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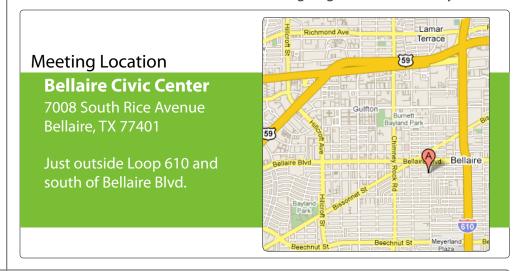

else is too. We have some great topics selected to round out the
year's meetings, including a visit by Reagan Atkinson of the Houston Camera Exchange to talk about
what's new in digital cameras and answer questions for everyone.

Dear HAAUG,

The Mac community continues to be as busy as ever. Apple continues to be an unstoppable force in the industry and there are rumors about new iMacs and matching new mice sometime soon. Is anyone else tired of their Mighty Mouse's scroll wheel being too gunked up to scroll?

HAAUG has been especially busy lately; the end of the year brings about nominations for elections as well as budget planning. I encourage to read everyone's articles this month, as they are all very timely. HAAUG has also changed Web hosts recently, and I want to share some of that back-story with you.

For roughly the past year, HAAUG's Board of Directors has been discussing our Web hosting arrangement. Up until a couple weeks ago, we were hosted at a local ISP and had multiple Mac OS X servers co-located there. Anyone who has experience with having a server co-located at an ISP can tell you it's quite expensive, and ours was no exception. Between our Web server and the HAAUG Hotline phone number, HAAUG's expenses approached \$4,500 annually (at a greatly discounted price, too). For perspective, that is equivalent to 112 full membership renewals every year, just to keep the Web sites and email going. This is a tremendous cost for any non-profit, especially ours. Because of this expense, our funds were being rapidly depleted while using a fraction of the server's resources.

Because of this situation, in August of this year the board approved the transition of all HAAUG online domains, including haaug.org and haaugnet.org, to a shared server at our new ISP MacHighway in Denver, CO. MacHighway is one of the largest Mac-based ISP's nationwide and offer exactly what we were looking for: inexpensive hosting on a Mac with room to grow. At that same committee meeting, an eight-member team was appointed to create a transition plan ensuring everything went smoothly.

Unfortunately, those plans changed when IAPC's parent ISP decide to increase the rates for co-location starting October 1. The decision was then made to vacate IAPC early, necessitating a hasty transition to MacHighway. It was overall a great success, and special thanks should be given to Jeff Davis, Robert Lacey, David Jaschke and everyone on the Web transition committee for their time and effort.

As with all transitions, there have been some hiccups and we aren't completely transitioned yet. Some parts of the Web site still need to be updated and will be back up shortly. Some email passwords were also changed. If you're experiencing any issues or notice anything that seems broken, please email webmaster@haaug.org. You can also visit http://www.haaug.org/hosting/ for more information on the transition and instructions for changing your email server settings.

Thank you to everyone for your patience with us as we make this move. In the long term, this will save HAAUG a tremendous amount of money and allow us to serve our members better as we develop our online community further. Have a great October, and I look forward to seeing you on the 17th!

Cat Tales

(or How I Upgraded My Mac from Tiger to Leopard to Snow Leopard) • Clair Jaschke, Senior Advisor

QuickTip

In Leopard, Software Update gave you the choice

of either downloading or installing an update. Under Snow Leopard, though, the download option is gone; it's install or nothing.

[robg adds: There's a new Update » Go to Apple Download Page menu item in Software Update; every update should be available there for download. While this change simplifies the Software Update app, it does add a step for those who prefer to download updates (for updating multiple Macs, for instance).]

http:// www.macosxhints.com/ article.php? story=20090910162236620 This is the story of how I upgraded my Mac from Tiger to Snow Leopard recently.

Now, I am not an early upgrader. I like to see how a new operating system upgrade works for others before I do it myself and I have been known to skip or delay upgrades before. For example, I never used Mac OS 8.anything or Mac OS X or 10.1. So when Leopard came out and there seemed to be some issues, I waited. I almost upgraded to Leopard this past spring but I heard Snow Leopard was coming out "soon" so I waiting a bit more and I am glad I did.

My Computer Setup at Home

My Mac is a 2-year old Mac mini (Intel). I also have 2 external hard drives. One is a 320 GB hard drive with four partitions for: 1) backups of my Mac mini (using Super Duper), 2) the data from my G5 tower that died two years ago (bad

CPU), 3) backup space for the MacBook I sometimes use, and 4) backups of my Quicken file and other data files for which I want extra backups. The other external hard drive is an lomega 500 GB hard drive with 2 partitions, one large (for Time Machine) and one small for a spare start-up drive; both to be used when I finally upgrade to Leopard.

My Process

To do this upgrade, I took some time off from work to be sure I had plenty of time to prepare (needed to catch up on entering some quarterly statements in Quicken, clean up my Address Book, and such) and have as few interruptions as possible.

When I was ready, the first task was to make a full backup of the Mac mini to its backup partition on the 320 using Super Duper (http://www.shirt-pocket.com/SuperDuper/ SuperDuperDescription.html).

By the way, if you are not using Time Machine for your backups, Super Duper is easy to use and does a good job.



With the backup done, I inserted the Leopard disk and selected the simple upgrade install. I chose this option rather than the other two options because I was going to upgrade to Snow Leopard immediately after the Leopard upgrade was complete. I did customize the Leopard upgrade to not include the printer drivers I did not need. Installation took about 1 to 1-1/2 hours. I did some filing while this upgrade was going on so I could keep an eye on the computer in case of problems. But everything went well.

After the Leopard upgrade and a couple of restarts (one as required and a couple more to test), I started the Snow Leopard upgrade. If you saw Dreux Ste. Marie's presentation on Snow Leopard at the HAAUG meeting in September, remember he said it was an easier installation and created a "leaner meaner" operating system. Well, it was just as easy as Dreux said: no decision to make on what type of upgrade to do and I did not customize the upgrade at all. Installation took less than an hour.

Note: During the installation, Snow Leopard restarted the computer on its own (heard the start-up tone and saw a different screen for a few minutes), then it resumed the installation. This is normal.

Once the Snow Leopard installation was done, I ran Software Update and did all of the updates listed.

Iomega Hard Drive

After I finished with the mini, I tried to install Leopard on the lomega hard drive (small partition) but Leopard did not like my partition scheme. So I used Disk Utilities to redo the partition (no data yet so no problem with that). Apparently, when I partitioned this hard drive before I used the Apple scheme. Leopard wanted the GUID scheme so that is what I used for the new partitions (again one large and one small).

I started up Time Machine and directed it to put the backups on the large partition of the lomega.

The next day I installed Leopard and Snow Leopard on the small "start-up" partition of the lomega drive. Again, Leopard took about an hour and everything went smoothly. Snow Leopard only took about 1/2 hour (including the restart in the middle of the process) and automatically restarted into this partition when the process was complete.

I changed the Start-up Disk in the System Preferences to the Mac mini and restarted.

Other Updates

I also updated iWorks and iLife on both the lomega start-up partition and the mini (family packs) and installed other software and software upgrades I had been putting off because they required Leopard.

Notes on Applications

Fortunately, one of our HAAUG members told me I needed to get the latest release update for Quicken if I was going to Snow Leopard. I did this before the OS upgrades and Quicken has been performing very well since.

A couple of games needed their license numbers entered again. No problem with that. Only one game is having a little problem. World Mosaics 2 twitches when I am playing it after the upgrade; the original World Mosaic game looks a little different when it starts up but plays just fine.

Conclusion

On the whole, I am very happy with my upgrade to Snow Leopard. I hope your upgrade process goes as well as mine and that you enjoy using Snow Leopard.

QuickTip

I found this out a while ago when looking for info on reading .DMG



files on Windows or Linux boxes. I found out it was not possible, and I wasn't too happy. You see, my iMac has no CD-R drive, just a CD-ROM. This tip creates ISO images from DMG images, so they can be burned elsewhere. To convert the file to an ISO image, type the following command at your terminal window:

hdiutil convert /path/ to/filename.dmg format UDTO -o /path/ to/savefile.iso

Replace / path/to/ filename.dmg with the path and name of the existing .DMG file, and replace / path/to/ savefile.iso with the desired path and name for the converted image.

This then creates an ISO image burnable in Nero on Windows, or pretty much anything on Windows that will burn ISOs and same with Linux. I just converted a DMG image as a test, and it took a while -- it only converted at about 1MByte per second, but I only have a 333Mhz imac G3, so speed wise, it may be good.

recently the volume on my MacBook Pro has been seriously reduced, sometimes to the point of being almost inaudible. Where it's really noticeable is when I rent a movie from iTunes, then try to watch by

hooking my MBP to my HDTV via mini Display Port to HDMI, and headphone jack to the input on my audio system.

Lately, even with all volume controls turned to max, it's still almost impossible to hear the movie. The answer, according to tips I found via Google, is to run Audio Hijack Pro (http://www.rogueamoeba.com/audiohijackpro/;

@RogueAmoeba) and hijack iTunes audio. Boy, does this work. Using the gain controls available within Audio Hijack Pro, you can blast the sound with the various volume controls turned almost all the way down. The leading theory is that Apple deliberately reduced the level of audio reaching the speakers to avoid damage when booted into Windows, which apparently drives the speakers much harder.

Anyway, I can watch movies again and finally hear what's going on. The problem now is that, for some reason, setting iTunes to full-screen with Audio Hijack Pro running puts the movie on the MBP's screen, which obviously isn't what I want. The workaround I found is to go to the Displays prefpane and drag the menubar to the HDTV. Kind of annoying to have to do this, but at least it works.

QuickTips

Time is relative

Automatically set the time zone you happen to be in. Navigate to the Date And Time preference in System Preferences and check off "Set time zone automatically using current location." Perfect for travelers.

QuickTime X video record

Need to record a quick video with your iSight or USB camera? You can record directly from your iSight camera in QuickTime X. If you're lucky enough to have a higher-quality camera, you can not only choose the camera and audio source directly from the QuickTime X window, but also decide where the video will be saved.

32-bit kernel vs. 64-bit kernel

Is running a 64-bit kernel really that great? We talked to Apple about this, and they told us that what you're doing when you hold down the 6 and 4 buttons during startup is actually booting the kernel into 64-bit mode. For 99.999% of users out there, booting up as usual with the 32-bit kernel is more than adequate. Your 64bit applications, including the Finder, will still run super quick while the kernel is in 32-bit mode. There is no difference in the speed of 64-bit applications while your kernel is in 32-bit mode. 64-bit mode is useful only to hardcore users and servers.

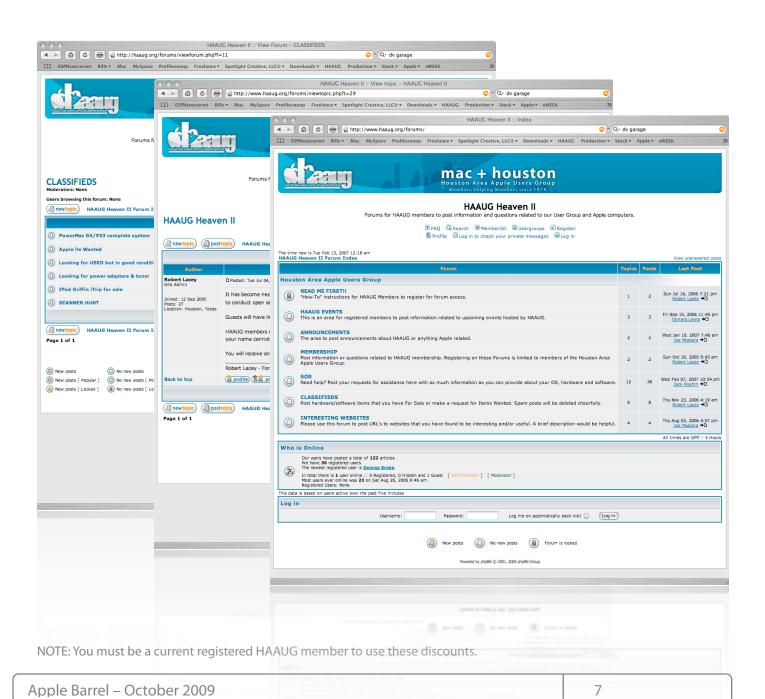

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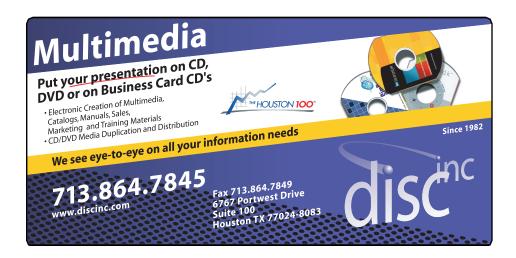

HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Tuesday, September 1, 2009

Location: Industrial Audio/Video, Inc., 2617 Bissonnet Street, Houston, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Robert Lacey, Barbara Long (via iChat), Rick Roberts, Ed Truitt (via iChat), Matt Willmore and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 6:34 p.m. by President Matt Willmore, a quorum of voting members of the board being present when the meeting was called to order.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Jim Connell: The minutes of the board meeting held on August 4, 2009, were unanimously approved as submitted.

Treasurer – Barbara Long: Barbara reported that HAAUG has about \$8K in its bank account and that she has paid all bills that she has received.

1st Vice President – Programming - Open: No report. Matt will contact Reagan Atkinson of Houston Camera Exchange about giving a talk on new digital cameras for the Main Presentation for the November General Meeting.

2nd Vice President Facilities – David Crook: Phil Booth reported that HAAUG has paid for the use of the Bellaire Civic Center for the September and October General Meetings. The October General Meeting will be held on the fourth Saturday of the month, since the Bellaire Civic Center has been reserved for another function on the third Saturday of October. Phil suggested that HAAUG also use the Senior Center Room at Bellaire Civic Center as an additional room for a SIG.

SIG Coordinator – **Rick Roberts:** Rick announced that he will not be attending the September General Meeting but will make the form for the SIG schedule available as a Pages '09 document.

Apple Barrel Editor– Tamara Alexander: No report. Matt stated that no one has been found to assume the position of Apple Barrel Editor. We may have to wait until the elections for next year to fill the position.

Membership – David Jaschke: HAAUG had 212 members at the end of August 2009, an increase of two members since July 2009. HAAUG had 252 members in June 2008. Two new members joined HAAUG, and twelve members renewed their membership, including two 2-year renewals.

Webmaster – Jeff Davis: The servers at IAPC have functioned without interruption this past month.

HAAUG Heaven Forum—Robert Lacey: Two members joined HAAUG Heaven last month.

Old Business:

MacFest: Phil Booth reported that the MacFest Committee met on August 11 and sent a report to HAAUG Club Business. A date of March 27, 2010, has been proposed for the next MacFest as a working target. The committee established a list of items (format, topics, budget, possible speakers, sponsorships, meeting space, audio/visual needs, network, transportation, lodging, marketing) that will need to be addressed in detail for the meeting. Barbara Long asked whether the committee is planning on a silent auction at the next MacFest. Phil Booth responded that it is possible.

HAAUG Web Hosting Committee Report: Matt reviewed the recommendation of the committee that HAAUG (i) select MacHighway for web hosting services on a month-to-month basis and (ii) negotiate a contract for MacExperts to host the FileMaker database. The fee for MacHighway ranges from \$9.95/month (medium) to \$14.95/month (large). The fee for MacExperts is \$50/month plus applicable sales tax. A committee, including the Webmaster, will need to develop a web hosting transition plan for a smooth transition from IAPC to MacHighway and MacExperts. Changes may

need to be made as the transition progresses. The committee will need to investigate and make a recommendation to the board about how to handle the HAAUG Hotline, which could possibly become an 800 number. After discussion the board approved the recommendation of the committee and the formation of a web hosting transition plan. Rex Covington, Jeff Davis, David Jaschke, Robert Lacey, Joe Muscara, Ed Truitt, Matt Willmore and Greg Wright were named to serve on the Web Hosting Transition Plan Committee.

Greg Wright announced that he has run a test of Google Apps as a possible site for posting announcements, working documents and other information for the board. The service is free.

New Business:

Main Presentation Topic for September General Meeting: Matt reported that the Main Presentation for the September General Meeting will feature a special presentation on Mac OS X Snow Leopard.

Content for the September Apple Barrel: Matt requested that articles for the next edition of the Apple Barrel be submitted by September 12. Board members were asked to submit a brief write-up on two or three iPhone apps that they would recommend to members for inclusion in the next newsletter.

O'Reilly Book Review Offer: Matt reported that he had spoken with Marsee Henon, the MUG coordinator at O'Reilly. MUG members can get a 20 percent discount on book purchases. Matt will get the code for the discount. O'Reilly will give a book free if it is reviewed in the Apple Barrel. A new book on Snow Leopard is being sent of review. Marsee sends out a monthly list of new books that O'Reilly is publishing.

Contacting Lapsed Members: Matt and Jim Connell volunteered to call lapsed members about renewing their membership. David Jaschke and Barbara Long will work on developing a list.

Nominations Committee: Phil Booth and David Jaschke will serve on the Nominations Committee for the elections for 2010 to be held at the December General Meeting.

Budget Committee: Phil Booth, Barbara Long, Matt Willmore and Greg Wright were named to serve on the committee develop and propose to the membership the budget for 2010.

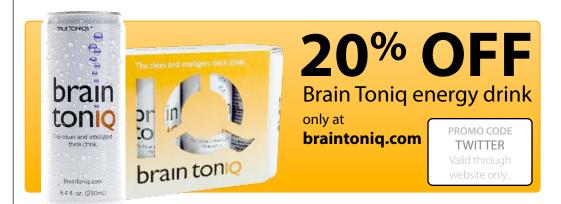

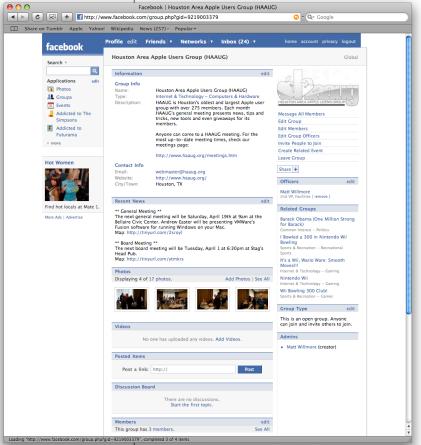
