Turning your Mac into a TV and radio easy with ixMicro

Thanks to MacInTouch's note in a posting June 15, I ordered an ixTV/ FM directly from ixMicro (www.ixmicro.com) and received it less than 24 hours later thanks to FedEx.

I have a new 450 MHz G-3 and lamented not having an AV option available from Apple. ixMicro has solved that problem. It gives one almost all that an AV Mac has and more. It provides SVHS, RF or 75 ohm video input, stereo audio in and out. Two models are available, each has a TV tuner, one also has a FM tuner, one does not.

The Pluses: It was less than 10 minutes from opening the FedEx box to watching CNN on my monitor through my G-3. One uses an application called "ixTV Desktop," which is similar to Apple's Video Player. All needed software is found on a separate Macintosh CD.

At only \$100 plus shipping, the price is fair, especially considering it includes a TV/FM tuner. ixTV does not require a ribbon cable to the video card, a good thing since the feature pins on my ATI video card are

There was a discussion about sending the Barrel to people as a pdf file attached to an e-mail address. George will put a notice to that effect in the Barrel, and if we get enough responses it may be doable.

Apple Barrel Ad Manager Peter Gingiss was absent and no report was given.

SIG Coordinator David Scheuer reported there were more problems with the repaired computer. Rex Covington volunteered to do a FileMaker SIG. There are no SIGs in July unless someone does a HAAUG Heaven SIG. No takers that I'm aware of.

Volunteer Manager Peter Gingiss was absent and no report was given.

Apple/Mac Librarian Mike Brouillette was absent. There was further discussion of how to handle the library using the remaining zip disks and possibly through the purchase of a Read/Write CD "burner." No final decisions were reached, but lots of folks are working on it.

Publicity Chairman Kimberly Reeves was absent and no report was given.

Boutique Chairman Amy Denton was absent and no report was given. Patty Winkler made us some money taking Amy's place in May, but nobody asked for a report. Thanks, Amy—we appreciate it.

Old Business

HAAUG Heaven: Randy Herzstein reported that we need a fan for the 18 Gig drive. He is also still working on automating backups.

The Audit Committee: We still need

someone to head the committee. The 1996 Audit Committee Report was never given and they still have the books.

ISP Committee Status Report: We have more paying users and no major problems have been reported, again.

New Business

Auctions went well and we discussed how to handle them more efficiently, making fewer waves, as it were. We will need to ask vendors if they have any objections. We plan to auction software and continue to give away T-shirts and things that we get from vendors (not HAAUG ones.)

Funds for the January 2000 meeting site were approved.

Up to \$150 was approved to create and print a swap meet postcard since the date was announced incorrectly at the last meeting.

Up to \$50 was approved to create and print business card to pass out to members for them to hand out to friends, relations, business associates, etc.

Up to \$150 was approved to create and print a postcard soliciting new memberships. The mailing list for this postcard is being developed.

Stephen Cravey resigned as Vice-President of Programs effective July 10, 1999. He's defecting to HAL-PC, but will continue to maintain HAAUGNet.

If you're interested, the meeting convened at about 6:30 and adjourned at 9:10.

HAAUG would like to know whether you'd prefer to receive the monthly Apple Barrel newsletter via e-mail as an Adobe Acrobat PDF file or through the mail as delivered now.

E-MAIL ADVANTAGES:

• **FASTER DELIVERY.** It takes about two weeks or more to print and bulk mail newsletters to the membership after the Barrel is finished. Bulk mail delivery is unpredictable. E-mail delivery would put the Barrel in your hands faster and weeks before the monthly meeting.

• **REDUCED COSTS.** OK, we admit—it would save us money. The fewer newsletters we have to print and mail, the more money we have to spend on programs and other nifty HAAUG stuff.

SNAIL MAIL ADVANTAGES

• **DOWNLOAD TIME.** The complete Barrel in PDF format could easily top a megabyte. Even with a 56k modem, that's several minutes of downloading before you can view it on screen or print it out. This could be called "the hassle factor."

McHurricane:

A program for tracking hurricanes. (Duh!) Anyway, I like it. Those things make me really nervous. I grew up in a desert and rain is difficult enough to cope with. When I was the HAAUG Librarian, I would prepare a floppy with Hurricane tracking programs on it in April and distribute it for free during Hurricane season. Even if the current librarian could do that now, where would iMac users stick the floppy?

This is probably one of my favorite programs in the world. I'm not that good at typing. This is a little Control Panel Device that sticks yet another icon in your Menu Bar. It's available on HAAUG Heaven or on the web at www.r-ettore.dircon.co.uk.

What it does is type stuff for you. Say you have a name like Elizabeth A. English. That's not really difficult, but "eae" followed by the space bar types it for me, so I don't have to think.

Default Folder:

Okay so I have a tie as to my favorite program. This is yet another Control Panel that lets you set up Folders on your Mac that it will return to quickly within Open/Save dialog boxes. You can set them up as you go, by the way. You don't have to spend a couple of hours figuring it all out. It will help a lot to read the docs at least once. Lifted from the ReadMe file, "Default Folder is a control panel that...provides many of the essential features of the commercial SuperBoomerang and Directory Assistance utilities, but without the infrequently used extras that take their toll in compatibility, memory, and CPU usage. Default Folder is fully compatible with Mac OS 8.6, and supports both Standard File and Navigation Services Open and Save dialogs."

- 3. Occasionally, your car would die on the freeway, and you would have to accept this, restart and


drive on.


