Nifty hardware, software unveiled at MacWorld

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Just as with last year's Macworld New York, Apple nearly stole the show with new hardware announcements during Steve Jobs's keynote address. But we were pleased to discover a number of other pieces of hardware worth mentioning, too.

If you're one of those people who brainstorms everything on a whiteboard, check out Virtual Ink's Mimio, a \$500 whiteboard capture device. Unlike Smart Technologies' Smart Board (which we noted at the Jan-97 Macworld Expo), the Mimio is a meter long bar that attaches to the edge of any normal whiteboard with suction cups, and connects via USB to a Mac or PC.

Standard dry-erase markers fit into special pen holders, and the system uses a combination of ultrasound and infrared to translate pen or eraser strokes on the whiteboard to the virtual whiteboard in Mimio's software. The software also lets you record an entire whiteboard presentation for later playback, and remap the pen colors to match hues other than the standard red, green, blue, and black (it comes with those four holders and you can buy more).

Still lacking in the Macintosh version is the capability to transmit whiteboard presentations live over the Internet.

Sounds good to me

Except for people who are serious about gaming or MP3s, most of us either don't much think about computer speakers, or have some random set of "multimedia" speakers that are better than a computer's built-in speakers, but don't set the ears to tingling. Harman Kardon is changing that, first with the crystal clear iSub subwoofer they introduced at Macworld Expo in San Francisco in January, and now with the equally transparent SoundSticks speakers they were selling in a \$200 bundle with the iSub. Plus, Apple tapped Harman Kardon for the round speakers included with Apple's slick new Power Mac G4 Cube.

Tips to make using Quicken more fun, productive

1. Use the manual. It does not matter whether hardcopy or CD (Quicken Deluxe only). And it is not necessary to read it cover-to-cover. Just refer to it any time the question, "How do I...?" occurs to you.

Clair's recommendations: There are a number of other books that can also be helpful. Among them are:

- Quicken for Dummies.
- Create Wealth with Quicken.
- Personal Finance for Dummies.
- Quicken 2000 for the Mac Official Guide.
- Quicken for Macintosh Visual Quickstart Guide

2. Back up your data files. (Note: This is NOT MAKE A COPY on the FILE menu.) Go to the EDIT menu and choose PREFERENCES to set up whether and how often you want to be reminded to make a backup file as you exit each Quicken session. Quicken will name the file "Backup of [name of data file]" and bring up the Save dialog box so you can choose where to save the backup file.

Clair's recommendations: Do not save the backup file to the same drive as the original data file. Assuming your data file is on your hard drive, save the backup file to floppy, ZIP cartridge, a different hard drive, or other media. Also, if using floppies or cartridges, be sure have several and rotate them each session. Replace the backup media from time to time (once a year or so) as it can wear out and go bad.

3. Archive files if they get too large to work with easily. This is where MAKE A COPY on the FILE menu is used. MAKE A COPY will copy transactions between given dates (that you select) in the original data file and put them in a new data file, then ask you to give the new file a name and location. You will then have two files, the original and the copy containing transactions with only the chosen dates. (Note: Turn off any automatic transactions BEFORE using this feature.)

Clair's recommendations: I like to archive my files annually after I have filed my taxes. This started out as a necessity when I was using older, slower computers.

• First I make a backup of my original file.

• Second, I archive (MAKE A COPY) of last year's transactions and name the new file something like "Jaschke1999 Finances", using the default beginning date and 12/31 of last year as the ending date.

• Third, I archive from my original file again, but this time I chose the dates from 01/01 of the current year to the present, allowing Quicken to bring forward all balances and any uncleared transactions, and name the file "Jaschke2000."

• Fourth, I delete the original data file. (Remember, I made a backup copy.)

• Finally, I rename the "Jaschke2000" to the name of the deleted original data file "Clair Jaschke's Finances." This is now my current data file.

• Last year's file is copied to a special backup media with all of my other archived files for reference as needed.

4. Credit Cards. There are various ways to handle credit card charges and their payments. You can set up an account for every card you have and enter all transactions as they occur. Some credit cards need accounts set up so that transactions can be downloaded through Quicken (American Express and Quicken credit cards are two). Some people don't set up accounts at all, but split the categories when they make the payments. Do whatever is comfortable for you.

Clair's recommendations: I divide my credit cards into two types, some with accounts and some without.

• If the credit card will be paid in full each month AND almost all of the transactions will be for one category (such as gasoline credit cards), I do not set up an account. If there is an occasional transaction to a different category, I split it out when I made the payment.

• If the credit card will NOT be paid in full each month OR there will be more than one category used on the transactions, I set up an account for the credit card. Example: VISA, MicroCenter. This is where I will enter all transactions. Since I determine the category(ies) at the time of the transaction entry, I don't have to split the categories at the time of payment. The category for the payment is the credit card account. Quicken puts categories for accounts in brackets: [VISA].

5. Reconcile your accounts regularly. All of your accounts.

• Some accounts, such as checking, credit cards and stock portfolios, will allow you to choose the Reconciliation option from the Activities menu. In the later versions of Quicken, you can put a Reconciliation button on the tool bar.

Clair's recommendations: At the very least, reconcile each account for which you receive a statement as soon as possible after the receipt of the statement. If an account only receives a statement quarterly or yearly, expect Quicken to put up a message about balance date differing by more than one month. Print the Reconciliation Report and keep it with the statement.

• Other accounts, such as cash accounts, will not let you do a Reconciliation but you can choose Adjust Balance

from the Activities menu (or set up an Adjust Balance button on the tool bar).

Clair's recommendations: Even if this type of account is in balance, do an Adjust Balance periodically anyway. It only takes a moment and you can delete the \$0 adjustment, if you like, to save space.

6. Date Compliance.

• Quicken 2000 (Power PC, OS 8.1 or higher) is supposed to be fully Y2K date compliant.

• Quicken 98 (the latest version that will run on Macs using System 7.x) is Y2K date compliant except for online transactions. It needs to be updated to Release 5 or higher to avoid online download date prob-

lems that became effective in September 1999.

• Older versions of Quicken may not be Y2K date compliant. If

you have any problems, consider moving to a more recent version of Quicken, either 98 or 2000.

7. Updating Quicken.

• Versions: Quicken 7, Quicken 98 and Quicken 2000 are versions of Quicken. Releases are updates to the versions.

• You can get the latest Releases of each Quicken version by going to <u>www.intuit.com</u> or by calling Intuit at one of the numbers listed in the manual. Determine which release you have of your version of Quicken by holding down the R key on your keyboard and clicking on the Apple menu and then About Quicken.

8. Keep data files to a minimum. I have met several people who seem to have a number of data files that are different versions or duplicates or almost duplicates of each other. This causes confusion as to which file is to be used for the latest data entry. Sometimes this is due to improper use of MAKE A COPY (see items 2 and 3 above) and sometimes the multiplicity of data files is on purpose.

Try to have only one or a few data files and have each data file be for a specific purpose. One for home finances. One for business (if this information can be separated from the home finances). One for a special club or other separate financial entity. At the same time, if you are doing Grandma's (or someone else's) accounting in Quicken, don't put her accounts and transactions in your data file. Set up her own.

9. Online Banking. If you are interested in doing online banking, research banks first. Some banks are PC only; others do Mac also. Some allow online banking/ downloading through Quicken; others require you to download a .qif file (Quicken-formatted) that then can be imported into Quicken. Charges for online services vary; online monitoring of your accounts may be free but online bill paying usually incurs a fee.

Older versions of Quicken route downloads from your

bank through Intuit to your computer. Quicken 98 and 2000 use the Internet to do downloads from your bank to you.

When you can get the bank, Intuit or the Internet, and Quicken set up properly, online banking can be very timesaving and even fun. (Quicken 98 has a more active online animation than Quicken 6.) Reconciliations are much quicker.

10. Stocks.

Don't Panic. Don't be

afraid to start over.

The first thing to remember about portfolio and mutual fund accounts is that there are more windows to work with.

• The basic window for each account is its register, which looks a bit different from the registers of other types

of accounts. But it is used for entering transactions just like the others. The heading at the top of the register shows what type of information goes into each portion of the transaction.

• All registers have a button that will take you to the Portfolio window. This gives a summary of all stock accounts or securities. Share price adjustments can be done here.

Quicken's manual can guide you as to whether your investment accounts, including 401Ks, should be set up as (stock) portfolios, mutual funds or bank or cash accounts. One tip is to look at the way the account statement (monthly, quarterly) presents activities. If share activity is shown on the statement, set up the investment as a stock portfolio or mutual fund type account. If only cash transactions appear on the statement, a banking or cash account might be a better method of recording these transactions. If it is a brand new investment account and you don't have a statement yet, make your best guess. When you get your first statement, decide if another style of account would be more suitable.

Quicken also has online capabilities for getting information about stocks and other similar items. Refer to the manual for more information.

11. Don't Panic. Don't be afraid to start over.

If you decide you have set up an account as the wrong type of account, set up a new account as the correct type. In many cases you can move the transactions from one account to the other with little or no problems. Then delete the wrong type account.

If you are new to Quicken and think you have things so botched up, you want to throw away the data file and start over again, do it! When I started using Quicken, I set up my data file and threw it away twice before I felt like I was getting the hang of it.

Remember. Have fun with Quicken. And if all else fails, READ THE MANUAL!

List your website on search engines for free

If you'd like to list your website with various search engines and "free" appeals to you, try http:// www.selfpromotion.com/. As the home page states: "SelfPromotion.com is the net's first and only URL Registration ShareService ... If you feel the site is useful, then pay me what YOU think the advice and service is worth!" Besides being useful and free, the site was made on a Mac. As the creator adds at the end, "The author, on those exceedingly rare occasions when he does think, indeed thinks differently."

Send a telephone wake up call from your Mac

Reminders, wake up calls and more can be entered through your computer keyboard and delivered by phone using the iPing website. Sign up is free, but you've got to suffer through the ads delivered by the computer voice that calls to read you the reminder over the phone. Support a Texas software developer by downloading the latest copy of TexEdit, an excellent multi-window styled text editor. PowerKey Pro and Rebound, Neuron Data Systems' MacCoach, and Kernel Productions' Lazarus. But all of those rely on ADB to communicate with the Mac, so they don't work with modern USB-only Macs. Worse, USB itself is usually taken out in a crash, preventing Command- Control-Power from restarting the machine. Luckily, Sophisticated Circuits has just released Kickoff, which toggles power to the Mac whenever the Mac stops responding to Kickoff's periodic tickles over USB. The football-shaped translucent graphite Kickoff costs \$179 more than the ADB-only Rebound and equivalent to the PowerKey Pro.

Best Replacement 3D Glasses

3D Scan takes the prize for the coolest scanner add-on with their \$300 Lightshow, a hood that fits over most scanners and enables you to scan three dimensional objects. The hood is almost entirely mirrored inside and has special lights that match the color spectrum of most scanners (contact 3D Scan for a list of incompatible scanners). The resulting scans start off being two-dimensional, although the addition of a program called Canoma lets you perform some 3D modeling, and you can also rotate an object and stitch multiple scans together into a QuickTime VR movie. Although the Lightshow works with most scanners, its operation varies with different scanners, depending on how high above the surface the scanner can focus. A digital camera could produce similar images, but the beauty of Lightshow scans is that they're high quality and include just the scanned object-no background.

Along with the numerous cool bits of hardware we saw at the show, plenty of software stood out as well.

Excel-lent Reality Recognition

Everybody knows Microsoft Excel is a powerful spreadsheet tool with an unimaginable number of features that confound the numerically disinclined. But lots of people continue to use Excel for less taxing tasks, such as averaging a set of numbers or even making grid-based schedule signs. When Microsoft researched how people use Excel, they found that 60 percent of users rely on the program to manage simple lists of information. So Microsoft added and exposed features in Excel 2001 (due in October, with the rest of the Microsoft Office 2001 suite) that make list management much easier.

Most Compelling Preview

Power On Software was showing an early version of Rewind, a utility that tracks all changes to your hard disk in the background while you work and enables you to "rewind" your hard disk (or just individual files) to some point in the past, reversing all changes no matter how serious or damaging. Deleting files, overwriting files, virus infection, system corruption - it doesn't matter. You can even rewind past changes that make the Mac incapable of booting. Power On hopes to ship Rewind in the fourth guarter of 2000, and although it demoed extremely well at the show, a utility that works at such a low level needs extensive testing.

Best Head-to-Head Combat

IBM released ViaVoice at the previous Expo, and this time the company released the \$150 ViaVoice for Macintosh, Enhanced Edition. It works with USB microphones, ameliorates a number of interface infelicities, and now lets you dictate directly into a few other applications besides the supplied SpeakPad. Most important, when you correct an error, ViaVoice adjusts its acoustic model (previously, it adjusted only its linguistic model). Meanwhile, although release of their long-anticipated iListen is probably still several months away, MacSpeech was handing out free previews on CD at the show (which you can order online for \$10 shipping and handling); there's no command-and-control or correction yet, but after you train the program you can dictate into any application.

Most Welcome Transformation

Speed Doubler fans take note -Connectix has released CopyAgent, a \$40 Mac OS 9-compatible program that incorporates the advanced copying and keyboard acceleration features of Speed Doubler, while dropping the alternate 68K emulator and disk caching aspects of the program. Improvements over Speed Doubler include a Smart Replace that copies only changed files and a limited macro feature that types text strings in response to keyboard shortcut hotkeys.


