# **Hard Driving Miss Daisy**

Eventually you're going to need more storage space

When I started my Mac life with a IIci, it came with 80 megabytes of hard drive space. A virtual data landfill that would never overflow. Or so I thought. Later I learned the ugly truth. It doesn't matter how much hard drive space you have now, you will need more. Today's software routinely consumes from 20 megs to over 100 megs of hard drive space. Programs like Photoshop need free hard drive space in order to work their magic. And of course if you're a data junkie, there are hundreds of sites on the internet from which you can download megabytes of utilities, games and movies, all of which will absorb sectors on your hard drive faster than a sponge. Need more drive in your life? The solution, of course, is to add more hard drive space. There are several things to consider:

- A. Add a new drive or replace an existing
- B. Use an internal or External Drive.
- C. Standard hard drive or removable.
- D. SCSI or IDE.
- E. Drivers and formatting software

#### A: Add New Drives or Replace Old Drives

This is one of the first things to decide. Adding an additional drive gives you more total hard drive space, while replacing an older drive with a newer faster model may help your computer's performance.

#### **B:** Internal vs. External

Your Mac will actually help you decide this. While many of the tower design Mac cases have extra internal drive bays, most of the desktop models do not. If your Mac doesn't have an extra internal drive bay the only way to add an internal drive is to replace your existing drive. In this case you might want to go external. Installing an external drive is as simple as attaching a cable, checking your SCSI ID settings and installing driver software. SCSI ID's are set by push button or thumb wheel. Power is supplied via an internal power supply or a "brick" style power adapter like the one that comes with the Iomega Zip Drive. The downside is that they occupy extra space on your desk and add to your creeping cable-itus. Speaking of cables, when attaching external drives be sure to get the right cable to connect your drive to your SCSI chain. There are at least 3 different connector types. The most common are the 25-pin D-sub and 50-pin Centronics. Newer drives like the Iomega Jaz have a new high density 50-pin SCSI-II connector.

Installing internal drives take some courage, dexterity and planning to complete successfully. You have to open the case, taking care about static electricity by using a grounding strap or touching the power supply. Attach a "sled" or other mounting kit to the drive. Carefully slide the drive into an open drive bay and attach the SCSI and power cables. Test the computer, close the case, restart and then format your drive. On the plus side there are no additional cables or boxes sitting on your desk or family kitchen table.

#### C: Standard Hard Drive or Removable

Standard hard drives tend to be the performance leaders, especially if you add an Ultra-SCSI card and drive. You can push your data through as fast as 40 megs/sec. Capacities run from one or two gigs to 18 or more gigs. And of course the higher the capacity the higher the price.

Secretary Lyda McGhee's minutes were approved with minor corrections.

Programs Vice President Stephen Cravey reported that we would have Apple at the main meeting, Adobe is still tentative for August, and Alladin expressed interest in coming to see us sometime.

Facilities Vice President Jeff Davis was not present and no report was given.

Treasurer Elizabeth English reported net income of \$1,394.37 year to date.

Apple Barrel editor Bob McGuinness reported that the Barrel is in the works and that we still seem to have the same old problem with some people not getting their Barrel before meetings. It was suggested that people who don't receive their Apple Barrel on time

SIG Coordinator David Scheuer reported that most of the usual SIGs will be meeting but that we are working around Apple's presentation, so some SIGs won't meet and others have been moved for June only. We also have a new SIG about advanced networking, led by Gary Metts, that will meet for the first time in June. We will also be able to cancel the Aegean Room because of the way the SIGs have been moved around for the month.

Apple Barrel Ad Manager Peter Gingiss reported that he was getting caught up and should have more time to pursue new ads during the summer.

Mac Librarian (acting) Mike Brouillette picked up the Zips from Rex. We still need a full time Mac Librarian who wants to mess with it all.

Apple Librarian Mike Brouillette reported he made no money in May.

Publicity Chairman Rick Roberts was absent. No report was given but there were a lot of suggestions made.

#### **Old Business**

ISP Committee Status Report: Stephen Cravey should have the finalized proposal from HAL by the June board meeting.

The brochures are still in progress.

The Audit Committee – the report was finished. Randy Herzstein is going to help develop audit procedures. We need equipment records. The audit recommendations were tabled until the June board meeting for people to get some other information.

HAAUG Heaven is our only area for immediate help and member discussions. Many members derive important benefits from it.

Start cutting things and I'll bet that we lose a disproportionate share of members. Surcharge anything and again, I'll bet we lose a disproportionate share of members. I was willing to vote for a raise in the dues — but I will not tolerate being asked for a dollar here and there. I personally hate that kind of nonsense, I suspect many others do too. We are an all-volunteer organization. No apologies are needed if HAAUG Heaven is down for a day. Unprofessional? Irrelevant nonsense! Thank the sysops for the weeks on end that it's operating, and for the updates and ongoing maintenance, and the daily attention. If you care to volunteer to help and really know how, speak up. The board wasn't accessible to re-boot one weekend? Care to volunteer half of one of the rooms in your house (plus the electricity and air conditioning for the heat load) for the multiple modems, CDs, disk drives, computer, monitor, etc? Oh, and we need to make some holes in your walls to drop in 5 or so phone lines. By the way, the stuff has a serious noise factor, it will render your guest room useless. The flashing indicator lights are distracting too.

We are an all-volunteer organization. George over at StarTronics (who also places major advertising in the Apple Barrel) donated a machine and back corner of his shop for our voice mail. Not satisfactory enough? Do something.

We are an all-volunteer organization. Apple Barrel doesn't suit you? Pitch in. Write an article. Help with the pre-press, carry it to mailers, whatever.

We are an all-volunteer organization. Assume you post something on HH for the board of directors which doesn't meet there in any way shape or form and nobody gets back to you officially? We haven't got anybody to get back to you officially. Hey, how about someone to volunteer to collect all the postings on HAAUG Heaven that might concern the board, and print 20 or 30 copies of each to be handed out at board meetings. Then bring them to the board meetings, hand them out, get a consensus of board opinion, and then post it on the HAAUG Heaven.

We are an all-volunteer organization. That's why the Mac library isn't there anymore. Any volunteers to help me get it started again? We have an LCII and a zip drive.

We are an all-volunteer organization. We lack people to volunteer to take down their home or office Mac system every month, load it in a car, cart it to meeting, set it up, do a SIG, take it down, take it home, and set it up until next month. I can't walk carrying my tower

or my monitor, waddle slowly with one or the other, but certainly not with both. It needs a cart. If someone will volunteer to bring in and setup a PPC system for meetings, I'm sure I can find people willing to do more SIGs using it.

We only have one projection LCD. Jeff Davis kindly volunteered to loan us his LCD projector so we can have two overhead systems going at the next meeting instead of one. We can't afford to buy a second for the club. Anybody else got one they care to loan us — and that includes bringing it back and forth.

We are an all-volunteer organization. That's why we reluctantly passed on the possible free space for meetings at one of the county civic centers. It required that unpaid volunteers set up the chairs and room partitions and take them after the meetings in time for a 3:30 PM building closing. After multiple postings on this board and some major pleading at a general meeting, we had three people who said they would help — morning setup or maybe PM take-down but not both. We needed a minimum of a dozen. Obviously we'd give up our current location and then get tossed out of the Harris County location for failure to perform the required volunteer take-down duties after the meeting. If we ever got set up to hold the meeting that is. Not enough volunteers.

We might start being an Internet provider to club members. It is consistent with our purpose as a computer club oriented to the Mac operating system. It certainly needs to be cheaper than the commercial services to fulfill our goal of helping each other and providing benefits to members. We will run it with unpaid volunteers as usual and it might not be the most professional operation. Might it be a source of revenue? I certainly hope so. We are not a charitable organization and we do not have endowments. We will benefit from additional revenues. If it flops, or we run out of volunteers, we have the right to shut down and sell off the equipment.

A member said this might cause us to lose our focus. What focus? We decide where to focus, and we can decide to be unfocused and fuzzy if that's what suits.

We are a Macintosh operating system oriented incorporated computer club. The Apple II is where we started and we have evolved to the Mac. We have zero obligation to be professional, to try to be anything other than what we are, or to please anyone but ourselves. We may change, but for now, a computer club is what we are.

Removable media drives like those from Iomega, (Zip and Jaz) or Syquest, (Flyer or Syjet), give you the convenience of being able to add additional storage space by purchasing inexpensive disks or cartridges when you fill up an existing cartridge, creating a virtually unlimited amount of space. They are also great for sharing data with others.

#### D: SCSI or IDE? That is the Question

Another item to consider is what type of drive controller is used in your Mac. Until a few years ago the hard drive controllers in the Macintosh were exclusively SCSI, (Small Computer System Interface) however today, in order to build inexpensive Macs, Apple turned to a PC technology, Intelligent Drive electronics or IDE. Many models of Macs, like the 6400 and 6500 and the new G3 systems from Apple, as well as models from the clone makers use IDE controllers.

IDE is used extensively in PC compatible WINTEL systems and while IDE is a less expensive controller than SCSI, SCSI still has a performance edge in speed and data throughput. Also IDE only supports two devices on a chain, either another drive or a CD-ROM. With SCSI you can connect up to seven devices including scanners or ethernet connectors and even video controllers. Also every Mac still has an external SCSI bus no matter what the internal hard drive controller is.

#### Who wants Chocolate?

There are several flavors of SCSI drives available. There is standard SCSI which can transfer data from 3 to 5 megabytes per second. Then there is SCSI II, which comes in 3 versions:

- 1. Fast, sends data twice as fast as standard SCSI, up to 10 megabytes/second.
- 2. Wide, which doubles the number of wires from 8 to 16 to send twice as much data at the same time.
- 3. Fast/Wide, which is a combination of the first two versions for data transfers of up to 20 megabytes/second.

Lastly there is Ultra-SCSI or SCSI III which can transfer information at up to 40 megabytes/ second. To take advantage of Ultra-SCSI and many SCSI II drives you'll need to invest in a separate SCSI card from Atto or Adaptec which have the new technology for the new SCSI

The external SCSI bus on all Macs is standard SCSI. Certain models of Macs, (7500,7600, 8100, 8500, 9500) have two SCSI busses, an internal and external bus. Only the 7500, 8500 and 9500 have SCSI II controllers on their internal bus. For more info on SCSI see William Stewart's article on page 16. (Editorial note: Would you believe last month?)

#### Or do you prefer Vanilla?

If you buy an internal IDE drive it will need to support the following items:

- 1. The drive must support the identify command.
- 2. The drive must support at least PIO mode 2 performance level
- 3. The drive must have write caching enabled to that auto-reallocation of spares is invoked.

Be sure to check the drive specifications or confirm with the drive vendor before your purchase the drive.

If you stay with Apple branded hard drives you need only the tools that come with the system software, Disk FirstAid and Drive Setup. However if you purchase non-Apple drives you will also need to buy a formatting and partitioning utility like FWB's Hard Disk Toolkit or LaCie's Silverlining.

**E:** Drivers and Formatting Software

Silverlining is available as a separate purchase but comes free with Quantum and LaCie hard drives. Other manufacturers like APS also provide their own formatting tools, but it is a good idea to standardize on one formatting utility and use it on all your drives. This will reduce some problems you can encounter running multiple hard disk drivers.

Its a Jungle out there. You can add almost any IDE or SCSI drive to your system, including drives built for PC systems, if you are careful. Internal drives should be the 3.5" half height form factor in order to fit the Mac drive bays. You want to make sure, in the case of SCSI drives that the drive has a 50 pin interface, a power connector and jumper pins for setting the SCSI ID and termination. Newer SCSI II Fast/Wide and Ultra-SCSI drives can have 68pin to 80-pin interfaces. Also get a mounting kit specifically for your Mac with your drive. This will cost an additional \$10 to \$15 dollars.

Hard drive prices have been dropping rapidly. Last year a four gigabyte SCSI drive would cost you \$600 to \$800. Now that same four gig drive will cost between \$250 and \$400. IDE drives tend to be even less expensive.

Companies like COMPUSA or Creative Computers charge more for drives, but you can find local deals from places like Fry's. Mailorder companies that advertise in the back of MacWorld, MacWeek and MacAddict offer extremely reasonable prices, but you have to be a bit wary. Often resellers will buy up whole lots of equipment at a cheap price and then sell the equipment at bargain prices. Try to avoid buying close outs from manufacturers that are no longer in business (like Micropolis,) if you want to ensure that your warranty can be honored. You may also want to avoid refurbished drives, although for the brave they can be real bargains.

If you stay with well-known drive manufacturers like Seagate and Quantum, or resellers like APS you won't go wrong. With a little care and planning your can have a lot more space.

### **New Apple Networking SIG**

This SIG is being sponsored by Gary (Sõl) Metts of PC/Mac Solutions, and will cover the basics of Apple/Macintosh networking. Included will be a summary of the OSI networking architecture and the standards as established by the IEEE for AppleTalk, EtherTalk, and LocalTalk. Additionally I will be demonstrating plug 'n play features of Apple networking, the various network interface types, dumb and intelligent ethernet hubs, and peripheral networking. This SIG will specifically address networking as it applies to business environments and will also cover some cross platform issues as well as methodologies and tricks.
