OS 10.1: Time to leave OS 9 behind?

The real question I'm sure many of you are asking at this point is if Mac OS X 10.1 is good enough to entice those who haven't yet set themselves up to be Apple's guinea pigs. Let me table the answer to that question briefly first and address the guinea pigs.

Run, don't walk, to your local Apple dealer and get a copy of Mac OS X 10.1 via the Instant Up-To-Date program (and if that's not possible, send in your \$20 for the full Mac OS Up-To-Date upgrade, especially if you need the updated developer tools). The closest I've found to a reason not to upgrade instantly is that the current beta release of Retrospect Client for Mac OS X from Dantz Development can't do a full system restore in 10.1, although Dantz's testing indicates that restoring user-created documents should work.

If you're doing real work on Mac OS X and relying on the Retrospect Client beta, I'd recommend extra caution. Otherwise, 10.1 is better than 10.0 in every way I can see. If it hasn't yet sanded down every rough edge, well, Apple developers are only human too.

Now, for you fence-sitters: I think Apple has done their job in getting Mac OS X ready for prime time with this release, so now the question of whether to make the switch comes down to other variables.

DOES MAC OS X ACTUALLY OFFER YOU ANYTHING USEFUL?

If you're happy with your existing setup and you don't feel the need to start moving toward the future at the moment, there's no shame in sticking with what you're using now. At the same time, Mac OS X 10.1 is good enough that I'm starting to feel excite-

ment—rather than constant irritation—when I play with it on my iBook.

HAVE THE APPLICATIONS YOU NEED BEEN CARBONIZED?

And if they're not carbonized, are the existing versions sufficiently functional under Classic? Here the responsibility falls at least in part to Macintosh developers (there are still problems that only Apple can resolve that may hamper developers). If the applications you need are not ready now, check again at Macworld San Francisco in January of 2002.

WOULD SWITCHING TO MAC OS X MEAN THE LOSS OF PERIPHERALS?

You can always boot back into Mac OS 9, but that shouldn't be necessary for a device you need to use regularly. Driver support for new peripherals CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

iTunes 2, introduced with Apple's new iPod, is now available as a free download. Currently the showcase of Apple's digital hub strategy, the music player adds a 10-band equalizer with 22 presets, a crossfader for smooth transitions between songs, and automatic synchronization with the iPod. The update also boasts CD burning at twice the speeds of the original version.

Netscape Communications has released **Netscape 6.2**, bringing full Mac OS X compatibility and fixing bugs. The new version exists as an application package for Mac OS X, which means installation is merely a matter of dragging the Netscape file to your hard disk. A number of problems have been fixed, such as slug-

gish performance on dual-processor Power Macs and LDAP functionality. Netscape 6.2 requires a PowerPC 604e running at 266 MHz or faster, with at least 64 MB of RAM and Mac OS 8.5 or later. The Mac OS X version is a 16.9 MB download; the Mac OS 9 version downloads just needed modules, so be prepared for a potentially lengthy installation process. http://home.netscape.com/computing/download/

Lemke Software has updated GraphicConverter, its popular shareware image-editing application, adding support for even more image file formats and incorporating bug fixes. GraphicConverter 4.1 adds support for importing JPEG2000 and Nokia .pict images, and improves TIFF importing. The program also supports ColorSync profiles during printing, adds an unsharp mask (image sharpening) feature, and improves functionality under Mac OS X. GraphicConverter 4.1 is a free upgrade for registered users; the shareware price is \$35.

MacDict provides online dictionary, translations

MacDict is a cool freeware program that lets you use dictionary, thesaurus and other reference servers on the internet. Your reference books will never be out of date again!

Simple to use, and fast, simply select "Any", "All" or 11 different internet dictionary databases, type in a word or phrase and click the "Go!" button. In my test, I selected "All", looked up the word "computer" and received four responses from four servers in less than two seconds. After you receive the responses to your query, a simple drop menu at the right of the window lets you select each of the definitions from the different servers your word or phrase was found on.

Databases include: Elements Database Webster's Revised Unabridged Dictionary, WordNet, U.S. Gazetteer,

Jargon File, Dictionary of Computing, Easton's Bible Dictionary, Hitchcock's Bible Names Dictionary, The Devil's Dictionary, C.I.A. World Factbook, and V.E.R.A. Virtual Entity of Relevant Acronyms.

If that's not enough for you, there's two translation dictionaries as well. Translate words and phrases to and from English, German, Dutch, French, Spanish, Italian, Danish, Swedish, Finnish, Norwegian, Portuguese, Frisian, Afrikaans, Hungarian, Czech, Esperanto and Latin using "Translate."

Or use the "BabelFish" option to translate long phrases or entire paragraphs between any of these languages. (From the Douglas Adams Hitchhiker series, the Babel Fish was "small, yellow, leech-like and probably the oddest thing in the universe." It could instantly translate any form of communication if you put one in your ear).

As a test, I had Babel Fish translate

"Fred, the dead, red fish" to French and German. In French, it's "Fred, morts et rouges les poissons", and in Geman, "Fred, die toten, roten Fische." Oh, it appears proper punctuation can be very important to the results of your translation.

MacDict is available for download at http://www.bainsware.com along with several other free and inexpensive programs. It comes with a registration utility, and registration is encouraged but free. The author does note that donations are appreciated. And I think that most users will find MacDict useful enough to voluntarily donate a few dollars toward the development of new, cool software.

should continue to improve, although I wouldn't put money on particularly elderly peripherals being supported.

ARE YOU WILLING TO INVEST THE TIME IN LEARNING & CONFIGURING

OS X is a whole new operating system, complete with a whole new set of quirks and foibles. It takes time to read the mailing lists for configuration tips and to hunt down the shareware utili-

ties that eliminate interface irritations. But there's an undeniable satisfaction in getting a system just right, and doing that in classic Mac OS hasn't been particularly challenging for some time.

Whatever you decide, rest assured that Apple is serious about improving Mac OS X and standardizing on it. This new version shows what Apple can do. I have increasingly high hopes that future versions will finish playing catch-up with Mac OS 9 and start forging new ground.



And start planning ahead for the January Swap Meet.


