery. Note which way the battery is facing. Now gently pull the battery free. There will be a battery icon molded into the bottom of the holder - that will show you which way the battery should face. Now put the replacement battery in, facing the same way as the old one was. Put the cover back on - hook one side on the cradle the battery is in and then stretch it a bit and pull it over the battery. Put the cover back on the computer, plug it in, and you are done. Now start up your computer and reset things like the time, mouse speed, and the color depth of your computer.

If you have a model of the Mac with the alkaline battery - once you have access to the logic board, just gently disconnect the power connector from the board and pull the battery loose. The velcro usually holds pretty well so expect the logic board to flex some.

The directions for the various Macs are usually slightly different, so I have a World Wide Web page that is devoted to the care and feeding of the logic board battery. The URL is: http://www.academ.com/info/ macintosh/ so please feel free to take a look. The site has photos of the batteries, symptoms of a dead battery, procedures for replacing the battery, and a link to an application that will remember your PRAM settings. But hopefully now you will have some understanding of the basic steps. Replacing this battery in most versions of the Mac is very simple, and if you think that you might have a weak battery you now know what to do. In fact, several people have told me that they bought a "broken" Mac at a garage sale for a few dollars, replaced the battery, and had a usable computer! It is good to hear about them being lucky, but why don't I get good deals like that?

Don't forget to properly dispose of the battery - many offices now have battery recycling boxes, and many electronic stores collect and recycle dead batteries.

Randall's is offering Peapod, an online grocery shopping and delivery service, at some of their stores. Evidently all you need is an E-mail address, not an online service. Special services are also available such as service desk items, prescriptions and film drop off and pick-up. A credit card number is required at registration from the free software disk (available for Mac and Windows) for "security" reasons although payments can be made by check. Peapod fees are as follows:

Shopping and delivery: \$6.95 plus 5% of the bill; a monthly membership fee of \$6.95 which includes 3 hours per month online access time with a cost of \$2.95 an hour thereafter. "Internet connections to the Peapod service are exempt from hourly calculations." A "risk-free offer" is available but covers only the initial monthly fee which Peapod refunds if canceled within 30 days. Other costs such as shopping, delivery and online time are excluded from this offer. I really wanted to explore the ordering process before registering but bailed out when I saw the monthly fee. I think I'll save the software for a time when I may need the service.

I talked to Peapod; and I will be sent free software disks to hand out at our next meeting, or if you just can't wait you can request a copy available @ 1-800-5-PEAPOD, ext. 122, E-mail at help@peapod.com.

AutoClock 1.4.4.sea

AutoClock is a lovely little progam that will dial a phone to one of several National Standards clocks throughout the U.S.and set your Mac's clock for you. It also has an init that will keep resetting your clock. I don't like that much, but my sibling in Boulder does. (One of the National Standards clocks is in Boulder.) You can also have the init dial automatically from time to time depending on how much money you're interested in spending for the sake of an acurate clock. I manually tell the program to call about twice a year when times change anyway, although it will also handle switches from daylight savings time to standard for you.

QuikHide v2.1.5

I forget exactly what this little init does, but it's either by a HAAUG member or posted to the BBS by one. Somebody reminded me what it does. It hides all those thousands of windows you have open so you can drag stuff to the trash. It does things I didn't want to have happen, so I don't use it. I happen to enjoy having a lot of windows open, but some people don't.

Font Gander 1.0.3 f.sea

This is a little program that lets you get a good look a fonts before you go to the trouble of installing them, also afterwards. It also prints out style sheets so that you can have hard copy references. I haven't tested that part of the program. The only thing I don't like about it is that it wants you to have Adobe's ATM

installed. It will work without it but you'll get jaggies with postscript fonts. Otherwise it comes in handy from time to time.

Décor 3.0.3 Installer.sea

Decor is a program that lets you choose a picture for your desktop, instead of a pattern, or the standard grey. It recognizes many formats. I use this all the time and have run it on previous disks. This is just the most recent version.

BulkRate 2.5.1.sea

This is the off-line reader for FirstClass BBS's that I use all the time. With HAAUG Heaven upgraded to version 3.5, you really need this version of BulkRate if you were a former user. If you weren't and you don't know what off-line means, it means that you can write a bunch of messages before you log on and then log on and the messages will be posted and other messages will be downloaded automatically. The program will then log off and you'll have a bunch of messages to read and respond to. This happens only after you do a bit of work setting things up properly. I've forgotten how that works but I'm sure it's in the docs.

The Disk of the Month costs \$3.50 if you supply the disk and \$5 if HAAUG supplies the disk. Come by the Mac PD Library desk to pick up your copy.

Connecting to AOL via the Internet

Are you tired of getting busy signals when you dial into America Online (AOL)? Do you have a non-AOL internet service provider (ISP)? If so, how would you like a more reliable and cheaper connection to AOL? Sure you would and here's how to do it.

AOL users have the option of connecting to AOL via an internet (TCP/IP) connection using their "Bring Your Own Connection" option. This option offers unlimited access time for \$9.95/month- provided you supply your own internet connection. That's where your non-AOL ISP comes in. Although this option has been around for a while, it's a lot more interesting now that AOL's modem pools are maxed out and busy signals abound. To take advantage of this AOL connection option, all you need to do is the following.

- 1. Launch AOL.
- 2. Click on the "Setup" button on

the logon screen.

- 3. Change your "First Try Connection File" from whatever modem you were using to "TCPack". Note that all the modem options below this option will disappear. These will now be handled by your PPP connection application.
 - 4. Save the changes.
 - 5. Quit AOL.
- 6. Connect to your ISP using the appropriate software (MacPPP, FreePPP, etc.).
 - 7. Launch AOL.
- 8. Click on the "Sign On" button and you're there!

Most people find more reliable access (i.e. no busy signals), slightly faster response (possibly), and savings (definitely) by using an internet connection to AOL. Be aware that you will still be charged by the hourly rate until you change your billing plan to the "Bring Your Own Connection" option. You can do this by going to keyword "billing" and making the necessary changes. Happy AOLing!
