Saturday Morning Feb. 14th: I was watching the local news having a second cup of coffee before going to the HAAUG meeting and all of a sudden HAAUG member Ben Adair is on the screen with M. D. Anderson (MDA) kids talking about "The Children's Art Project" (CAP). You would probably recognize it as the MDA Christmas cards. But the MDA kids also create Valentine, Birthday and blank note cards too.

I called Ben to find out more about his volunteer activities with CAP because I thought it would be an interesting article for the Apple Barrel. Ben and his wife began volunteering a couple of years ago because he had a couple of TAMU classmates/friends who had cancer, were treated at MDA, and began volunteering themselves.

Ben and his wife, Barbara, work three times a week at CAP. There is a tremen-

dous amount of packing and distribution work that is done to get the cards where people can see them and buy them. But once a week he gets to work with the kids directly creating art on the computer and he likes that best of all. The

kids use Compaqs with Wacom tablets and the graphics program, Dabbler. According to Ben, the hard drives are filled with games for the kids and often things have to be removed so the kids can save their creations. (He wishes the Macintosh was being used but acknowledges that Compaq Computer has been very supportive of MDA.) The kids also use the Internet and email.

Ben says he loves the kids and he thinks they know that. He has great respect for the kids and their approach to life and he believes he has gained more from his association with the kids than he thinks they have gotten from him. But I think kids know when they are in an atmosphere of love. Ben mentions the kids' names to me but I just know of them when he tells me what card each one produced. He appreciates life more because of the positive and cheerful attitudes of these special children.

A little bit about Ben himself... he got his first Mac in 1989 and is happy he found out about HAAUG shortly after he got the Mac. He is a Professional Engineer but had a career turn and got his law degree too. Like many of us, he uses a PC in the office but comes home to his Mac. He says he often brings work home to do on his Mac, including doing the monthly CAP newsletter and preparing CAP staff and volunteer profiles.

MDA kids have created greeting cards and other items like t-shirts, sweatshirts, ornaments, gift and tote bags, silk scarves for 24 years. Proceeds from the 1996 card and gift sales totalled a record \$850,000. Cards are sold in grocery stores, service stations and other retail outlets

from El Paso to Orlando, FL. Mail order shipments are made around the world. Talk about distribution!

An all day Beginners SIG will begin in April if everything works out right. (See related article next page.) A SIG Leader meeting will be held in April for a few minutes after the Business meeting.

Mac Librarian Kenneth Bullock was absent and had no report.

Apple Librarian Mike Brouillette reported sales at the last meeting and gross income of \$15. Publicity Chairman Rick Roberts was absent and had no report. Kimberly Reeves will publicize the April Beginners SIGs.

New Business

I'm Glad You Asked

Special Interest Groups (SIGs) are the meeting places for small groups of HAAUG members with similar interests, for face-to-face interaction. They are the social events of the club. The pizza SIG is growing (along with my waistline) but we do need some help in other areas.

SIGs are important because, unlike other sources of help and learning they're personal, immediate, flexible, and directly responsive. Human communication counts for a lot.

SIG leaders need to lead by definition, and coordinate the group. SIG leaders do not need to be experts in the area. Members of a group will generally contribute if they're invited to. SIGs evolve and change with time, sometimes with other leaders coming forward, at least for certain specific areas.

SIGs do **not** run forever. Leaders do get tired after a while and drop out. Some even develop a life outside of HAAUG. It's allowed and expected.

Have any ideas? Mine are used up, I'd like some fresh ones.

Members have expressed an interest in various topics. MIDI is one neglected area. HyperCard is another. Vintage Macs - now there's an interesting area for people who like their entire system and finder on one 400K floppy disk. Someone to step in and use any open time on our one phone line to get newcomers logged on to HAAUG Heaven would be a major welcome help to the club.

For April I'd like some real help with one specific area. An all day

workshop SIG for beginners. A startup thing for real beginners with modern Macs. Get going with a flying start. We will give it a little advance publicity. Ken Martinez will do the "hardware-plug-together" and upgrade kind of talk in his usual 9:00 AM Mac 101 SIG. Sidney Chen and Jonathan Magnus can handle the system installation and fundamentals in their Macintosh Fundamentals SIG at 10:00 AM. Break for the main presentation. In the afternoon we can have subsequent SIGs about freeware and shareware sources, backups, the pre-installed software, updates, HAAUG Heaven, whatever.

For this I need both suggestions and volunteers. No one is expected to run a full day workshop. We expect to set it up so different people step in during the day with different areas of expertise. Extensions, fonts, CDevs, when to use virtual memory - we all have some areas we know about. Are you willing to share your knowledge?

If it works we might consider doing it quarterly. The following month we could cover the ubiquitous pre-installed ClarisWorks software that comes on most home Macs. An all day ClarisWorks from word processing to spreadsheets to database and finish up with a few macros. Next meeting could be Quicken (which is also at least preinstalled in the "lite" version) from checking accounts to stock market tracking and on-line banking. And then back to start-up again.

I will be out of town for over a week at the end of March and will have to miss the meeting. But you can leave me e-mail on the HAAUG Heaven board at any time (david_scheuer@haaug.org) or directly on the 'net (david@net1.net) and I'll get it sooner or later. Hopefully sooner.

Miscellany

Users of OS 8 beware

Users of OS 8 be aware that the Object Support Lib extension that appeared in previous versions of Apple's system software is now built into OS 8. Installing this extension under OS 8 is a bad idea. Unfortunately, a number of programs install this potentially dangerous extension without bothering to check the system version you're running. If you do install a program, be sure to check for the "Object Support Lib extension" in your extension manager and remove it, if found.

Caveat from John Reeves

Except when Visioneer PaperPort 5.1 installs it, restart before removing it. PaperPort needs to see the extension on the first start-up for some reason. See third party compatibility reports on Macfixit or Macintouch web site for Mac OS 8.1.

Fonts and PageMaker

You have removed some fonts from your system folder. Then you open a PageMaker document that asks for them. Then you change all the fonts in the document. How can you stop PageMaker from asking you for those fonts again and again? Is there a way to tell the document that those fonts are gone and that you're not even using them in that document anymore?

DeskTop Folder Corruption Blues

Recently I had the odd problem of a corrupted Desktop folder. The Desktop folder is an invisible Folder which works at the root level of the drive. I had been experiencing minor gremlins for quite some time and decided at the beginning of the year I would take a few days and clean up, back up, and do a clean reinstall of System 8 on my Power Computing Power Tower Pro 200.

I have a 2 gig drive which I had partitioned into 5 smaller volumes to create smaller files and faster access to them. One of these partitions was an entire replication of my original clean OS 8 install. This is handy to do if you have the drive space because it gives you an instant Back up System to use in the event of problems on your main System folder.

Here is the catch. The DeskTop Folder is such a low level volume that it is "shared" among every thing you use or mount. In my case I went to my back up system to run Disk First Aid. Alas, the System appeared to be corrupted. Somehow my operating system had decided the desktop was a Desktop Print Spool folder and was just continually moving things to the desk top (which was a now a print folder). It was an endless loop as the system just kept renumbering the objects as they were moved from the folder to the folder.

I went back to my original partition and decided to work off the CD ROM. Now I could no longer access my CD ROM. I went to back up to my Internal JAZ drive. Too late. The Jaz drive was no longer on the SCSI chain. I kept restarting and finally was able to do a Disk First Aid repair and clean install of OS 8. Problem solved? Nope.

It seems that an invisible root level file called the DeskTop folder was the corrupted item, but it took a call to Apple to find out. My choices were to either reformat the entire 2 gig drive and lose everything or run over to Micro Center to pick up Norton Utilities 3.5.2. After many many restarts I was able to get the Norton CD-Rom to boot. I renamed the invisible Desktop file something else. I restarted the machine which caused the system to create a brand new Desktop folder. Sure enough the old desktop folder now was apparent, but it had the Icon of a DeskTop printer. How do I get all that stuff that was on that Desktop (which now is a type of "folder" that doesn't open) back?

Find File to the rescue. I "Found" each item using Find File (under the Apple Menu) and dragged it from that window back to my desktop.

It sure beat reformatting everything. When was your last back up? Moral of the story, Sometimes even a clean install and disconnecting the external SCSI chain doesn't cure all problems. I do love Norton Utilities 3.5.2 (versions before 3.5.1 do NOT work on OS8) and my gremlins are for the most part gone.

Here's a trick I learned after the fact. When using Find File, holding down the Option Key and then clicking on name allows you to see more options including, contents, name/icon lock, custom icon, and visibility. So you can search for files under these additional parameters.


