Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

Apple made news twice at the end of July as it announced is second quarter results, and released OS X 10.7 (Lion). This is a far cry from the late 90's

when there was speculation on the future of Apple. According to Apple's press release, "The Company posted record quarterly revenue of \$28.57 billion and record quarterly net profit of \$7.31 billion, or \$7.79 per diluted share." It was reported that Apple's cash on hand could buy investment banker Goldman Sachs. Sales of iPhones and iPads drove the revenue but Apple also sold almost 4 million Macs.

Dear HAAUG,

Apple released the latest version of the Mac operating system to much fanfare. This was heavily followed in the Mac/Apple blogosphere. Apple changed Lion's UI, price, and distribution method. Lion borrows many the user interface elements of iOS, with "Mission Control" displaying all of your computer's apps on pages like iOS home screens. The price of Lion is \$30.00 which is a significant discount of the usual price for a full point upgrade. The last change is the method of distribution: it is currently available only via download from the Mac App store, though Apple announced that it would be selling USB drives with the installer loaded. The reported price for this is \$69, and it is for people who do not have access to a broadband internet connection. One other change carried over from Snow Leopard is that it works only on Intel processors. In addition, the Rosetta Stone Power PC translation technology was also dropped. This change orphaned several software packages: the most notable is Quicken 2007, whose code base is still Power PC based.

Apple also upgraded the MacBook Air and the Mac Mini to the latest version of the Intel Processor, and in the case of the Mini removing the optical drive. Like the original iMac which dropped the 800K floppy, the Mini points to the deletion of an optical drive in Apple hardware.

We did not have much activity at the July swap meet, but I was able to sell an old Titanium Power Book, to a member who needed a working machine for an older father that wanted to surf the net and do email. In August Doug Smith and Joe Muscara will be demoing GarageBand. I also believe Joe will be teaching Doug Guitar and GarageBand, so we all might learn something.

In club news: Treasurer Clair Jaschke reported at the last board meeting that the club was solvent and she has caught up with the significant backlog with the books, We will be able to audit the 2009 and 2010 club accounts soon. Although I don't expect to find problems it is good for all organizations to have a second set of eyes go over its accounts. This was a lot of work on Clair's part and I want to thank her for all the effort on HAAUGs behalf.

First Look: OS X 10.7 "Lion"

When OS X 10.7 "Lion" first showed up in the Mac App store, I had already made the decision to wait awhile. Although I fancy myself an "early adopter", I had heard stories of application incompatibilities, and right now I didn't need any more complications in my life. Then, I got to thinking: if I could install Lion on a bootable SDXC card, I could "kick the tires" using my MacBook Pro, while keeping my apps (and, even more importantly, my data) safely ensconced in the Snow Leopard's den.

Noticing that my local MicroCenter had 64GB SDXC cards in stock, I headed down on the weekend. While I was there, I noticed that they also had 750 GB hard drives in the 2.5" SATA format on sale for \$90. So, I picked up 2 (I *always* make it a habit to pick up 2 drives, so I will have an exact match for backups), and headed home.

The plan had now changed: I would perform a clean install of Lion on one of the new 750GB drives, migrate the applications and data over using the Migration Assistant, then swapping the new drive and the existing internal drive, if/when Lion proved stable enough. (Actually, the delay in swapping the drives was caused by the fact I misplaced my Torx driver, which is required to remove the drive mounting screws on the internal drive.)

I downloaded Lion from the App Store, then <u>extracted the Installer to a USB thumb drive</u>. (Note: you have to do this before upgrading the OS on the existing hard drive to Lion, as the installer is deleted at the end of the upgrade.) I then connected the new hard drive via USB, partitioned and formatted it using Disk Utility, and restarted the MBP to kick off the installer. A little over an hour later, I had a new hard drive with Lion, my apps, and my data on it. Yippee!

The first thing I noticed was that things seemed slower. Start up, app launching, everything. This was fixed once I swapped the drives (which, contrary to my earlier understanding, does not appear to automatically void the warranty - I used a regular Phillips screwdriver, and followed instructions taken directly from Apple's support site), and Lion now appears much more responsive than Snow Leopard. While it is totally to be expected that an internal drive would perform better than a drive connected via USB, it is still a surprise the first time you experience it.

Hardware and performance issues out of the way, I finally had a chance to dive in to some of the features of Lion. The first thing I encountered was the "infamous" natural scrolling. To be honest, I didn't have any problems with it, I guess because I use my iPad for web surfing so I am used to this behavior. Those of you who aren't iPad aficionados may want to change the scrolling direction back to how it works in Snow Leopard. I then started investigating Mission Control. A combination of Expose, Dashboard, and Spaces from earlier versions of OS X, This one took a little getting used to. First of all, I freed Dashboard from running in its own full-screen desktop, as I like how it behaves in Snow Leopard. Next, I had to dig through the app to figure out how to re-pin all my apps to the desktops they were in under Snow Leopard (I happen to be a fan of 'pinning' oft-used apps to different desktops, which allows me to switch back and forth without cluttering up my screen.) While the process is easier than under Snow Leopard (you drag the app to the desktop you want it on, switch to the app, then select "Assign to: This Desktop" under Options in the app's icon in the Dock), it wasn't as intuitive as I would have liked. Speaking of the Dock: I was fortunate in that the white dots indicating an open app transferred over from my Snow Leopard installation, otherwise that

QuickTip

On Lion, Expose and Spaces have received a major overhaul in the form of Mission Control. As usual they have included some nice subtleties in the way you can interact with it.

All the following tips apply when you already are in Mission Control and are from the perspective of someone not using gestures (no trackpad or Magic Mouse).

- You can use the Spacebar on a selected window to Quick Look its content.
- You can change the selected window (the one with the blue border) by using your mouse or by typing the beginning of the title of this window.
- You can enter the 'Application windows' mode by hitting Command+'.

 If you keep on hitting Command+' you will traverse all the open windows of an application for all the open applications on your system. Even applications with minimized windows are included.

Note that **Shift+Command** +` doesn't take you in the reverse direction.

That's it.



QuickTip

In Mac OS X Lion, Apple for some reason

want to scroll backwards. Here's how to undo that annoying behavior.

Simply open System Preferences, go to Trackpad, and uncheck the box at the top saying 'When using gestures to scroll or navigate, move content in the direction of finger movement.

[crarko adds: This was the very first thing I did after the scrolling in Safari started driving me nuts. I also found it absolutely essential to check 'Ignore accidental trackpad input, as the sensitivity of the Trackpad on the MacBook had been greatly increased.]

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

HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Saturday, June 18, 2017

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 South Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Michael King, Rick Roberts, Doug Smith, Ed Truitt, and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 12:59 p.m. by President Philip Booth, a quorum of voting members of the board being present.

General Announcments: Phil Booth thanked Rick Roberts, Doug Smith, and Greg Wright for their presentation on Cutting the Cable: New Ways to Watch TV at today's General Meeting.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Open: The minutes of the board meeting held on May 21, 2011, were unanimously approved as submitted.

Treasurer – **Clair Jaschke:** Clair Jaschke reported that HAAUG has more than \$10,000 in the bank, that all bills received have been paid, and that all monies received have been deposited. She has updated HAAUG's financial records through September 2010. She has still not received the \$300 check that the relatives of Irv Greenbaum donated to HAAUG after his death. Clair is investigating electing to receive electronic bank statements in lieu of paper statements.

1st Vice President – Programming – Greg Wright: Greg Wright reported that the Semi-Annual Swap Meet will be held on July 16, 2011. The following topics are being developed for the Main Presentation at remaining General Meetings this year:

2nd Vice President Facilities – Doug Smith: Doug Smith reported that Bellaire Civic Center is booked for HAAUG's monthly meetings through the end of the year, and rent has been paid to the City of Bellaire through September 2011. The board unanimously approved the payment of \$25 per month to the City of Bellaire for the use of the BCC's new overhead projector for the remainder of the year.

Membership – David Jaschke: David Jaschke reported that HAAUG had 179 members at the end of May 2011, a decline of four members from April 2011, and a decline of 26 members from May 2010. One new member joined HAAUG, and four members renewed their membership last month.

would have been the second change I would have made.) I am really a fan of the new Mail app: Apple made the right decision in re-writing this app to behave more like its iOS sibling, in my opinion.

As to the problems I encountered: there weren't many. I did have an issue with a medical web app, which I resolved by configuring the User-Agent string Safari sends (under the "Develop" menu) to fool the app into thinking I was running Snow Leopard. There was an updated needed for SuperDuper!, which was a quick download. (Note: I am still having some issues backing up with SuperDuper!, as it fails upon finding open Safari cache files. This may, or may not, be a Lion-related issue.) The last issue I had was related to Parallels: for some reason, my virtual machines would activate, but the windows would never appear. I had to delete all my desktops in Mission Control, then re-create them. It actually looks like you have to specifically pin the VM window to a desktop, as opposed to letting it be assigned to "None." A bug? Maybe.

I would point out that I haven't experienced any of the problems Dwight Silverman detailed in his post on TechBlog: SnapzProX didn't ask for a new registration code, and I didn't have to disable my A/V (however, I use Sophos instead of Avast!) Perhaps most importantly, I do not have (or at least I don't use) legacy apps which are dependent on Rosetta: No Quicken, no MS Office for Mac 2004, no Flip video transfer software (I use iMovie), no camera-specific utilities (I use Aperture, and the software from Olympus is Lion-ready.)

So far, Lion has proven so stable that I haven't had to "back off" to Snow Leopard (the 500 GB hard disk is sitting in a safe place, ready to respond if called upon though.) I am really enjoying the extra GB that my new hard drive brings to the table (though I really, really need to get a good backup taken, and either implement Time Machine or get a backup process in place.)

Now, all I have to do is pry my wife's MBP away from her for a few hours, and install Lion on it (who knows, maybe I'll swap out her hard disk with a new SSD?) proposed revisions that reduce the number of elected and voting board members from the current 16 to 9 and eliminate functions such as HAAUG Heaven that the members are no longer using. He anticipates submitting the revised By-Laws to the membership for adoption at the October General Meeting, with the revised By-Laws being effective January 1, 2012.

The new version of Mail in Lion has a nice Conversation



View, which shows messages in thread form (like Gmail). I like this view, but the main problem that I had with it was that, to see messages that you've sent in that conversation, you have to move to Sent Mail.

Luckily, Mail lets us show messages we've sent as well. Here's how to enable that:

Go to Mail » Preferences » Viewing. Under View Conversations, check the Include related messages box. Conversation view is now complete.

Amazon Fires Back: Amazon Cloud Reader

Earlier this year, Apple made a minor change to their iOs App framework, which sent shock waves rippling through the developer community. Want to offer in-app purchases? It is now enabled (though under a legal cloud, thanks to a patent lawsuit), but along with this change came a real shocker: if you offer extra content in-app, you

have to give Apple a 30% cut. And, you can't bypass this by sending the user to your website to make the purchase, via an in-app button. This really hit some of the eBook sellers (e.g. Amazon, Barnes & Noble), where their profit margin would be erased by that 30% cut. Sure enough, last month an update to various eReader apps came out, removing the "Buy" buttons.

Well, Amazon has fired what may be the opening salvo in the next campaign. They released their newest app, called "Amazon Cloud Reader". It runs on both "traditional" PCs running Windows, OS X, or Linux, as well as the iPad. It is a webbased app, written in HTML 5. While it currently works only on the Chrome and Safari browsers, support for others (including IE and Firefox) is on the roadmap. It does install an extension to allow you to read content while offline, and on the iPad will ask you for permission to use 50MB of database space to store downloaded content.

While it doesn't have all the features of the Kindle app for iOS, one very important feature (at least from Amazon's point of view) is back: the "Kindle Store" button, allowing you to shop directly from the app, is back in the upper-right hand corner.

I have used this app a bit (and plan to test it more extensively while on my upcoming business trip), and if it works as well as initial tests indicate, I can see this becoming the future of this type of app. After all, what's not to like about it? It's mobile, it's cross-platform, and you can use it whether connected or offline. The only one who might not like it is Apple, but right now Apple isn't exactly hurting for money - and so I don't think too many people will be crying tears on their account. What's ironic is that this is how Apple first posited "apps" for the iPhone - as web-based creations - had the capabilities of HTML 5 been available back then, just think how different the app landscape would be today.

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
