

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President



Hello fellow HAAUGers!

Wow, the iPad! The rumors and speculation had gone on for years to the point where I was seriously doubting that Apple would come out with a tablet at all. I was, however, very pleasantly surprised to see it's debut last month at Apple's special press event. I can't wait to see one in person and give it a test drive.

It's been a very long time since I've seen such as mixed bag of reviews (mostly from people who've never experienced the device in person). People are deriding the iPad as a giant iPod and nothing more than a glorified App Store revenue generator. These labels may prove to be completely accurate, but I see the iPad as something much more – something I can't entirely visualize yet. And that is the reason I know it will succeed.

When I talk to Windows users, often the conversation comes around to why a Mac might be a better choice. Besides virus protection and malware, most people are content with their Windows machine because they know it does what they need and that's fine. Why would they buy a new Mac with a different platform to do what they've already been doing adequately? I always like to ask what they would *like to do* with their computers. Ever think about making home movies? Photo books? Tried making a Web site that didn't look awful? Making DVD's of your winter vacation? Most Windows users don't try to do them, and thus don't see the value in the Mac. Once they see what's *possible* with a Mac, however, they're much more receptive to trying one.

I see the exact same opportunity with the iPad. As soon as most detractors saw it running the iPhone OS, they immediately thought "big iPod" and dismissed it. Let's think of it another way: take out a pad of paper. What can you do with that and a pen? Really, a ton of things. Now add Internet access, the ability to transform it into books, and a media player. Sounds pretty awesome now, and that's what the iPad is. It gives you the digital capability of the iPod (media player, Web access [optionally with 3G] and the wealth of apps available in the App Store, and bakes the Kindle right in. That is quite a powerful device, and Apple created it.

Apple's helping to realize what is possible on the device, too. Availability of iWork apps means a lot to people like myself who want to work on the Apple Barrel on a long flight but can't use a laptop in coach, or don't want to lug one around town. I can't wait to use an iPad at Starbucks with a coffee, both for leisure and work.

Now I know there will always be detractor, like there is for any device. I would encourage you, however, to remember that it's perfectly OK to not know why you will love the iPad yet, but understand that you absolutely will.



Review: My New Mac, Snow Leopard Edition

My New Mac: Snow Leopard Edition Wallace Wang No Starch Press, \$29.95

Upon first glance, this book looks as though it would only be useful for a beginner—to computers let alone Macs. After all, the first chapter deals with how to turn your computer on and off, force it to shut down, restart it, and start programs. The second is about learning to use the mouse, the third, choosing commands on the menu bar. These things, of course, have their place and would be very useful to many people just starting out in the computer world. However, it turns out that while maintaining a very user-friendly approach, the book does eventually go farther than that.

The organization of the book is noteworthy and uncommon in my experience. Most books I have bought on the Mac are organized around

features, and I have rarely read chapters all the way through. But this book is organized around short projects. That means it teaches you how to accomplish something you want or need to do, whether it is something that is strictly entertaining or something that is useful—something you can do with your Mac immediately out of the box, no matter how much experience you have or don't have. So it covers common problems, how the Mac can solve them, and the steps to solve problems in a way that "only a Mac can." And the steps pretty much assume you know nothing, which in some cases can be a really good thing and in others annoying, depending on your level of expertise. I have had my share of experiences with directions or explanations that assume too much about what I know about the particular feature I am looking up. So my tolerance for Wang's step-by-step instructions—first press here, then click this, then choose this, then double click that, then repeat—varied. And by the way, if you learn well visually via diagrams, you will be in "haaug" heaven with this book! There are diagrams aplenty, practically one for each step in each process.

So, for example, it will teach you how to burn a CD, which I thought I knew how to do. But I have been using Toast for so many years now that something I did not know about the Apple program was all the digital file formats, what they mean, and when to use each one. Mostly I've just muddled along in iTunes without really knowing what I was doing, using it on a limited basis. I had no idea of all the possibilities, e.g., the genius feature, which finds songs similar to ones you already have that you might like. There are several chapters on iPhoto, which I also use in an uninformed kind of way, involving a lot of instinctive guesswork. It covers how to get the photos from your camera into iPhoto, how to organize them once they are in, how to edit them, how to create a slideshow out of them, how to tag and sort them, and much more. Still in the dark about Time Machine or Bluetooth? Wang's your guy. Need to type in foreign languages? No problem. Here you will find detailed instructions. Need to use

QuickTip

I had a DVD in my iMac that would not mount, and would not eject. After Googling around and trying various methods, I ended up calling Apple Support, and got this tip that I had not run across in my searches:

Boot the iMac while holding down the Option key to get to the boot menu, where the start up drives are displayed. Press and hold down the Eject key on the keyboard, and the stuck disc should eject. This tip worked great for me; I hope it's helpful to others.

[robg adds: The topic of stuck media has been quite popular here in the past. In an effort to turn today's tip into a one-stop reference for all the potential solutions, here are the methods covered in past hints:

Power up the machine and let it sit [hint]

Use Open Firmware [hint]

Use FireWire Target Disk Mode

Use disktool and System

Profiler [hint]
Grab it with the shutter from a floppy disc [hint]
Put your Mac in a cool location for a few minutes [hint]
Sleep then wake the Mac [hint]
Flip the machine upside down [hint]
Zap the PRAM [hint]

QuickTip

If you like to listen to complete albums, but

cannot fit your entire library on your iPod, create a Smart Playlist that contains a random selection of entire albums.

First, in iTunes, turn on Shuffle with the *Controls » Shuffle » Turn on Shuffle* menu item.
Select the *Shuffle* menu again, and check *Shuffle by Album*.

Next, create a new Smart Playlist with these conditions:
Match the Rule 'Media Kind' is 'Music'
Limit to 7GB selected by

random (i.e. for an 8GB iPod)
Check 'Live Updating' to
update the Random Album
Playlist by selecting and
deleting albums in the Playlist.

It's all here. How to use Mail and iChat, how to maintain your Mac, and many other how-to's wound up presenting options I would not have known to look for in a table of contents.

I still would not recommend this book to the utterly Mac-wise; it is pretty basic. Its target audience is not the computer sophisticated. But it isn't exactly the limited, baby book I initially thought it was. And the project- or task-oriented approach is quite appealing because along the way I learned more than I thought I would.

Nearly all O'Reilly titles are available free of charge to HAAUG members willing to write a review of the book as Hazel did. This is a perfect example of the type of review O'Reilly is looking for, and I look forward to our members taking advantage of this offer in the future!

QuickTip

Some cool Snow Leopard tips:

• Hold down shift to slow down the genie effect

- Option-click on the Sound menu to select input and output audio devices (speaker in top right of screen next to clock)
- Option-click the Sync menu to get more detailed sync info
- When in expose, press spacebar to "zoom-in" each window.
- Data detectors in apps like TextEdit don't work like they do in Mail. In Mail, "data detectors" work by you hovering over the text (an address, a phone number, etc.) until a little dotted border appears that lets you bring up a menu. In other applications that now support them (TextEdit, Stickies, etc.), you simply highlight the text and rightclick - and the data detector options will appear as the first items in the context menu
- When in expose clicking on the application icon in the dock removes other windows and only shows the windows of that application. Command + 1 sorts windows alphabetically and command+2 sorts by application.

After years of speculation, rumor and broken dreams, Apple finally confirmed one of the biggest mythical devices in the company's history, a full-on tablet. At the special press event in January, Steve Jobs debuted the iPad and laid out a clear path for what Apple looks to have customers do on the device – buy apps, buy books, and buy video, all conveniently (for Steve & Co.) through the iTunes Store.

Unlike most new Apple devices like the iPod, iPhone and computers, the iPad has been met with mixed reception. Some people see it as nothing more than an oversized iPod, largely because it runs the same iPhone OS you find in today's iPhone and iPod touch. Others find it limiting because it's not running OS X and therefore is limited to what apps are available on the iTunes Store. A large number of people, though, love the idea and are eager to plunk down a minimum of \$499 to have one of their own.

As with most new devices, Apple did a lot of the hardware engineering on their own. In the case of the iPad, they went one step further and actually designed their own "A4" system-on-achip processor; this was likely much of their goal behind the purchase of semiconductor designer P.A. Semi in 2008. The initial chip runs at 1GHz, which means little as it's impossible to empirically compare that rating to any other processor's published speed. The iPad also contains the same 30-pin iPod connector, but no USB as was speculated by some.

Apple will offer the iPad in six separate configurations. You can purchase an iPad with 16, 32 or 64 GB of memory, and each of those can have 3G capability. The prices range from \$499 (16 GB storage, Wi-Fi only) to \$829 (64 GB, Wi-FI + 3G). Non-3G models are available next month (March), with 3G models available in April.

The best place to learn more about Apple's new must-have toy? Apple's own **Web site**, of course, where you can watch videos and see Steve's introduction of the iPad. We hope to have one at a HAAUG meeting in the near future and will have more to share then.



HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Tuesday, December 1, 2009

Location: Industrial Audio/Video, Inc., 2617 Bissonnet Street, Houston, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Barbara Long (via iChat), Rick Roberts, Ed Truitt, Matt Willmore, and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 6:36 p.m. by President Matt Willmore, a quorum of voting members of the board being present.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Jim Connell: The minutes of the board meeting held on December 1, 2009, were unanimously approved as submitted.

Treasurer – Barbara Long: Barbara Long reported that she is working on updating the financial reports. HAAUG has approximately \$8,000 in its bank account. Barbara has paid all bills received through the end of the year, including the bills from MacExperts. Phil Booth has sent the contracts for the rental of Bellaire Civic Center in 2010 to Barbara. The rental fee will be paid quarterly.

1st Vice President – Programming – Doug Smith: Matt reported that HAAUG will hold its semi-annual Swap Meet this month. 
