

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

As the saying goes, "an ounce of prevention..." - which is what Dwight Silverman spoke about at the last meeting. Although his talk was not as apocalyptic as the title inferred, he made good points about being vigilant. His talk covered the "Mac Defender" malware which has cropped up recently. Mac Defender is a class of malware called scare-ware. The usual method of gaining access to your system is when you visit a compromised website and a pop up screen suddenly informs you that your computer is loaded with viruses. There is a big download button on the screen, with no way to close the pop up. By clicking OK you then download a application that does not remove the viruses that were not there: it only demands payment in the form of a credit card. Dwight told of a user that input five or six credit cards when the software rejected the numbers. And yes, the "author" received the numbers.

Dear HAAUG,

There are several things to remember: first, this is not a traditional "virus" that replicates and sends itself to people on your email list. The only way you can be infected is if you click on the window, and allow the application to install. If you come across one of these sites, close the window or force quit your browser. A system restart would not be a bad idea also. If you click the button and allow the software to install itself, Apple has published a method of avoiding and removing the infection (http://support.apple.com/kb/ht4650). What ever you do, don't enter your credit card number into the software. Apple has an update to Mac OS 10.6.7 that will automatically identify and remove Mac Defender and its variants. There are also several publishers of legitimate security software that you can investigate if you feel that you need that kind of protection.

This month, Apple hosted the annual World Wide Developers Conference. The WWDC is the vehicle for Apple to let software developers in on the planned changes to both iOS and Mac OS. We have already gotten the sneak peek at "Lion", the next Mac OS big cat. This WWDC we saw "Lion" in its near final form. This year's conference reportedly sold out in hours, which is another indicator of Apple's influence in the tech world. Apple, true to its earlier announcements, did not show any hardware during this Keynote. What they did show were ten features of the new Mac OS, ten new features of iOS 5.0, and the official launch of Apple's new on-line service called iCloud. Other folks have picked apart the keynote and have analyzed the new features. The one feature that I perked up about is the price and the method of distribution for Lion. It will be available only through the Mac App Store at a price of \$30.00. It will be a 4 Gigabyte download, so you will need a hefty internet connection. I encourage you to visit your favorite Tech website to get more information about iOS, Mac OS, and iCloud.

The San Francisco Chronicle App For iPad®

Back in the days before eReaders and iPads, I used to be a subscriber to the "dead tree" edition of our local newspaper. Eventually, I gave it up. Not because I didn't like the content, but because I grew tired of gathering the daily paper off the front door, adding it to the pile of papers gathering in my living room, then (when the pile became an eyesore and a safety hazard) loading them all up in the car and depositing them, still (mostly) in their plastic wrappers, into the local recycling bin. The truth of the matter was (and is) that I don't have time to sit down and digest (metaphorically speaking) the paper each day.

Which means that, for some time, I have gotten my news "fix" via the Web. This is an OK option, and has one major advantage

over a daily print edition: the news is updated through the day, as things happen. It also has a DISadvantage: you have to be connected in order to read.

I was hoping that, when I got my <u>Kindle e-Reader</u>, that the Kindle edition of the local newspaper would satisfy my needs. However, for reasons having nothing to do with the Kindle technology (mostly permission-to-redistribute-electronically issues), only a subset of the articles available on the Web are delivered via the Kindle edition. Even worse, you still have this "updated once a day" thing, so the news tends to be rather stale (meaning "I have already seen this on the web, thankyouverymuch) by the time I read it.

Then came the iPad, and when I got hold of one, I realized: this was what I had been looking for as a replacement for the daily newspaper (as well as magazine subscriptions.) Unfortunately, out of the eleventy gazillion apps for "that", the perfect newspaper app wasn't among them. Apps like <u>Flipboard</u> and <u>Zite</u> point



the way to newsreader Nirvana, and they introduce some very intriguing features, but they still don't quite provide what I am looking for - an app that gives me the "look and feel" of a newspaper/magazine, without the smell and stains of printers ink, and without a pile of paper to haul to the recycling bin (or even worse, the landfill.)

I was hoping my wishes were answered with the introduction of <u>The Daily</u> (reviewed in the <u>February, 2011 Apple Barrel</u>), which was the first newspaper app specifically (cont'd on p. 8)

QuickTip

In Mail.app, press Command+I on the Inbox icon (or right-



click on it and choose 'Get Account Info') and sample the awesomeness. Actually, this works with any of the main mailbox icons. Just select an account from the popup menu.

> It gives space usage for each folder and quota limits for the account, plus other settings from the 'Account Info' preference, and works for Gmail and Exchange too. I just stumbled onto it and found it worth sharing.





HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Saturday, April 30, 2011

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 South Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Rick Roberts, Ed Truitt, Julie Woellert and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 1:09 p.m. by President Phil Booth, a quorum of voting members of the board being present.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Lyda McGhee: The minutes of the board meeting held on February 26, 2011, were approved by an email vote of the voting board members. The board unanimously approved minutes of the board meeting held on March 26, 2011, as submitted.

Treasurer – Clair Jaschke: Clair Jaschke reported that HAAUG has approximately \$10,000 in the bank and that all bills received are in the process of being paid. She has received bills from IAPC but will decline payment since the old HAAUG Hotline number has been cancelled and is no longer a working number. No further payments to IAPC should be due. Clair needs to know the date on which IAPC was notified to terminate the old HAAUG Hotline number. Most of the outstanding checks issued to MacExperts have now cleared the bank account. Clair has still not received the \$300 that the family of Irv Greenbaum donated to HAAUG. Clair reported continuing progress in updating HAAUG's financial records.

1st Vice President – Programming – Greg Wright: Greg Wright announced the Main Presentation programs planned for the upcoming months: May 21--Dwight Silverman (topic to be determined); June 18—New Ways to Watch TV; July 16--Semi-Annual Swap Meet. Greg is planning on Reagan Atkinson as the speaker for the Main Presentation on November 19.

2nd Vice President Facilities – Doug Smith: Rent for the use of the Bellaire Civic Center has been paid

through June 2011. HAAUG has the Civic Center reserved for the rest of the year. Phil Booth reported that the City of Bellaire has cancelled the Public Safety Day on May 21 that would have closed Rice Avenue in front of the Civic Center. Ed Truitt noted that the soft drink machine has been removed from the Civic Center. After discussion, the board decided against bringing in food to be served after the General Meetings.

SIG Coordinator – Open: No report. Phil Booth thanked Rick Roberts for publishing the list of SIGs for this month's General Meeting.

Apple Barrel Editor – Ed Truitt: The deadline for submitting articles for the May Apple Barrel is Saturday, May 14, 2011.

Membership – **David Jaschke:** David Jaschke reported that HAAUG had 191 members at the end of March, a decline of three members from February 2011. HAAUG had 207 members at the end of March 2010. Membership activity in March was very low, with only two 2-year renewals and one new member. David expects membership activity to pick up this month.

HAAUG Electronic Communications Systems - Ed Truitt: Ed reported that he is waiting on completion of back coding for the new website.

OLD BUSINESS:

Vacant Officer Positions: While Phil Booth has asked in the Apple Barrel and at the General Meetings for members to fill the vacant officer positions, no one has volunteered.

MacFest Committee: No report.

Revision of the HAAUG By-Laws: David Jaschke will get the process started to update the By-Laws.

designed for the iPad form factor. Alas, technical difficulties (early versions of the app kept crashing), along with the fact that it took forEVER for the content update to download, meant that when the "free trial" period was over, The Daily was deleted from my iPad.

Then, late last month, Dwight Silverman made an offhand mention of a new app during the <u>Technology</u> <u>Bytes</u> radio program on KPFT: he said that the <u>San</u> <u>Francisco Chronicle</u> had released <u>their new iPad app</u>, and that this would be what the future Houston Chronicle app would look like. Needless to say, I was off to the App Store, where it was found, and downloaded, *tout de suite*.

I think I may have finally seen the future of the newspaper.

First of all, the SF Chronicle app *looks* like a newspaper. It has the multiple columns I expect to seen, and you don't see the entire story on the page (though, when you "tap" on a story to read it, it will open the entire story right there, instead of playing graphical games with turning pages and the like.) The content is broken up into sections, just like a newspaper. You get text, and (where available) pictures. You also may get other multimedia elements (e.g. video, or slideshows) if they are a part of the story. You can also choose to download the content (and choose how much multimedia content to download) in case you want to (or need to) read it offline.

This app also addresses the two biggest shortcomings of The Daily and the Kindle editions. It takes about 10 seconds to load the app (before you actually see content), compared to the 30-60 seconds that The Daily took in the latter days (originally it took up to 5 minutes to refresh the content each day!) Previous editions are available for up to 7 days (The Daily didn't keep past editions around, unless you specifically "saved" them.) Unlike the Kindle edition, the iPad app has an option for a "live edition" which is updated during the day, in addition to a "static edition" for those who prefer that. (the Kindle edition also retains old editions for a week.) The app provides for in-app subscription: access for current print edition subscribers is free.

Does the app have any annoyances? Sure it does. I noticed an inconsistency in how one scrolls through an article: in some cases, you scroll down (like on a webpage), while in other cases, you swipe to the left (like turning a page.) I also noticed that certain sections, like the comics and crosswords, were missing. Lastly, every so often an ad would take over the screen (though this may only happen during the "free trial".)

I am looking forward to the day when the Houston Chronicle is available via this app. In the meantime, I may just end up subscribing to the SF Chronicle, because yes, this app is That. Darned. Good.

IK Multimedia offers their great software, AmpliTube[®] (available for the <u>iPhone/iPod</u> <u>touch</u> and <u>iPad</u>), thru the iTunes Store with the basic features enabled. (I bought the fully functional version for \$19.99 after less than an hour.) Additional amps and effects are also available in the iTunes store so you never have to feel limited for effects options. The iRig[®] also works with GarageBand on the iPad[®], so you can create and play until you want to stop.
