
We will be holding the first meeting of the 2012 Board of Directors after the SwapMeet, so be sure and be there!



Momentus® XT Solid State Hybrid Drive

I am living proof of the adage that one can never have too large, or too fast, a hard disk: my current MacBook Pro started out with a 320 GB drive. It was updated at time of purchase to 500 GB) and I replaced that with a 750 GB drive when they showed up for under \$100 (I always buy two, and use one for making a clone copy.) On the speed side: I am an inveterate cyber-squirrel, trying out different pieces of software, and never, ever deleting anything. This means that my system takes what seems like forever to boot up: when the startup time hit almost three minutes, I knew it was time to do something.

I considered replacing my hard drive with a solid state drive (SSD), but ran into a brick wall called "cost": current SSDs are way too expensive for my pocketbook. I then considered going with a small SSD for the boot/OS volume, and putting all my data (and possibly my apps) on a separate drive. Again, cost was an issue: and while I could have replaced my optical drive with a second internal hard drive, I watch the video on how to do this, and am not totally comfortable performing that level of surgery on my MBP.

Fortunately, once again Twitter (and our local tech blogger <u>Dwight Silverman</u>) came to the rescue: in mid-December, he sent out a Tweet about a hybrid drive I had been looking at. After confirming with him which size he had gotten, I went to <u>Amazon.com</u> and ordered one: a Seagate Momentus XT 750GB Solid State hybrid drive (model ST750LX003.)

The Momentus XT combines a 750GB, 7200 RPM hard drive (a 500 GB version is also available) with an 8GB SSD. It has a SATA 6Gb/s interface to the system, and the firmware in the drive manages which data is staged to the SSD to maximize performance. The cost, while higher than that of a regular HDD (current price at Amazon.com is \$239.63), is much more reasonable than a SSD.

Installation was the same as for a regular HDD, but because I am running OS X Lion, cloning the existing HDD data to the new drive required a different procedure. After swapping the drive out, I mounted the old HDD in an external case, connected it via FireWire, booted into Recovery Mode, then bringing up Disk Utility and using to to migrate the data from the existing disk to the new one. This is required in order to properly migrate both the regular OS X partition and the Recovery partition.

After a 6-hour long migration, I finally was able to boot up on the hybrid. The first time didn't seem any faster, but subsequent startups have gone much faster (the elapsed time went from almost 3 minutes to less than a minute.) Applications start much faster as well, with most apps not needing more than one "bounce" before they appear on the desktop.

If you are feeling "the need for speed", and want it on a budget, then the Momentus XT hybrid drive may be for you. For more information, <u>check out the product page on Seagate's web site</u>, and <u>Dwight Silverman's write-up on the drive in TechBlog</u>.

QuickTip

Looking to turn your holiday music off, but don't want to spend an hour clicking and scrolling through your iTunes library?

If you have an extensive collection of holiday songs in your iTunes library like I do (750 and counting) and it's time to turn the cheer off, here's an easy way to do it.

Assuming you have the songs all listed as 'Holiday,' do a search in iTunes for 'holiday.'

That will bring up only those songs. Select all of the songs found, then hold the Command button and click in the check box of any song. This will deselect ALL of them. Clear the search and you have your total library back, with Bing, Nat and the MacKenzie Brothers taking a well-earned rest. No more 'Grandma got run over by a Reindeer' till next Christmas!

[crarko adds: Simple but effective. Judicious use of playlists can accomplish the same feat.]

[**Ed. note:** you can also do the same thing by selectively syncing genres. In the "music" tab on the device in iTunes, select "Sync selected playlists, artists, albums, and genres", then go to the genres and uncheck "Holiday".]



QuickTip



Roll from the iPhone. Here is the solution I found.

Before iOS5, I'd never used the iTunes app to sync my photos. Instead, I've used the highly rated app called PhotoSync (wireless sync for iPhoto/iPhone). When doing this, my iPhone collected many photos, all 1561 of them and never deleted them. The solution was to mount the iPhone as a camera in Apple's Image Capture application. This allowed me to select my 1000 photos I didn't want and delete them with ease.

[crarko adds: Once again, Image Capture comes to the rescue. Note that iPhoto will either let you keep or delete all the images on an import, but doesn't give much choice beyond that.]



Minutes

HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Saturday, November 19, 2011

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 South Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Michael King, Ed Truitt, and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 12:56 p.m. by President Philip Booth, without a quorum of voting members of the board being present.

General Announcments: Philip Booth reported that Dwight Silverman's presentation on Mac OS X 10.7 Lion and iOS 5 at today's General Meeting was well done and appreciated. Phil thanked Greg Wright and others who helped arrange the meeting.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Open: The minutes of the board meeting held on October 15, 2011, were submitted to the board, but the board did not vote on the minutes due to a lack of a quorum of voting members. Phil Booth requested the secretary submit the minutes of the October 2011 board meeting for a vote by email of all of the voting members of the board.

Treasurer – Clair Jaschke: Clair Jaschke submitted written financial reports for October 2011 to the board. As of the end of last month, HAAUG had \$10,584 in its bank account. Clair advised the board that the bank will require new signature cards for the checking account once the new officers are elected and take office in January. The bank will also require a copy of the new By-Laws that the membership adopted at last month's General Meeting.

1st Vice President – Programming – Greg Wright: Reagan Atkinson is not available for the General Meeting on December 17, 2011. A photography panel discussion will be the Main Presentation at the December General Meeting. The Semi-Annual Swap Meet will be held on January 21, 2012. Bob LeVitus is confirmed for his annual "The State of Apple" address on February 18, 2012.

2nd Vice President Facilities – Doug Smith: Phil Booth reported that Bellaire Civic Center is reserved for the third Saturdays of each month for each month next year, with the exception of April, when HAAUG has the meeting space reserved for the fourth Saturday (April 28, 2012). Phil will contact the City of Bellaire about opening more ports in the Wi-Fi service in the building so as to allow for video chats.

Membership – **David Jaschke:** David Jaschke reported that HAAUG had 171 members at the end of October 2011, a decline of one member from September 2011. HAAUG had 198 members at the end of October 2010. Last month one new member joined, one lapsed member rewned, and five members renewed their membership, for a total of seven membership transactions.

SIG Coordinator – Open: No report.

Scam Alert!

Among the holiday traditions we enjoy: good times with friends and family; tasty feasts; and presents under the tree. Among those holiday traditions we could do without: email-based scams, seeking to con us into sending money to people who don't deserve it, or trying to steal our identities (online or otherwise.)

In an article titled "Apple billing e-mail scam making the rounds", Topher Kessler discusses a new scam which seems to target customers who may have received Apple products during the holiday season. Unlike the stereotypical scam letters, the spelling/grammar/punctuation of this email is nearly impeccable, and both the originating email address and the server "behind the link" appear legitimate. The author also shows screenshots of the actual pages on the Apple site related to logging in and account verification, to contrast with the fake pages. I would heartily recommend you read the article and look closely at the pages.

Unfortunately, malicious/scam emails are a fact of life. And, despite the best efforts of the security industry, some of them will always manage to get through, and find their way into our inboxes. Here are several things you can do, in order to avoid being caught up in the scam:

Remember: if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Some of these scams offer you a reward (not always legal) in return for some personal information.

Don't Click The Link. I would add "don't call the phone number on the email." If you feel the need to respond, then either enter the company's URL manually in your browser, or look up their phone number and call it yourself

If you didn't go looking for it, don't install it.

This is a corollary of the second rule, and is especially applicable to Mac users, since most malicious code gets onto these systems when the user installs it. If the email contains an attachment, or if a pop-up appears claiming you need to install a new driver or codec in order to view the contents... **DON'T!**

Following these (fairly) simple guidelines will help you keep your computer, and your identity, yours.

Review: Logitech Fold-up Keyboard for iPad 2.

I've had an iPad now since about a week after the original model came out. It has become my preferred device for reading email. However, the on-screen keyboard isn't the most user-friendly way to compose longish messages, so unless I can keep it short, I have tended to use my MacBook for actually writing email. For this reason, finding a usable external keyboard for use with my iPad has been a priority of mine.

I have tried several different keyboards. Most of them suffer from what is to me a major flaw: the keyboard isn't full-size. This means that either the keys are small, they are squished close together, or both. As a result, I am more prone to typos when using them. One notable exception is the Apple Wireless keyboard. It is quite comfortable to use, and combined with the <u>WINGStand</u>, makes a solid unit. The only problem is that it is not a one-piece setup, and the keyboard can be a hassle to cart around.

So, I read a message from <u>James Kendrick</u> on Twitter about a new keyboard he was reviewing, I was intrigued. I went and read <u>the review</u>, then clicked over to Amazon.com and ordered me one. It arrived just in time to make it under the tree, and I have been using it ever since Christmas.

What made this keyboard attractive to me wasn't the Transformer-like action (pictured at left), but the fact that it is a full-size keyboard. So far, I have not been disappointed. In addition to using this keyboard for email composition, I have started using it with the iPad to take notes. As you may know, I am a blogger of TV food competition shows, and I have found the ability to take notes, and compose a blog post from them later (when I am awake) indispensable. While I can take notes with the on-screen keyboard, using the Logitech I am able to take notes faster (always a plus when a DVR/replay button isn't available), with less hand fatigue.

Now, if I can just find a good app for actually composing blog posts, I'll be set!

I would be remiss if I failed to mention the few "minuses" I have found with this keyboard. First of all is the price: at around \$130, this isn't a cheap option. Another downside (which this shares with all other iPad keyboards) is that, as a wireless device, you shouldn't even think of using this while on an airplane. It also holds the iPad in the horizontal (landscape) position when the keyboard is in use. Lastly, it makes the iPad a heavier, and bulkier, device (fortunately, it is very easy to remove the iPad from the case when using it as a tablet.)
