

Disinfectant: RIP

I regret to announce that I am officially retiring Disinfectant, our free anti-viral utility for the Macintosh. The current version 3.7.1 is the last version. Disinfectant will not be updated for the new Autostart 9805 worm or for any future viruses, worms, or other Macintosh malware.

I made this decision not because of the new Autostart 9805 worm, but rather because of the widespread and dangerous Microsoft macro virus problem. I believe that there are now well over 1000 of these viruses, and many new ones are discovered every month. They are now a much more serious problem for Mac users than are the classic Mac system viruses. I simply do not have the resources to combat a problem which is this huge in scope and complexity.

I remember the first time I saw See-U-Cme being used for a conference between about 16 people all seeing each other and being able to talk to each other at the same time and almost all of them were in different countries. This was being done on an Apple Macintosh IICI. In the user group at that time, I remember coming in and helping in the disk library and making disk duplicates for hours to help meet the needs of the membership. With the explosion of the www, most of the need of program updates, fonts and game demos are being met by the www and the demand for disk has dropped off. I remember at one time the charge for the disk in the library was nothing then there was a small charge. Now we can't give them away! Boy, do things change.

As most of you know, HAAUG is looking into providing Internet access as one of the benefits of membership in HAAUG. We have compared services offered by many providers here in Houston. We have looked at the cost of providing this to our membership. We have looked at what providing this service has done to other user groups. We have looked at our membership to see if the people there are willing to help with this big an endeavor. We have looked at the things that we want to happen in HAAUG, membership growth, better teaching utilities, i.e.: projection systems, meeting locations, teaching aids like video tapes, etc....

Other user groups have gotten involved and spent upwards of a million dollars getting set up and their groups have prospered. Membership has grown beyond anyone's' expectations. Some are even able to have full time offices and teaching facilities for the benefit of their membership. We are looking at a much smaller cost, being able to take advantage of piggybacking our server to an existing provider. We will have all the benefits of being an ISP, with out the major cost. We have had members step forward and offer to assist in support. Our research shows that given the opportunities for Mac Users to get their Internet Service from an Apple User Group that may be better able to answer their questions and help them in getting set up, they would make the change. We also, it looks like, will be able to provide our members with up to ISDN (pretty fast) transfer rates for the sum of about \$10 per month. We won't make much per user, but with our anticipated membership growth we will be better able to meet our memberships needs. As we prepare to enter the next century (and boy am I happy that we don't have the year 2000 problem that a lot of computers have); I am glad to see us also progressing and changing with the times. I think it will be so neat to sit in my office, log in on my MAC, ring my house, have my wife sit in front of our MAC at home and we can see each other and talk just like they did that day years ago at the university and all of it is because I am a member of HAAUG.

What type of assistance is offered? Basic help with programs such as AppleWorks, ClarisWorks, WordPerfect, Excel, etc. Help with hardware problems such as; My computer will not boot up; Newton questions, etc.

It is a source of current news concerning computer topics, freeware and shareware software and software upgrades from Apple. Microsoft Office 98: Security Issues

An earlier investigation showed no "smoking gun," but we now have confirmed a serious security problem with Microsoft Word 98 on the Mac: Word 98 documents may contain hidden, random snippets of data from elsewhere in your hard disk or memory. That is, Word 98 documents can include, hidden from view, data completely unrelated to the document and never inserted by the user. Sending a Word 98 document to someone else thus can reveal random private information from your computer system without your knowledge.

We opened with BBEdit several Word 98 documents we'd created and documents we'd received. They contained confidential email, URLs, disk directory paths and other information that is invisible within Word 98 and that never should have been in these files. The problem occurs even if Fast Save is disabled (which we recommend), and readers report the problem also involves Windows' Office 97 and earlier versions of Word on the Mac, (including Word 6).

Chuck Shotton describes a problem he says has been around for years:

"[Word] ignores the logical end of file and includes the entire contents of the final disk sector in the file. Since that disk sector may have been previously used for things like e-mail or other documents, it is possible that the data on the disk will be included in your Word document."

The simplest solution, based on Chuck's description, is to use Save As to place your Word file on a newlyerased disk volume (perhaps a RAM disk) before sending it off to someone else.

A Microsoft Knowledge Base article describes an OLE fix for Windows 95 that appears to address the same type of problem. It notes that Windows versions of PowerPoint, Excel and Word are affected, but says Windows NT avoids the problem by re-initializing disk space when files are deleted.

According to readers, a similar issue affects PageMaker and QuarkXpress files, and some other applications also may behave like this.

In response to our inquiry about the problem, a Microsoft spokesman replied:

"We are aware of the issue reported on MacInTouch concerning Word 98, and are investigating remedies. The problem is caused by the way Word 98 allocates space on a disk for file storage. The Mac OS-like many other OS' file systems—does not erase files when you delete them, it simply removes a reference to them and marks the space they occupied as "free". Since Word 98 does not initialize disk space the Mac OS allocates for a File Save operation, a small amount of unused space in the file may contain random data from previously-deleted files. This behavior affects only data on a disk: the postings suggesting that Word might be taking data from memory (RAM) are in error.

Microsoft takes any reported security issues seriously and we are investigating the appropriate steps to take. In the short term, any customer with a security concern has the option of using a number of third party disk utilities."

As of Monday, June 29, Microsoft is working on a fix. The same problem exists on PC's. A bug fix was posted for Windows 95 for this problem. Apparently, Microsoft fixed this in Windows NT. The original packet analysis showed that the version check was benign, but then this data leak popped up.

I am aware that some Mac users do not use Microsoft Word 6 or Excel 5 or later versions, and hence have still found Disinfectant useful. These people seem to be a minority, however. The majority of Mac users need a commercial anti-viral product. Disinfectant is not adequate protection, and hasn't been for several years. For this reason, I feel that there is little point in updating the program for the new worm. Doing so would, in fact, only provide a false sense of security, and result in more harm than good.

The following commercial antiviral utilities are currently available for the Macintosh. All Disinfectant users should switch to one of these products.

Anti-Virus Toolkit. Dr. Solomon's. SAM. Symantec. Virex. Dr. Solomon's. VirusScan for the Mac. Network Associates.

I began working on the Mac virus problem and Disinfectant ten years ago, in the Spring of 1988, when the first Mac viruses began to appear. Disinfectant 1.0 was released to the public on March 18, 1989. I have been enormously gratified by the success of the program and its very kind reception by the Macintosh community. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank my many users for their support and encouragement over all these years. I'd also like to express my appreciation to the other members of the Mac anti-viral research community for their outstanding spirit of cooperation and public service which has made all of our products possible.

Nine years is a long run for any kind of computer software. It's time to move on.
