
Celebrate HAAUG's 30th anniversary!

Why is HAAUG Relevant?

In 1978, a group of people who were ham radio operators decided to form a group devoted to the emerging personal computer. The group grew into the Houston Area Apple Users Group. HAAUG, along with a number of Apple centered users groups around the country, are now turning thirty. HAAUG is still the largest and most active Apple users group in Texas. Our PC brethren of HAL-PC are also celebrating the big three-0.

The question that all users groups are facing is relevance. As I related at the last meeting, I was loading my car with the equipment that we use and I began to wonder why I was a member of HAAUG. My first thought was because of the friends that I have made. I consider all members of HAAUG my friends. The second is the access to the combined knowledge base of the group. Third is the main presentations, and fourth, since I've been president is my chance to spout off monthly in the Apple Barrel.

That answers the question about why I am still a member, but not whether the group is relevant. The software and hardware companies seem to think that they do not need us to introduce their products because of the Internet. Apple no longer needs users groups to distribute OS updates. If you are using OS X it alerts you when there is an update. With the Internet, small software developers have sites like Version Tracker to distribute their products. I feel that the real reason that groups like HAAUG survive is that users still need help figuring out their machines. Both Apple and Microsoft have labored very hard to make using these great tools easy. Apple users tend to think that the Apple OS is easier and better than that other OS. But some parts of the software are like a book written in code. You follow the directions but it does not perform as advertised, or you do not understand the directions. That is where a users group shines; you have a chance to ask a friend about your problem. If they don't know they can find someone who does. In my opinion that beats the Internet hands down.

Humans are social and seek groups for interaction. That is what HAAUG offers. It fulfills the need for us to get out of our houses and meet with folks that have similar interests. HAAUG does it better than the Internet. One of the advantages is the instant feedback to questions. I can't say that the information is 100% correct but there is not the back and forth that can happen on E-mail or forums. HAAUG offers Special Interests Groups that cover a single subject, and it is easy to start a session. I think users groups are relevant today, though the form may change over the years.

I would like to announce a new Mac user. Xavier Nicholas Alexander was born on August 29th. Xavier is the son of Tamara and Jason Alexander. Tamara is a board member and has been managing the HAAUG website and the Apple Barrel. The parents and son are reported doing fine. We wish them all well.

Right-Click: The Often Overlooked Treasure

"I'd switch to a Mac, but I couldn't imagine giving up the right-click." This lament of a PC user is a broad and correctable misconception. Right-click functionality has been built into OS X since 2001, so third-party mice would work. Even though you don't clearly see it, the Macintosh mouse has had built-in right-click since August 2005.

This article is only about **right-click**, so we will ignore the clickable customizable scroll-ball and side-button features of the Mighty Mouse. The magic of touch-sensitive technology transforms this seamless top shell into a two-button wonder, in wired or wireless versions. The primary use of the right-click feature is to access contextual menus, a feature that has been in the Mac operating system since OS 8.0 (control-click of the mouse was the alternative). Be sure it is set to "Secondary."

"Contextual menus" are menus that can be brought up virtually anywhere by clicking the right mouse button. Many programs implement this very well, Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and Apple Mail being among those that do. The Finder also has this feature, which consists of commands such as "Eject" and "New Folder". You can choose how to view a folder, where to arrange the icons, and more. Both operating systems can "show info", or "get info" on an icon if you right-click on it, and both can also give you help if you need it, simply by right-clicking and selecting "Help" from the menu that pops up. You can actually change your desktop pattern by right-clicking on the desktop.

Most people have never even heard of these menus. One favorite use of the contextual menu comes in the dock while iTunes is open. Right-click on the iTunes icon and you will get a menu that displays the currently playing song, as well as options to pause, go to the next song, go to the previous song, show iTunes in the Finder, or quit iTunes. If you've never tried the contextual menu before, you can try it now. Point to a picture on the site, and right-click. A menu should pop up, asking what you want to do with the picture. Or, point to an open app in the dock and right-click, and you will get a menu of open documents in that app and the option to quit the app. Drag a folder into the dock, right-click it, and you can browse the folder quickly and easily. Want to empty the trash? Right-clicking it will give you that option. Contextual menus are a great way to do things faster and more efficiently on your Mac. They also give you some added functionality to programs, while just giving you easier access to frequently-used commands in others. Overall, contextual menus are very useful. If you haven't considered using them, try them out. You just may start asking yourself how you could have lived without them.

If contextual menus don't do all that you want, you can enhance them. Abracode's free Shortcuts lets you perform contextual-menu magic. After launching Shortcuts, its Assign Hot Keys screen presents you with a list of current contextual menu items, divided into the type of action each performs: actions on text (Spotlight searches, third-party text-munging tools), on files (Automator actions, third-party file manipulation tasks), or on folders (similar to files). To assign a keyboard shortcut to a contextual menu action, you simply choose it from the pop-up menu; a dialog will appear asking you to press the desired shortcut. (An item displayed in red in one of the pop-up menus means you've already assigned a shortcut to that item.)

But, there is more. If you are using any version of Windows through Boot Camp, Parallels or VMware, then the right-click will continue to work in the same way that PC users have been accustomed to all along. In fact, in addition to the Mac Mighty Mouse, the right-click feature will work with virtually any USB mouse that has this feature in Mac, Windows or Linux mode. As you can see, right-clicking is a real treasure on the Mac. Hopefully, you will never look at it the same, and be able to enhance your control and enjoyment during daily computer use.



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Big Book of Apple Hacks

Review from the Lawrence Apple Users Group

If you are an experienced Mac user, you probably start wondering about the way things are. Why did Apple do something this way? Why can't iTunes play AVI files? What does this 'Automator' thing do? In the past, there have not been any decent books for experienced Mac tinkerers; a large gap existed between "Macs for Dummies" one one end and professional programming guides on the other. Luckily, "The Big Book of Apple Hacks" by author Chris Seibold has stepped in to fill this gap very nicely.

Overall, this is an interesting book, with a wide variety of hacks, ranging from relatively simple and harmless (customizing icons) to intermediate (changing the default Safari error page) to downright complex hardware hacks that may require some handiness with a soldering iron (as well as steady nerves). Some of the hacks aren't really hacks at all, but rather short tutorials on interesting topics, such as how to use BitTorrent or how to simulate a static IP address with a dynamic IP service.

The book is laid out by general topic, rather than difficulty, with topics for Safari, the iPhone, AppleTV, iPods, and so forth. Each topic has a half dozen or more hacks, and the book overall has dozens of hacks. It is a very detailed and long book, and is an excellent value given the enormous breadth of data contained therein.

I made direct use of the book by following the hack to install a web browser on my Apple TV. Unfortunately, the book stumbled a bit here. This involved essentially making a special bootable USB flash drive and booting the AppleTV from this device, called a patchstick. The instructions in the book were a lot longer and more confusing then they had to be, and the first attempt, following the book's instructions to the letter failed. I then followed the instructions contained in the actual patchstick download itself (not provided by the book) and it worked fine; however, it left my AppleTV with a working web browser — and an extraneous menu item for something called Jamen — an unpleasant surprise not mentioned in the book.

I do not want to 'ding' this book too much for my poor experience with their AppleTV hack, as by its nature this kind of thing will not work perfectly every time. You have to be willing to experiment to really enjoy the book, and the other hacks I tried worked flawlessly. Even for the hacks I didn't need or want to try were enjoyable to read about; if nothing else the book will give you ideas and inspiration for your own computer use.

Note that this book is not for beginning or even intermediate Mac users. While some of the hacks are not difficult, they all have the potential to screw up your system, and while an intermediate user is probably OK, especially with a few of the topic-based tutorials, this book is really meant for an experienced user who is not afraid to get his or her hands dirty...and who always has an up-to-date backup of their system available for the inevitable screw-ups! It is also worth noting that the world of computers changes quickly, and portions of the book have already become out of date with new Mac OS and hardware releases. So, check the book's web site and as always, backup before playing!

Summary: A good overall guide filled with interesting ways to expand and enhance your Apple equipment for experienced users.

Pluses: Good mixture of easy and difficult 'hacks', very engaging writing style, lots of very useful ideas

Minuses: Some hacks were incompletely documented, quickly out of date.

HAAUG Board of Director's Meeting - Tuesday, July 1, 2008

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Rex Covington, David Crook, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Mike King (via iChat), Barbara Long, Rick Roberts, and Doug Smith (via iChat).

Call to order: 6:34 p.m. by President Philip Booth.

General Announcements/General Meeting Recap: The June General Meeting was held at Bellaire Civic Center. Approximately 50-55 people attended the meeting. Unfortunately, the speaker scheduled for the Main Presentation was not available.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary: The minutes of the board meeting held on June 3, 2008, were unanimously approved as submitted.

Treasurer – Barbara Long: Barbara presented the final May 2008 and the preliminary June 2008 financial reports. At the end of May 2008, HAAUG had a bank balance of \$10,430.97, a month-to-date loss of \$266.94 and a year-to-date loss of \$288.40. As of the end of June 2008, HAAUG had a bank balance of \$10,033.14, and a preliminary month-to-date loss of \$397.83, and a preliminary year-to-date loss of \$686.23. A final report for June 2008 will be issued at a later date after receipt of all June financial activity. No Boutique sales occurred in May or June.

The Audit Committee, whose members are Phil Booth, Jim Connell and Mike King, will meet in July, possibly at the Swap Meet, to conduct the 2008 audit of the financial records.

1st Vice President – Doug Smith: In July HAAUG will hold its semi-annual Swap Meet. The topic for the Main Presentation at the August General Meeting is JoeSoft's STOX, a stock portfolio tracking software program. David Crook suggested that the owner of Laser Inc., one of the advertisers in the Apple Barrel, might be willing to make a presentation on resolving printer problems at a future General Meeting.

2nd Vice President – Matt Willmore: The July Swap Meet will be held at the Hilton University of Houston Hotel. The Swap Meet link on the HAAUG website is working, and Matt has received a couple of reservations for tables. The Bellaire Civic Center is not available on the third Saturday in August. Phil anticipates that the University Center at the University of Houston will be available as the venue for the August General Meeting. HAAUG will return to Bellaire Civic Center for the September General Meeting.

SIG Coordinator – Rick Roberts: Because of the Swap Meet, no SIGs will be held at the July meeting. Rick reported that he is experiencing a dearth of General Meeting SIGs. He is receiving requests for SIGs--in particular, for video editing--but no one is volunteering to lead the SIGs being requested. The Quicken

SIG that Clair Jaschke leads has received positive feedback. Rick thinks that a SIG about software that can be used to make a living, such as QuickBooks, would be well received. David Crook's SIG will now be called "Windows on Your Mac."

Apple Barrel Editor– Tamara Alexander: Phil stated that we need to find a replacement for Tamara Alexander--someone who wants to do desktop publishing.

Webmaster - Jeff Davis: No report.

Membership – David Jaschke: HAAUG had 255 members at the end of June, a decrease of three members from June 2007. One new member joined HAAUG in June, and last month two members renewed their membership, one renewing for two years.

HAAUG Heaven Forum/HAAUGNet—We had one new registrant in June. The servers are working well.

MacFest 2008 and 30th Anniversary Celebration Committee:

Rex Covington reported that, except for Bob LeVitus, none of the speakers we had hoped to get for MacFest 2008 are available on the alternate dates in the fall that he has proposed to them. As a result, the general consensus of the board is that it will not be possible to hold MacFest this year. Bob LeVitus will be asked to speak at the September General Meeting, which will be a celebration of HAAUG's Thirtieth Anniversary. David Jaschke will also make a presentation on the history of HAAUG. We will invite the charter members of HAAUG to attend. Bellaire Civic Center is booked for the General Meeting on September 20, 2008.
