# Community college computer courses are 'super bargains'

If an hour a month at a HAAUG Digital SIG isn't enough, here's the next best place in town. Houston Community College has an open enrollment policy and offers computer courses, including Quark, PageMaker, inDesign, and several levels of Photoshop.

Since I'm currently taking a Photoshop course and have met a few of the instructors I feel qualified to state that these are super bargains. If you're "in district" which refers to the HISD school district, you pay the lowest rate, \$117 per course. If you're out-of-district, you pay \$204. Spring Branch is out-of-district (darn) even though it has HCCS campuses. A minor lab fee gets added, and senior discounts get subtracted if applicable. If you apply

for a certificate as opposed to a degree, the paper work is minimized.

The courses carry three transferable college credit hours—part of degree programs—and they are serious courses. The four hours of weekly class time are divided between lecture time and supervised lab time for a sort-of sixteen weeks. Additional lab time is available. A finals week and school holidays will reduce the number of sessions.

Daytime courses generally meet twice a week for two hours at each meeting. Evening courses generally meet for four hours one evening per week, 5:30 PM to 9:30 PM.

The value lies in the instructors. The college has recruited qualified professionals from various areas of graphic arts and publishing who have

### The benefits of a second hard drive

We all have a list of "Things I Want To Buy For My Mac." Whether you bought an iMac last month or are running a legacy machine, here are some reasons you should move the purchase of a second hard drive to the top of the list.

### **More Storage Space**

Well, that one was obvious, wasn't it? A second drive will allow you to store more files, more video, more MP3's, more everything. This is no small consideration given the increasing size of today's programs and the power they represent. But there are multiple other advantages a second drive can provide

Having a second, separate hard drive gives you the opportunity to try out new versions of the MacOS as they come out without "risking" the stability of your Mac. Just install the new version of the OS on your second drive, change the startup disk in the Startup Disk control panel, and restart! You can now play with the new version, run your applications to see how they perform, and "build" your new System Folder by dragging over the components of the old, all without destroying or modifying the System Folder you've so carefully built.

You can even attempt committing the sin of doing a "dirty" install in relative safety. Copy your old System Folder over to your new hard drive, then upgrade it to the new System software. While every troubleshooting tip ever written will tell you not to do this, many of us still do. Doing it in this fashion is one way to protect yourself against the potentially disastrous results of this bad practice. (NOTE: That's not advocating the practice, just admitting to the problem.)

### **Two Good Boots**

You don't have to be changing

MacOS versions to enjoy the advantages of two separate boot drives. If you have two separate, current System Folders on two separate drives, you can rest a little easier. You'll always have a drive you can boot from, no matter what disaster befalls your other one. That increases the chances that you can salvage or totally recover the files from the first drive.

### **Easier Maintenance**


Along with the above, having two drives to boot from can be a big convenience when it comes to disk maintenance. Some of the advantages above can be duplicated or approximated by having one drive formatted into two or more partitions. But while those partitions appear as different drives on your desktop, they reside on the same mechanism. As a result, you can't run Disk First

Aid, Norton Utilities, TechTool Pro, or Disk Warrior from them to work on the drive. Bootable CD-ROMs are another way to achieve the same result, but when one of your maintenance programs is updated, you either have to buy the new CD-ROM or burn a new one yourself.

A separate drive, with all of your maintenance applications on both drives, and regularly updated, allows you to boot from one to work on the other and vice versa. Yes, it is a little bit of duplicated storage, but you won't care if it saves you from the loss of your data. Besides, with today's cheap, large drives, you'll hardly miss that space.

### Backup!!!

Last but not least is the issue of backup. With a second drive, you can Continued on page 5

learned Photoshop to stay current in their profession. They are far more than teachers who have had a quick Photoshop course and are one chapter ahead of the students.

The courses cost less than those traveling one-or-two day seminars that come through town, *and* the cources provide more content and a much better chance of absorbing it. Regretfully, at those intense seminars, you get so overflowingly filled with information that the mere act of walking to your car causes lots of it to splash out and be lost forever. The semester approach will allow you to get more knowledge and retain it longer.

The labs are half Mac and half Windows with one machine for each of about 20 students. Get there early for the first meeting to make sure you're seated at a machine type of your preference. These courses, which are given at the Southwest Campus (also referred to as the West Loop Campus) fill up rapidly. The Macs are generally

the blue-and-white G3s with 17-inch Apple monitors, although a couple of labs now have G4s and the new transparent 17-inch monitors. With all due respect to Steve Jobs and style, I prefer *not* to be constantly aware that parts of my anatomy are very close to 15,000 potentially lethal volts, but girls apparently think they look cute.

You can do some checking online at their main site at http://www.hccs.cc.tx.us. A visit to a campus is also recommended because there are course changes that are not posted online until the course is not only all filled, but probably all over. The site has maps, insufficient other data and is badly organized if you're trying to find courses.

The Southwest Campus, on Loop 610 just south of Micro Center (in the old "Incredible Universe" site), is far better arranged and shows the schedules for other centers as well as their own. http://swc2.hccs.cc.tx.us/tecc

The Photoshop courses are hidden under the category GRPH and are Digital Imaging I and Digital Imaging II, etc. Not all Digital Imaging courses are totally Photoshop (deep sigh at this point), so read the course description.

To get the benefit of these courses, it's recommended that you have your own computer with a Zip drive and Photoshop—at least version 5 or 5.5—so you can work at home. The school probably won't go to version 6.0 until next summer. A color inkjet printer is not mandatory; you can get by with a laser printer. But color is a big help for proofing your work. Photoshop, after all, is mostly about color.

A scanner is also my recommendation. There is one scanner per lab and you'll find yourself waiting around a lot for your turn to use it. These days there are multiple deals on Umax scanners that will let you purchase a new flat-bed USB model complete with Mac software, frequently under \$30. It's good enough to learn on for the kind of work you will be doing. A \$600 scanner won't give you an advantage because this is about learning technique. You'll also need a few Zip disks to save your work between classes.

use anything from the heavy-duty commercial offerings such as Retrospect right down to the simplest shareware backup applications and not have to think about changing removable media, labeling it, or anything else. You always have two copies of your important material stored on two different drives.

Or, you can implement the most sophisticated backup scheme possible: Every day or so, just drag your "Documents" folder (or "Data" or whatever you call it) over to the other drive and let it copy. You always have a current copy of your data. Or rename the folder with dates and keep multiple backups so you can revert to earlier data files if necessary. No matter which method you choose, a second hard drive makes it easier.

### What To Buy

Choosing what second hard drive to buy depends on both your needs and on which Mac you have.

External drives are convenient if/when you need to move them from one machine to another but can be limiting because of the kind of hard drive they are. Also, because you're buying the case, power supply, and cable along with the drive, you'll spend \$70 - \$100 more for it when compared with an internal of the same size.

Drive speed is also another consideration. A faster hard drive is required if you're doing any video or audio capture work, and will boot noticeably faster if you install a System Folder on it. If you're just looking for something to use for backup and occasional start-up duties, you can save a little money and go with a slower drive.

If you're running an older Mac, you are probably limited to a SCSI drive. See if your Mac will allow you to install a second internal SCSI drive; if not, you'll need to buy an external.

If you have a newer Mac, you'll need to see what options you have. Drives can be added via USB, FireWire, IDE, or SCSI (if you have a SCSI card installed). iMacs and iBooks don't have any secondary internal drive options. You'll need to go external. Some of the towers have plenty of storage expansion options. The blue & white G3's, for example, support up to three hard drives internally. That amounts to a whole lot of storage without having to spend the extra money associated with external drives.

When you're ready to make your decision, buy the biggest drive you can afford. Thirty, 40, and 50 gig drives are now both common and affordable. Just like RAM, you can never have too much hard drive space.

### The Bottom Line

A second hard drive may not be the sexiest addition to your Mac, but it will do double and even triple duty, is affordable, is easy to install, requires no learning curve, and it will be used every day you boot up your Mac. Can you say the same about the other peripherals you are considering?
