Apple to Unleash Panther It

Macintosh's latest operating system will be released at 8pm Friday, October 24–dubbed the **Night of the Pan-ther**–during the Apple Store's demonstation of the more than 150 innovations in OS 10.3.

While Panther ranks as the fourth major update of OS X in three years, users still await delivery of the Service Pack 2 update for Windows XP and Microsoft executives have conceded it will be three more years before their 64-bit OS, code-named "Longhorn," comes out. What's Inside

The iChatAV "How-to"

There's nothing new about using a computer for video conferencing, which is just transmitting video images, text and audio. But while Apple's new iChatAV video conferencing software (http: //www.apple.com/ichat/) has no unique features, it does have that special Macintosh *feel*.

This article explains how to use the "AV" part of iChatAV, and assumes that you already know iChat's basics, and have an instant messenger account, either AOL's AIM or Apple's "dot-Mac," and–of course–already have a user ID.

The fundamental difference between iChat (free with OS 10.2) and iChatAV (\$29.95) is the addition of the Audio menu bar choice, and the Video tab in iChatAV's preferences, both of which give the user more control.

Perhaps iChatAV's most visible change is its green microphone video button (next to your buddies' names), which indicates whether *they too* have iChatAV, and *if* their cameras are active. (The button changes from a microphone to a camera.)

One critical consideration: iChatAV's video *does* demand a broadband (DSL or Cable) connection. Use of a dial-up modem is stultifying, but possible. **Audio:** Any audio source can be selected–internal or external; from a camcorder, from a USB sound converter, even from a CD player. Audio is a low-bandwidth item, and needs only a modem.

Video: While iChatAV's designed to use only FireWire (IEEE 1394) cameras (which give excellent video quality), almost any digital camcorder will work. Notwithstanding its so-so image quality, Apple's own otherwise excellent iSight camera will do, and sells for just \$149.

Apple prefers you *not* use one of the many available USB webcams, but you can.

Oh, and if you have an older G3 Mac that runs less than 600MHz, again, Apple says don't, but again, there are ways. With the right equipment, it's just "plug and play," in the typical Mac manner. You can adjust video size, bandwidth, and such to improve transmission (streaming).

Connecting: Making a good audio and video connection can prove problematic. Sometimes, two parties just won't "talk." Sure, text chat is nearly flawless, but add audio's complexity and video's data load Well, a lot can go wrong. However, if at first you don't succeed, try, try again. Eventually, even I can usually make a connection.

Getting around the Limits:

Apple has published suspect hardware requirements for iChat. Truth is, *any* G3 Mac has enough raw power for iChatAV, as do even older 604 PowerMacs. Perhaps Apple just hopes to sell more Macs.

Other AV conferencing programs *will* run on much older machines; CU-SeeMe, the granddad of all AV conferencing (which I was using in 1996) and Internet Phone work on even very old 68K Macs!!

To get iChatAV to function on your older FireWire and G3 Macs, or to use USB webcams, you'll need two pieces of software:

Application Enhancer Installer (www.unsanity.com/products.php) and macam (http://webcamosx.sourceforge.net.

Application Enhancer (freeware) is a "haxie," a third-party module that extends and/or enhances the way applications work.

The macam (NO CAPITAL "M," *pleeze.*) plug-in (also freeware) lets your Mac use most USB Web-cams *and it* dispenses with Apple's G3 Mac limitation!

Haxies should, however, be used with great care and trepidation, since they *do*-dum-duh-dum-dum-"change the system." I can report, however, no problems whatsoever using Application Enhancer Installer and maxim together with iChatAV on my G3 Firewire Powerbook running OS 10.2.6.

Those who can afford a new Mac and FireWire camera, can't go wrong with iChatAV, given its intuitive Mac interface and all. For those who don't want that expense (or for those who want a more "industrial-strength" program), excellent alternatives exist–see www.pure-mac.com/intphone.html. *Email Joe at*

Dave helps me determine how to best extract a broken-off screw from an expensive water faucet that I don't yet want to replace. And he searches high-and-low, finding just the right hex-head piece to make

So what does this hardware store have (besides great service) that would cause one to drive some distance, if you don't live just right around the corner?

Dave points out that, in addition to having 2,112 colors of high-quality TrueValue paint, they custom-match paint, that they're expert glass cutters and window screen replacers, and that they carry a large selection of metric nuts and bolts.

I notice that, unlike the big box depots, Southwest TrueValue lets me buy those nuts and bolts in onesiesand-twosies, not just in packs of, say, 10, nine of which I'll probably never use.

Besides which, Dave's a Mac guy.


