Another month has flown by, and this has been one for the record books at Apple. At the end of last month, Apple had sold over one million units of the new iPhone 3GS model. Introduced on June 8th, that's roughly 71,500 phones sold *daily*. Keep in mind that this

June 8th, that's roughly 71,500 phones sold daily. Keep in mind that this figure only covers the 3GS and not the now-\$99 3G model, which continues to sell like hot cakes. For those pundits who considered the iPhone a fad, it's time to take the hat off their head and begin chewing.

Dear HAAUG,

Apple has also been setting records on the software side. The final release of Safari 4 was released on the same day as the iPhone 3GS, and three days later had been downloaded over 11 million times. While this pales in comparison to what Firefox and Internet Explorer have achieved, the sheer fact that over 11 million downloads have occurred are a clear sign that Safari has a definite foothold on both Mac and PC desktops. For those of you still running the Safari 4 beta (like myself until a few days ago), the upgrade is worth it. You can find and download Safari 4 for Mac and PC computers at http://www.apple.com/safari.

The most recent record-setting news from Apple came this week when they announced that over 1.5 billion apps had been downloaded from the App Store in the first year. This is great news both for Apple and competing App Stores, like the Palm Pre's, as it demonstrates the correct model to distribute these small single-purpose apps through a unified storefront. Other app stores starting up would be wise to learn from the successes and stumbles of Apple's app store; I expect we will see a high degree of commonality between the stores.

It's been six months since our last Swap Meet, and that means it's time for another one! We'll be holding the Swap Meet Saturday, July 18th at Bellaire Civic Center. I am looking forward to a big turnout and am looking forward to seeing everyone there. Registration is still open for those who wish to sell items at the Swap Meet. 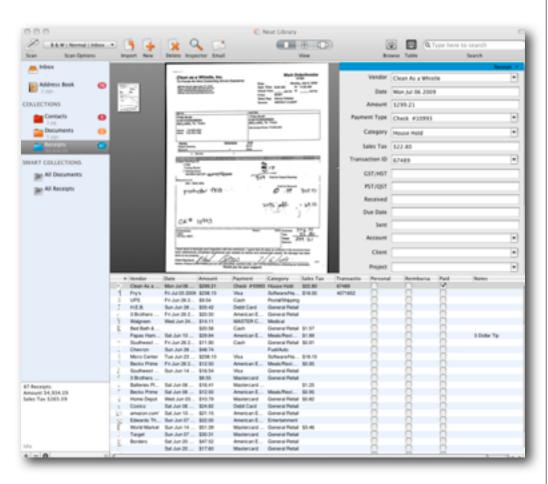

Product Review: NeatWorks

Do you have a box of receipts and had an idea to scan them to PDFs? But unfortunately they're still in the box. Well take a look **NeatWorks** for Mac. NeatWorks will scan and through optical character recognition fill in a database with store name, purchase amount, sales tax and payment method. If you are doing the purchasing for a business you can assign the transaction to a project for reimbursement. The software will export the data to an Excel/ Numbers spreadsheet, or to Quicken or QuickBooks. NeatWorks is a solution to keep you or your business organized. The program will also scan business cards and import the data into your address book, so you don't need to keep those stacks of cards in your desk. If you handle documents like contracts the program can also scan those documents and have a back up for the paper originals.

The software can be purchased with a small (11 x 2 x 1.5 in.) USB scanner that does not require external power that can scan documents up to 8.5" wide. The program will work with other scanners so you can purchase the software without the scanner. That is a savings if you have compatible equipment. Using the Neat scanner is really easy: launch NeatWorks, connect the scanner, position the receipt on the right hand margin and press the scan button. The software then creates a PDF and performs the optical character recognition and the majority of the time will place the vendor, amount, sales tax, payment type and date in the correct field in the database. The software has a great ability to correct if the scan should if come out slanted, but the scanner does a good job of keeping things straight.



QuickTip

Do you have an older scanner and can't find the software to use it with your new Mac? What about scanner software that only runs under Classic or only when the Mac is booted into OS 9?

Hamrick Software's VueScan is a great OS X application that supports 1200+ flatbed and film scanners. VueScan is 10 years old and has become the de facto standard for supporting older (and newer) scanners on your OS X Mac. Hamrick Software has done an excellent job maintaining VueScan — the latest download is already Snow Leopard-ready. There are also versions of VueScan available for Windows and Linux.

VueScan is \$39.95 for the standard version and \$79.95 for the professional version, which adds support for color profiles, color calibration and unlimited free upgrades.

QuickTip

The iPhone (and iPod touch) automatically switch the screen between landscape and portrait mode when you tilt the device. This can be annoying if you want to read a web page or mail message when reclining in a horizontal posture on your side (while, say, lying in bed).

But you can 'lock' the iPhone/ iPod touch in landscape mode by turning it upside down slowly. This is perfect for reading while lying down.

Hold the device in an upright position (default portrait mode). Tilt the device ninety degrees in either direction (switches to landscape mode). Tilt the device another ninety degrees in the same direction, so that it's now upside down. The screen orientation stays in landscape mode, and the text is now aligned for reading on your side in a horizontal position.

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The program's window layout borrows from the iTunes interface with the file containers in the left margin. The main container is called the "Inbox. That is the place where the scans reside until you put them in either the Contacts, Documents or Receipts folders. The program also puts an alias of your address book in the file browser that will allow you to move contacts to your address book. There also smart folders though they are not useful but you can create new smart folders that could gather receipts with a certain date or paid with a specific credit card. The main program controls are in the strip at the top of the window, where you have access to the scanner controls, invoke the document inspector, and change the program views. Below the document window is the inbox where files are listed until moved to other locations.



You can export the data as PDF's, a Quicken interchange file (QIF) or comma separated file (CSV) that can be used by other programs. The Achilles' heel of these programs is that inputting the data can be tedious. Feeding receipts in to the scanner is not fun, or creative, but if you want keep up with your expenses this program could be a help. I find that the scanner is easy to use and the OCR is fairly accurate, making data entry easy. To get more information go to http://

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Just In Case!

When the new iPhone 3GS launched on June 19, I joined those standing in line at the Memorial City Apple Store shortly before 7:00 a.m. About an hour later, with the freshly activated device in hand, I set about looking for a new case in the display at the Apple Store. Actually, I wanted two cases—one to protect the iPhone and another to hold it securely on my belt.

I had learned from owning the original iPhone that the back can scratch and the metal corners are vulnerable to scuffing, if left unprotected. My old belt case had the annoying habit of popping off my belt and landing in the floor, especially upon exiting my car. While the old case protected front and back of my iPhone, it left the shiny metal corners of the device somewhat exposed to damage.

The first Apple Store Specialist who assisted me told me that I could have either a slider case to protect the iPhone or a belt case to hold it, but not both. Weighing my options, I decided that I needed a better belt case and selected the black Leather Folio from Incase (http://www.goincase.com, @goincase). It looks great, offers good protection, fits snugly on my belt and doesn't pop off as my old one did.





But I still wanted something to protect the iPhone when it was not in my belt case. I found just the perfect slider case at another Apple Store. It's the Power Support Black Air Jacket for the iPhone 3G

(www.powersupportusa.com). The Air Jacket is an ultra-thin case that slides over the back of the iPhone, protecting both the back and four corners of the device from scratches, dust and impacts. The back of the case has a rubberized finish that feels good in my hand and provides extra grip. Best of all, even with the Air Jacket slider case, my iPhone still fits snugly inside the Incase Leather Folio. I now have double protection for my new iPhone. One more thing: the Power Support Air Jacket comes with anti-glare and crystal films for the iPhone's screen.

As luck would have it, while it was out of my belt case, I dropped my new iPhone in a parking lot about a week after I got it. It bounced and landed face down. I'm pleased to report that the Power Support Air Jacket protected it perfectly—no a single scratch!

iPhone 3G vs. 3GS

Since there are now multiple iPhone 3G models out there, it can be confusing to decide which one to pick. Here's a cheat sheet between the 3G and new 3GS.

iPhone 3G

- 8GB storage
- · 2 megapixel camera
- Bluetooth
- Wi-Fi
- . 3G network
- . \$99*

iPhone 3GS

- 16GB or 32GB storage
- 3 megapixel camera/ video recorder
- Bluetooth
- Wi-Fi

- Compass
- \$199 or \$299*

The iPhone 3GS adds nice features (video recording, voice control, faster processor) that make it an attractive unit. If you don't plan on using those, though, the iPhone 3G is still as capable as the day it was released; the price is great, too. The iPhone 3G would be a great "starter" iPhone for someone not wanting to invest a lot of money in the phone. You can download and use all the same App Store apps; the only limitations are those not in the 3GS feature list above. If you're not sure, take a field trip to the Apple Store and use both phones for a few minutes. Can you tell the difference? If not, go with the 3G; if you need the speed and features, pick the 3GS.

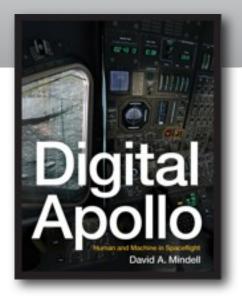

Digital Apollo

Like many of my generation, I am a fan of the space program. I was at camp in Caldwell Texas when Apollo 11 landed on the moon 40 years ago. I have an interest in the history of manned space flight and read many books on the subject. Digital Apollo explores the design and operation of the man machine interface of the Apollo spacecraft. Unlike many of the books in this genre this is not a personal narrative of daring do in space. It is an exploration of the technology used to control, and navigate the spacecraft from the Earth to the moon.

Comparisons are made all the time about the lack of power the computer used by the Apollo spacecraft verses the ones that occupy our laps or desks today. Yes we are running supercomputers compared to the machines that went to the moon. But how many of us would trust going to the moon with our current



desktop machine. The space shuttle flies with 5 redundant computers, and modern fly by wire airliners fly with three. The Apollo spacecraft flew with two computers and they were not redundant. One was in the command module and the other was in the Lunar Module. The primary design specification for the machines was that it had to run for two weeks without failure. How many of us run for that long without encountering some kind of glitch? In the middle of the lunar landing you do not want to see that XYZ program that was controlling your decent quit unexpectedly.

Mindell chronicles the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) group that designed the hardware and software, fighting the constraints of weight and of the technology of the time. It also explored the dichotomy between manual and automatic control of the flight. Prior to the start of the Mercury program, the precursor of NASA, the National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics (NACA) started the X-15 program. The X-15 was a rocket plane that had the ability to reach altitudes that classify it, as being in space. It also had dual control systems, small jets controlled the plane at high altitudes and normal control surfaces in lower altitudes. It was a pilots spacecraft The Mercury spacecraft were being designed for full automatic operation with the astronaut being just a passenger. Many test pilots decided not to apply to the space program because of the perception of the "man in the can" roll for the pilot. The roll of the person was the continuing conflict in the development of the US space program. The astronauts would campaign for a more active roll with the designers and engineers wanting more automation.

As the space program developed pilots found out that flying in space was not the same as flying jet fighters, and engineers found that there was a need for a trained pilot in the spacecraft. The book explores this conflict and the ways the program solved the wants of the pilot balanced with the needs of the program. Even today when the shuttle is launched it is primarily an automated sequence of events. The one event that is still under manual control is the final approach and touch down, even though the craft is fly by wire with control inputs going through a computer that issues the instructions to the control surfaces.

The author follows the politicking and lobbying that the MIT group did to get the contract to build the computers. He explores the design of the man and machine interface, and the further conflicts with the pilots and engineers over control. I got a real feeling about the problems that the designers had as they created the hardware, and writing the software that navigated from the earth to the moon. I found it fascinating that the astronaut's user interface consisted of obscure letters and numbers, realizing that not long after the typical user now points and clicks with a mouse.

The book does devote a section to the actual flights and explains the famous 1202 alarm that Apollo 11 encountered while the Eagle was landing. It also detailed the all of the other glitches that later flights encountered. The book does get somewhat technical but you do not need a degree in computer science to understand it. If the history of space exploration, technology interests you then this book will interest you. The reader will gain a better perspective on what it took to make the voyage from the earth to the moon.

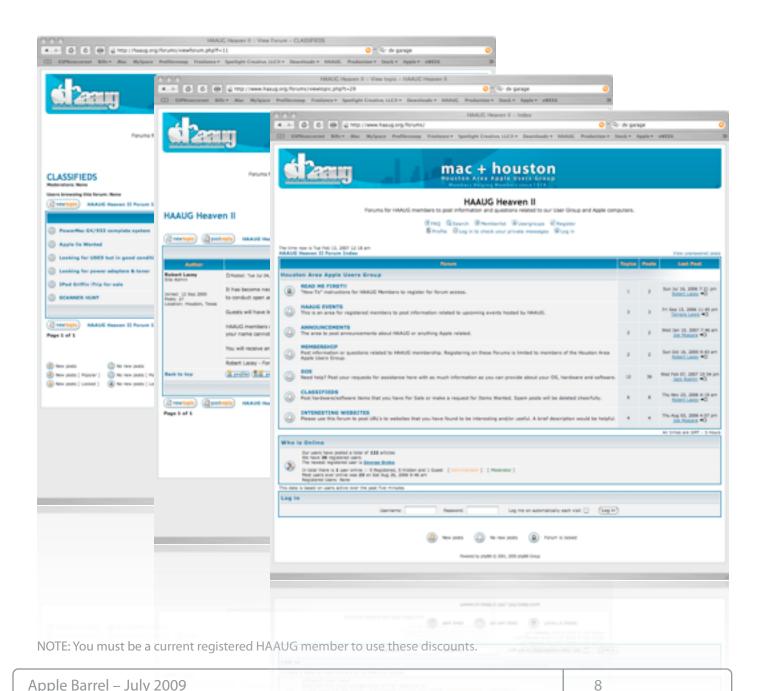

Matt will request Jeff to submit a proposal that would separate the domain hosting from the hosting of the FileMaker database. The board will need to approve any change is web hosts. Monthly Meetings

This is where the excitement begins. On the third Saturday of each month, members of HAAUG meet for a day filled with activities, including presentations by major software and hardware vendors, special interest group (SIG) meetings, public domain software libraries, raffles and much, much more. Swap Meets are held twice each year, in January and July.

Software Libraries

HAAUG maintains public domain and shareware libraries for the Apple II, Macintosh and Newton systems. HAAUG also distributes system software for the Macintosh (7.0.1 and earlier), Newton and all Apple II series computers. HAAUG has been designated by Apple Computer to be the Central United States Repository for Apple II Software.

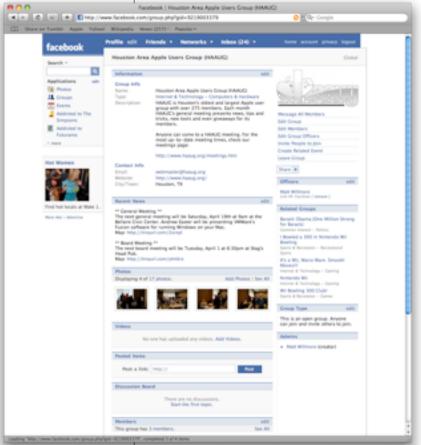
