Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

We have heard from the President, the Governor, and the Mayor about the "State of": and Bob LeVitus, will give his point of view on the state of Apple, at our

February 26th meeting. Now I would like to give you, the members of HAAUG the state of your user group. It is a mixture of good and not so good news. First, let's review the good stuff: we still have an active, functioning organization. We have trimmed the operating expenses of the group to the point that we are seeing a tiny amount of surplus. Part of the trimming came when we moved our web host which significantly cut that expense. The move to the Bellaire Civic Center also reduced our meeting costs considerably, and has given us a stable place to meet. We have recently moved our telephone hot line to a free provider which cut our expenses even further. These changes have taken a lot of work on the part of board members, past and present.

Dear HAAUG,

On the negative side: HAAUG continues to hover at around 200 members. While that level of membership will sustain the group given current expenses, it is not high enough to allow us to move forward with new programs, or to bring many speakers from out of town. It would be great if a few of those new Mac/iPad/iPhone owners discovered HAAUG! If you are getting a lot of support calls on Apple products you might encourage those friends and family members to come to the February meeting.

Another issue we face is with leadership. While the leadership in the group is dedicated, it is essentially the same group of people from the last time I was president over three years ago. We need more members of HAAUG to volunteer for a position on the Board, or help out at a meeting. Organizing the main presentation at the monthly meeting is the job of the programming VP. If several members formed a committee the job could be shared and HAAUG could get some new ideas for programs. Helping with even the smallest task can make a big difference.

There are positives and negatives but we are still providing help for Apple users in the Houston area. At the February Meeting members of the board will present the 2011 budget for member approval. we will also be asking for a few members to step forward and help HAAUG move into the future. Our current initiative is renovating our web site at <u>www.haaug.org</u>. We are evaluating the use of WordPress as the foundation for the site, which will allow more people the ability to contribute and manage content without having to purchase expensive software. WordPress will also allow us to design better forums, that will spur more interaction. This was possible because folks stepped up and raised their hands. Working on the website would be a great opportunity for someone who wants to learn WordPress. If you have read this far you will notice the theme of getting involved. I can't stress that theme enough.

I would like to thank Matt Willmore who served one and a half terms as president. He helped move our website and the current forums to our new internet host. He is still helping out even from his new home in South Bend, Indiana. Thanks also are due to

The Daily: Is This the Future of the Newspaper?

On February 2, News Corp. and Apple unveiled <u>The Daily</u>, an iPad app which is being positioned as a "new model" for the newspaper business. Thanks to sponsorship from Verizon, the subscription is free for the first two weeks - which gave me (and many others) a chance to try it out (note: the two-week trial is standard on <u>newspaper subscriptions on the Kindle</u> via Amazon.com.) Having had a chance to work the the app, I think I can (sort of) answer the question I posed in the title. And that answer is... a definite *maybe*.

Before I get into that, though, let's look at how the app runs, from an iPad standpoint. It certainly looks great, utilizing features such as Cover Flow to provide an elegant, rich graphical experience. The Daily also makes good use of the iPad platform, incorporating a variety of multimedia goodies, from slide shows to video

clips to audio comments on articles(!) In addition, it does provide (though with some limitations) the ability to "share" content to others, as well as periodic updates through the day - both of these despite rumors to the contrary. The app is fairly stable (thanks to an update which addressed some early issues with the app crashing), and responsiveness is pretty crisp (which indicates the app isn't overloading the graphics processor, an issue I have seen with a recent update to



Angry Birds.) On the downside: the content updates seem to take *forever* (though they normally take about a minute over my WiFi connection), the "periodic" updates seem to happen every time you open the app, and when you get an "interim" update during the day, there is no indication as to what has actually changed (which is annoying, since I for one will not re-read every article to see what might be different - nor would I always spot the changes if I did.)

But, the real problem with The Daily has to do, not with the *look and feel* of the app, but with the *content*. Like it or not (and most media companies do *not* like it at all), the Web has changed the fundamentals of the news business, and not just in the context of the "dead tree edition vs. eco-friendly online edition" argument. We have become used to having access to breaking news 24/7 *as it occurs* (this is at least partially due to the introduction of all-news-all-the-time cable channels.) The Daily simply can't keep up with truly breaking news: as *Houston Chronicle* tech blogger/ journalist Dwight Silverman noted in his review, The Daily had the misfortune to launch during the same time that protests in Egypt toppled the government there,

QuickTip

Want to Get Album Artwork for just one album? Don't use the Advanc



use the Advanced menu.

If you select Get Album Artwork from the Advanced menu, iTunes will search your entire Music Library for songs with missing artwork (and will sometimes overwrite your artwork with mistaken album covers).

If you want to get a single album's artwork, you might think that selecting a single track from that album and then choosing Get Album Artwork from the Advanced menu would accomplish that task. Unfortunately, iTunes still searches your entire Music Library no matter what tracks are selected.

In order to Get Album Artwork for a limited group of songs, right-click on the selected song (s) and choose Get Album Artwork from the contextual menu that pops up.



QuickTip

A recent hint showed a great tip for quickly pulling up a blank Safari

tab on iOS devices. The author's instructions, though, indicated another tip many might not know when entering a URL into mobile Safari.

When viewing a web page, we all know to tap on the address field so we can enter a new URL. In mobile Safari, however, there's no need to first tap the X to clear the existing URL in the address field. Instead, just tap the address field and begin typing when the keyboard appears. Mobile Safari will automatically overwrite the existing address.

[crarko adds: I tested this, and it works as described. It's a good followup to the other hint. Anything that speeds up Mobile Safari is a good thing in my book.]

Treasurer – Clair Jaschke: Clair Jaschke reported that HAAUG has money in the bank and that all bills she has received have been paid. She will ask Jeff Davis to cancel the old HAAUG Hotline this month so that HAAUG may discontinue paying IAPC.

1st Vice President – Programming – Greg Wright: Greg Wright confirmed that Bob LeVitus is available to be the speaker at the HAAUG General Meeting on February 26, 2011. The board approved the purchase of a roundtrip airline ticket at a cost of \$97 for Bob LeVitus's transportation on February 26. Greg is considering a panel discussion about Apple TV and media alternatives such as Slingbox and Roku as a Main Presentation topic for the March General Meeting.

2nd Vice President Facilities – Doug Smith: Phil Booth reported that he has contracts from the City of Bellaire for use of the Bellaire Civic Center at HAAUG's monthly meetings for 2011 and that HAAUG has paid the City the rental for the first three months of 2011. He suggests that HAAUG pay the monthly rental in

advance on a quarterly basis.

SIG Coordinator – Open: No report. Rick Roberts will publish the list of SIGs for next month's General Meeting.

Apple Barrel Editor – Ed Truitt: No report. The deadline for submission of articles for the February Apple Barrel is Saturday, February 12, 2011.

Membership – David Jaschke: David Jaschke reported that HAAUG had 194 members at the end of December 2010, a decrease of one member from November 2010. HAAUG began 2010 with 201 members. Last month there were nine membership transactions, including one new member, five early renewals, and the renewals of two lapsed members.

Webmaster – Jeff Davis: No report.

HAAUG Heaven Sysop - Open: No report.

OLD BUSINESS:

MacFest Committee: No report.

Web Operations Committee--Ed Truitt: Phil Booth, Ed Truitt and Tamara Alexander will meet and arrange a conference call with Matt Willmore to resolve the remaining issues for the transition of the redesigned HAAUG website to WordPress/BuddyPress and for the conversion of the Apple Barrel to a blog format. Anyone who is interested is invited to participate in the meeting in person or by iChat.

HAAUG Hotline Alternate Services--Greg Wright: Greg Wright requested that the old HAAUG Hotline Number at IAPC needs to be terminated this month, now that the new HAAUG Hotline number on PhoneBook is operating. The board thanked Greg for his efforts in moving the HAAUG Hotline to the PhoneBook service, which will save HAAUG approximately \$900 a year.

Revision of HAAUG's By-Laws: Phil Booth invited the board members to participate in updating the bylaws. One of the changes suggested is to combine the positions of Apple Barrel Editor, Webmaster and HAAUG Heaven Sysop into one position.

Website Passwords: Ed Truitt will obtain the passwords from Jeff Davis so that more than one person can access the website.

Adjourned: 12:40 p.m.

pointing out the glaring deficiencies in this area for all to see. On the other hand, The Daily is better positioned: as a platform for more in-depth reporting/ analysis/editorial commentary (areas where real-time updates are neither needed nor even really desired), coupled with a web site to provide access to breaking/ real-time news.

So, will I continue my subscription past the two week free trial (at \$0.99/week)? I probably will, for now. I do believe in the iPad as a news reader, and I am, after all, an inveterate early adopter. The app has already improved since its inception, and I suspect that, given time, the producers of The Daily will get it right - or, at least, *more* right.

QuickTip

The process of loading a URL in a new tab on iPad can be rather cumbersome and



slow. First, one launches Safari from the home screen, waits for the app to open and the old webpage to rerender, then one hits the tab switch button, presses the new tab space, waits for that tab to open, waits for it to switch to the search panel (this is the most irritating part of the process, since it seems to take even longer when what one really wants is the URL bar), and finally, one clicks on the URL bar to enter in a new URL.

To simplify this process considerably, just add a new icon to your Springboard that goes directly to about:blank. Details after the jump.

To add the new icon to your home screen, first open a new tab in Safari according to the usual method, and direct it to the url,about:blank. Then tap the more options icon (iOS 4.2) or the + icon (iOS 3.2) and select, 'Add to home'. Give your icon a name like 'New tab' or whatever you like then tap add.

In the future when you want to switch to Safari and open a URL in a new tab, just tap the 'New tab' icon, then tap the URL and X out the existing about:blank before entering in your own URL.

[**crarko adds:** I tested this, and it works as described. I found this even more valuable on my old, slow, iPhone 3G; and it's a good idea anytime you're using the cell connection instead of Wi-Fi.]

At the end of the monthly meeting of the <u>Houston Social Media Breakfast</u> (a group of "social media explorers in search of the next big thing while keeping our feet firmly planted in reality"), I was making the rounds, talking to folks, when I spotted what looked like a <u>Cr-48</u> "Google Chrome OS" laptop. I was pleasantly surprised when I realized it was in fact an iPad, mated with a <u>ZAGGMate</u> case *cum* wireless keyboard. After looking it over, I said, in the immortal words of <u>Capt. Steven Hiller</u>, "<u>I have got to</u> <u>get me one of these!</u>"



So, after a bit of looking around the Web, I went to the local Best Buy, and brought one home.

The ZAGGmate (\$99.99 retail) is a brushedaluminum case that fits snugly over the iPad (3G or WiFi versions), and contains a built-in bluetooth keyboard. It also has a groove in which you can place the iPad (both horizontal and vertical orientations are supported), along with a plastic "stand" which folds down and out of the way when not in use. This piece, to me, is probably the weakest component of what is otherwise a pretty solidly constructed device. As you can see from the picture, the assembled system is slightly smaller than a 13" MacBook Pro, and (as expected) the keys are a little small and closely spaced for heavy-duty typing.

After using it for a brief amount of time, I have decided that, indeed, I love the thing. And, the reason is simple. If you look at the top row, you will see some spacial function keys. These keys allow you to control specific iPad features, such as activating the "search" page, blanking the screen, and controlling the iPad playback functions.



Then, if you look at the bottom right, you will find a set of arrow keys. Keys which allow a typist to scroll easily within a text box (something that simply can't be done in some cases when using the virtual keyboard.) While the bluetooth keyboard from Apple also contains these keys, that keyboard is not contained within a metal case which perfectly fits the iPad, providing some much-needed protection to the glass screen while maintaining a compact, easy to carry bundle.

A compact, easy to carry bundle which is IMO the perfect netbook.
