

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

It looked like everyone that attended the February Meeting had a good time listening to Bob "Dr. Mac" LeVitus. It was great seeing some of the products and software that were demoed at MacWorld. Thanks to Bob for a great presentation. Next month we will demonstrate Office 2011 by Microsoft. This is the latest iteration of the venerable suite of office productivity applications.

Dear HAAUG,

It was a party at the Apple iPad event this month as Apple unveiled iPad 2, the new version of its tablet computer. Apple managed to pack a dual core processor in a package that is 8.8 mm thick and weighs only 1.3 pounds. While there is not a radical redesign, the changes are significant. Two cameras (one rear facing, one forward facing) were added to allow the iPad to use FaceTime video chat. Apple demonstrated iPad versions of FaceTime, Photo Booth, and iMovie to take advantage of the added cameras. They also demonstrated GarageBand to show off the capabilities of the new devices dual core processor.

With less fanfare, Apple also revved the company's MacBook Pro line with the latest mobile processors from Intel and new graphics chips. New to these notebooks is a new interface port that Apple dubbed Thunderbolt. The Thunderbolt port takes the place of the Display port and will allow the connection of external monitors/ projectors, plus disk drives and other high-speed peripherals when they become available. Again there was not a radical redesign of the package, as these models will use the same uni-body chassis that was introduced last year.

Apple also released to developers a preview version of OS X 10.7 (Lion). This version lets developers test their software against Lion to see if there are any incompatibilities, as one writer said this is not even the beta version. It was released through the new Mac App Store, which signals the possible new way Apple will be selling the Lion when it is released to the general public. Rumors have it coming out this summer.

Have you been to the Apple store lately? Notice the lack of boxed software in the store. Apple has pulled the number of titles in the mall stores to a minimum. All software sales through the Mac App Store nets Apple 30% of the sale. Even the developer preview of Lion was distributed by the Mac App store. Will that be the way we will get the next version of the OS? Stay tuned.

We are still looking for people to join the board. At the March meeting talk to a Board member to see if you can help. The Board meetings are immediately following the meeting. Attend the meeting and then go to lunch with us.

I would like to have an evening SIG covering OS X 10.6. I have a goal of taking and passing the Apple Desktop support certification. If you have an interest in leaning more about OS X contact me <u>president@haaug.org</u> and I will start organizing a

The new MacBook Pro: First Impressions

On Friday, March 11, I made my way to <u>Apple's web site</u>, located what I was looking for, and checking over the different configuration options like a Snow Leopard selecting its prey from among a herd of plump, juicy meat critters: then, my mind made up, I got in the car, and raced (actually, I drove very carefully) to the store, and returned home clutching my newly-procured prize.

I suspect a whole lot of people did the same on this day, but with a key difference: I was hunting, not the new, magical iPad 2, but rather one of the recently-released MacBook Pros. The one I selected was the 13" model with the dual-core Intel Core I7 processor, a 500 GB HDD, and 8GB RAM (upgraded from 4GB.) Doing some quick online shopping showed me I could get the unit for \$100 less at MicroCenter than at the Apple Store: I saved an extra \$50 on the memory upgrade (*woohoo!*)

When I got it home and un-boxed, I decided to use the "transfer accounts, files, and applications from another Mac" setup option: fortunately, I thought ahead, and had purchased a 10-ft FireWire cable to connect the two machines. I wasn't able to use this feature when I got my MacBook Pro last year, as the hard drive in my MacBook had suffered a mostly-fatal failure, and the system would no longer boot. I will say that this was a much easier way to transfer all that stuff, even if the "time remaining" widget almost gave me a cardiac several times as it went to, and beyond, the 12-hour mark! When all was said and done, my new system looked pretty much like my old system: the only difference (and "failure", if you would call it that) was that some of the software license keys had to be re-entered.

Now that I have it up and have had a chance to work with it for awhile, what do I think? Well, the most significant upgrade, the inclusion of the Thunderbolt I/O port, is still an unknown quantity. While it supports data transfer at up to 10 Gbps, there are today only a few devices that support Thunderbolt, and they are very, very expensive. The Core I7 processor sure feels zippy, but to be honest I haven't done a lot of compute-intensive stuff yet (I suspect Photoshop will be more responsive, however). The larger hard drive will allow me to store more stuff locally, including my iTunes library and the photos from the current year. And the SDXC card slot is a a neat improvement - you are supposed to be able to boot from an SDXC card, which means they will be useful for more than storing pictures you take with your digital camera. Where I *have* noticed a difference is in memory-intensive operations: I can easily run OS X, along with Windows XP and Ubuntu Linux on virtual machines, at the same time without any noticeable loss of performance.

And the last benefit of the new MacBook Pro? I turned the old MacBook Pro over to my wife, who has become an almost instant Apple fangirl! Now, if I can convert my son...

formatted web site, but I want what I paste to just match the formatting of where I paste it. Some browsers have an Edit » Paste and Match Style command, but I've found that it frequently doesn't work. This is a speedy workaround that is guaranteed to always work.

Anything that you paste into the address or search bar of any Web browser is automatically converted to plain text. Pasting plain text will always cause it to match the formatting of the destination.

So, to quickly and easily make text match the destination formatting when pasted, just do this:

- Paste it into the search bar.
- Copy it back.
- Paste it into your destination.


You can do this all with a keyboard sequence, of course.

QuickTip

After upgrading to iOS 4.3 on your iPhone and/or iPad you

might find yourself in a situation where you don't see all your shared libraries even if they all have Home Sharing enabled with the same Apple ID.

This happens if you have duplicated your library by copying ~/Music/iTunes to one or more machine from another machine. Those libraries will be sharing the same library id and therefore IOs 4.3 is not able to distinguish them even though the Apple TV and other Mac's can.

The fix is to follow this Apple Knowledge Base article to reset your library ID on all the Macs that have copies of the original library.

As the Apple Barrel Editor, I get like a gazillion press releases on new/updated products each month. This one caught my eye, as I recently became a two Mac family, and I was looking for a tool to help me with remote system support. ARD is nice enough, but it costs \$99 and it only works on Macs. LogMein is cheaper, and it allows you to remotely connect to Windows systems as well - very useful for those of us who, like myself, have relatives who haven't switched yet. The ability to transfer files between systems adds a new dimension of usability to the product, and prompted me to spend some of my own \$\$\$ to procure a copy for testing. Review: Super Soviet Missile Mastar

Recently, while listening to the <u>iPad Today</u> podcast from <u>TWiT</u>, I heard about a game I decided I just had to try. The game, called <u>Super Soviet Missile Mastar</u> [sic], proved to be an interesting addition to my collection of games for iStuff.




Super Soviet Missile Mastar is a really, really cheesy game. The graphics are reminiscent of the old 8-bit (or maybe even 4-bit?) computer/video games (like the original Pong), the play is similar to the old "Defender" game by Atari, and the plot (such as it is) is straight out of the Cold War.

The object of the game is to guide your Soviet missile to its target (the good ole USofA), avoiding "enemy" planes, helicopters, and birds. If you are successful, you are rewarded

with a man doing the 'happy dance' Soviet style, accompanied by a somewhat evil, Communist-sounding ditty. You also earn points based on how far (in km) you keep

your missile intact, and can earn bonus km by hitting 'power-ups' that are present in the playing field.

Game play is very simple, though it frustrated me for awhile. All you have to do is move your finger up and down on the screen to make the missile move up and down on the screen. My problem was, as a right-handed person, I instinctively wanted to keep my finger on top



of the missile, which was on the left side of the screen! Eventually, I learned that all I needed to do was have my finger anywhere on the screen, and it would work just fine.

While this game takes next to no effort to play, I have found it a fun diversion. The author replicated the style and game play of the early days of video games, while perfectly catching the stereotypical perceptions of the "Red Menace" so prevalent during the days of the "Evil Empire."
