


WWDC also brought new MacBook Pro's with bumped-up specs and the introduction of the 13" MacBook Pro, formerly the unibody MacBook. What's in Your Dock?

Sharing and learning with one another.

One of my favorite things to do when talking with other Mac users is to look at their Dock. I know it sounds voyeuristic but I'm always interested to know what apps people can't live without, and to share what apps I love using. I think it'd be great if other people shared a picture of their Dock and explained the unfamiliar icons. This is what HAAUG is about at its core – sharing and learning with one another!



Safari – My browser of choice. I don't run it with any plug-ins or libraries or hacks, but I do have the Develop window enabled. This adds some Web developer controls that normal users wouldn't normally need, like the ability to change the "user agent" -- basically what Safari tells a Web server it is. If you've ever run into a Web site that turned its nose up at Safari, many times it'll work fine if you just have Safari tell a little white lie. Mail – My mail client of choice. I've tried all of them in the past, but one thing that Mail does that I love is the ability to have a common inbox with all my mail in one place, something that's rare or nonexistent outside of Mail. I do use one plug-in here – it's called Letterbox, and it gives me three vertical panes instead of the message content sitting below the list of messages. This is great for widescreen monitors, and I can see more of each pane at once. Adium – Developed by Even Schoenberg (@evands) and the Adium team, I use this chat client instead of iChat because it's 1000x more customizable and does exactly what I need it to. I have my AIM, .Mac, ICQ, Google Talk and Facebook accounts all signed in at once and it handles everything seamlessly for me. It supports every chat client imaginable, including MSN and Yahoo!. The only downside? No audio or video chats. For that, I jump back to iChat. The Web site adiumxtras.com contains thousands of themes, icons (like my iconic Domo-Kun – Japan's Mickey Mouse), sounds and plugins for Adium – and everything's free and open source. You can download it at adium.im.




NetNewsWire – This is the quintessential Mac RSS news reader. I have roughly 160 feeds that I subscribe to with NetNewsWire and it's been my favorite ever since I starting using RSS. Brent Simmons (inessential.com, @brentsimmons) is its developer, and after NNW was bought by NewsGator, they released NNW as a free client. You can also have NNW sync with the free iPhone client and the NewsGator Web site, making it very easy to catch up on your sites wherever you are. NetNewsWire can be downloaded from www.newsgator.com.



OmniFocus – Back before OmniFocus existed, I used their OmniOutliner program, which is a great outlining tool and still available today. A developer named Ethan Schoonover (kinkless.com,@ethanschoonover) developed a set of AppleScripts called Kinkless GTD, which extended OmniOutliner's abilities to let you manage tasks according to the Getting Things Done (GTD) method developed by David Allen (davidco.com, @gtdguy). It was so popular that The Omni Group (omnigroup.com, @OmniGroup) hired Ethan to help make OmniFocus, which is a dedicated task organizer that follows the GTD method strongly. I use this for all my personal tasks (to-do's, grocery lists, world domination plans) and other responsibilities (HAAUG, Scouting, etc.). OmniFocus retails for \$79.95, and there's an iPhone version that can be synced or used independently for \$19.95 on the App Store.

iTunes – Despite the minor imperfections people like to whine about incessantly, it's still the best app for managing my music, TV shows, podcasts and movies, and essential for corralling all that media goodness onto my iPod, iPhone and Apple TV.

Evernote (@evernote) – a very cool app for managing everything in your brain. It's a giant dumping ground for all the paperwork, notes, to-do lists, etc. that have been floating around your desk, your head and your inbox. You can search, tag, organize and file to your heart's content, and it automatically syncs everything to their servers. Because of this, you can retrieve and search for that data on your iPhone or other mobile device, the Evernote Web site and any other Mac or Windows machine with Evernote installed. If you add scanned documents as images, their servers will perform OCR on the text and let you search that too (there's no OCR support for a scanned PDF document, but you can search the text of documents saved as PDF's). To top it off, the basic service (40 MB of synched data per month) is free. If you don't want to sync, you can store and organize until your hard drive explodes. Evernote is available as a free download at evernote.com; the unlimited Premium plan is \$5/month or \$45/year.



System Preferences – This is self-explanatory, but I find myself changing things so often that I like to have it there all the time. I have extra control panels installed for Flip4Mac (lets me watch Windows Media files in QuickTime player) and my MySQL databases.

Terminal – Over the years I've developed a habit of using the command line to dig around the system, and truthfully some things are just faster in UNIX if you know what you're doing. Here's a good Web site to start with if you're completely unfamiliar: http://www.osxterminal.com/

On the right half of the Dock, I keep three things at all times – a Numbers spreadsheet to track my weight loss progress, the Downloads folder (sorted by Date Added, so all the new stuff is automatically at the bottom) and the Documents folder.

Writing this, I realize there's so much more to talk about in the Apple Barrel and at our meetings. I'll expand on some of these apps in future issues of the AB; in the meantime, I encourage you submit your Dock and your favorite apps. Let's all learn from each other!

What's in your iTunes library?

We always talk about what apps we use on our Mac – the best email client, your favorite FTP client... that's no fun! Here's a better question – what's in your iTunes library? I think the TV, music, movies and even games we have on our devices tells a lot about ourselves, and there's always surprises in there. I'll share some of my recent finds and would love for other HAAUG members to share theirs, too.

TV Shows

Top Gear just started its 13th season on BBC 2 in the UK. I am endlessly entertained by the reviews and contests, but it's like watching The Fast and the Furious – you can't help but want to go out and drive like a Formula 1 driver after seeing an episode. There's a few ways to watch it:

- 1. BBC America broadcasts an edited version that makes room for commercials and changes the soundtrack to American-licensed tunes.
- 2. Personally, I prefer the original 60-minute UK version, which is readily available via BitTorrent. It is, in fact, the most downloaded show in the world, and for good reason.
- 3. You can purchase US-edited seasons 10, 11 and 12 on the iTunes Store.

Music (everything mentioned is available on iTunes)

I've always thought my music tastes were pretty eclectic, but when you find a really good song or album you don't care who hears it, just as long as they hear it, right? I'm into a lot of indie rock music – more or less the music that mainstream radio will have watered down imitations of in 6-9 months. Right now I'm listening to Phoenix's (@wearephoenix) fifth album Wolfgang Amadeus Phoenix – they're like a French pop-rock version of Band of Horses or Hot Chip, and have a great drive in their songs that gets you going. I recommend the first track "Listzomania" to start. I also like Keane (@keaneofficial) – they're a British piano rock band with a fantastic lead singer and great lyrics. Their new album Perfect Symmetry is worth a listen, though I like their previous album Under the Iron Sea better.

iPhone/iPod touch Games

I think the iPhone and iPod touch are great gaming platforms for those 2 minutes in the elevator or when the driver runs into the store. I often find myself spending the last few minutes of a lunch break playing Solitaire (\$0.99) or FlightControl (@flightcontrol, developer is @firemint) (\$0.99), a very addictive game where you direct planes to land on respective runways as they enter the screen. It sounds really easy, but small airspace and continuous traffic make it pretty tricky as you continue to land. There's even a function to upload your score against players from around the world. I've also been playing Enigmo (\$2.99), a game by Pangea (makers of Cro-Mag Rally and that amazing Firefall pinball game on Mac OS 9) that has you directing one or more streams of water into their respective buckets, using only the few tools given. Again, it sounds simple but some of the solutions are very tricky. (If you get really stuck, there are solutions on YouTube.)

I'd love to see other HAAUG members share what's in their iTunes library – who's next?



Minutes

HAAUG Board of Director's Meeting - Tuesday, April 7, 2009

Location: Industrial Audio/Video, Inc., 2617 Bissonnet Street, Houston, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, David Crook, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Mike King, Barbara Long (via iChat), Doug Smith (iChat), and Matt Willmore.

Call to order: 6:43 p.m. by President Matt Willmore, a quorum of voting members of the board being present at the meeting.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Jim Connell: The minutes of the board meeting held on February 3, 2009, were unanimously approved as submitted.

Treasurer – Barbara Long: All bills received have been paid. HAAUG has approximately \$8,000 in the bank. General ledger reports for March will be sent to the board shortly. Barbara is working on setting up the financial records for 2009.

1st Vice President – Open: The following have been scheduled for the main presentations at upcoming General Meetings:

April 18—"Welcome to Macintosh" Documentary. May 16—Lisa Snider King on Adobe CS4 and her new book, CS4—The Missing Manual.

Doug Smith will get the travel details for Lisa Snider King.

2nd Vice President – David Crook: Bellaire Civic Center is booked for the April General Meeting. Phil Booth reported that the Hilton University of Houston Hotel is not available for the July Swap Meet because the hotel ballrooms are undergoing renovation. Bellaire Civic Center has been reserved for the July Swap Meet. Phil reported that the supply of tables at Bellaire Civic Center is sufficient to meet the needs of the Swap Meet. When Barbara receives a contract for use of Bellaire Civic Center for the April General Meeting, she will prepare a check for the meeting fee and give it to Clair and David Jaschke. David Crook suggested publicizing the Swap Meet to boost attendance and using the occasion to promote a recycling campaign on the day of the meeting. He suggested notifying e-Waste in Lake Jackson and putting a notice of the recycling effort on the HAAUG website. Phil noted that recycling efforts should be coordinated with the Bellaire Recycling Committee and City of Bellaire. David and Phil will be responsible for contacting the appropriate officials.

SIG Coordinator – Rick Roberts: No report.

Apple Barrel Editor-Tamara Alexander: No report.

Webmaster – Jeff Davis: No report.

Membership – David Jaschke: HAAUG had 228 members (217 regular members, 2 student members and 9 lifetime members) at the end of March 2009, down from 269 members at the end of March 2008 and from 230 members at the end of February 2009. Twenty members renewed their membership, and two new members joined during March. David Crook suggested contacting

non-renewing members by telephone to see whether they will renew and, if not, why they are not renewing. The board tabled the suggestion for the consideration of the Vision Committee.

HAAUG Heaven Forum/HAAUGNet—Robert Lacey: No report.

OLD BUSINESS:

Advertising: Clair Jaschke reiterated her suggestion that in its promotional activities HAAUG advertise what it does (e.g., support for iPod) more prominently than its name. The board discussed possibly changing the name of the group but decided not to do so. It also considered the suggestion that new members be contacted in advance of the General Meetings and encouraged to attend. The board tabled these ideas for the consideration of the Vision Committee

Vision Committee: Matt reported that Joe Fournet has proposed three possible dates for the next committee meeting: April 14, 15 and 21, 2009. After discussion, the board decided to schedule the next Vision Committee meeting for Wednesday evening, April 15, 2009. Matt will send out an email message about the meeting to the board members.

NEW BUSINESS:

Macfest: Phil Booth will reschedule the meeting of the Macfest Committee.

Membership Survey: Phil Booth has prepared a list of questions for the survey and will work with Matt on finalizing the survey. After discussing various options for online survey services, the board approved the expenditure up to \$40 for an online survey service for the member survey.

Mentor Program: Matt reminded the board that Amy Denton is no longer able to fulfill the responsibilities of Mentor due to her educational workload. The function of Mentor should be handled by email, but the email messages need be better structured so that they can be handled effectively. Jeff Davis currently forwards emails addressed to the Mentor to the person on the board who is most appropriate for handling the matter. The board tabled the issue of the Mentor position to the Vision Committee for further discussion.

Board Meeting Location: David Crook reported that two possible meeting locations for board meetings suggested at the February board meeting have been investigated. David mentioned his favorite coffee shop, but it does not have a separate room. Jim Connell reported that some groups listed in the business calendar in the Sunday Chronicle meet at Texadelphia Restaurant on Westheimer near Fountain View. The restaurant has separate meeting rooms but those rooms may already be booked on the first Tuesday evening of the month. The British Arms Pub on Richmond, Café Express in Uptown, Little Woodrow's and the Black Lab were also mentioned as possible meeting locations. Afternoon traffic congestion on Westheimer and Richmond west of Loop 610 make the locations such as Texadelphia Restaurant and the British Arms

Pub less desirable as meeting locations. The Black Lab suffers from lack of parking in the evenings. Matt asked that Rick Roberts give an update on possible meeting locations to the board at the next meeting.

Audit Committee: Phil Booth, Jim Connell and Matt Willmore agreed to serve on the Audit Committee for the audit of the 2008 financial records of HAAUG. The committee will meet with Barbara Long once she has closed the books for 2008.

Help with Production of the Apple Barrel: Matt reported that Tamara Alexander no longer has time to produce the Apple Barrel due to increased work and family responsibilities. HAAUG needs a new person or group of members who are interested in Adobe InDesign to take over the production of the Apple Barrel as soon as possible. There is an opportunity to redesign the Apple Barrel to be produced in Pages, so more members might participate in its production. Phil Booth suggested that Lyda McGhee, who has recently retired from teaching, might be someone who would be willing to work on the Apple Barrel. David Crook suggested George Soroka as a possible Apple Barrel editor, at least on an interim basis, or asking the One-on-One personnel at one of the Apple Store for possible candidates. Phil suggested contacting Houston Community College and the University of Houston College of Technology for students who might like to gain experience in electronic publishing and build their resumes. Tamara may also know of someone who might be interested. Matt also noted that Tamara no longer has time to update the website. HAAUG might consider using Wordpress or other software options for the website. The board referred the issue of how to handle updating the website to the Vision Committee for further discussion.

"Welcome to Macintosh" Documentary: Matt reported that he has confirmed the showing of the documentary for the main presentation at the April General Meeting with the producers of the documentary. The producers are sending some items to give away at the meeting and also copies of the documentary for sale to members. Popcorn and soft drinks will be served during the showing.

Monthly Meetings
