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
Saturday, February 18th



# Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President



Dear HAAUG,

The major Apple news was the tremendous holiday quarter that the company turned in. Quoting from the Apple press release "The Company posted record quarterly revenue of \$46.33 billion and record quarterly net profit of \$13.06 billion, or \$13.87 per diluted share." "The Company sold 37.04 million iPhones in the quarter."..."Apple sold 15.43 million iPads during the quarter,"..."The Company sold 5.2 million Macs during the quarter," all of those numbers represented large increases over the the previous year's quarter. It was reported that Apple is sitting on 100 million dollars, an amount of cash equal to twice the debt of Greece! Instead of paying a dividend, Apple uses the cash to purchase long term contracts for LCD screens, processors, disk drives, and memory, which allows the company to predict production costs over a long period of time.

As I stated above, the annual Mac extravaganza was held recently. It was rebranded as Macworld I iWorld and attempted to cover the whole range of Apple products. From what I read in the blogs, it was given decent reviews. With Apple and other major software vendors no longer participating, the show will likely never have the draw that it once had.

I was driving to work the other day and noticed the large AT&T store on the Southwest Freeway and reflected on how little I depended on AT&T to support my iPhone. They are my network provider, and the device would not work without them. But I do not get iOS updates from them, I do not have them repair my phone, and I do not buy apps from them. Apple provides all of the support for the unit. If you have an iPhone, you know that your device will not materially change, except about once a year. As long as your iPhone is new enough the iOS updates will work with your device. I do not own an Android phone (nor have I ever looked at getting one), but I have noticed that the handset makers are bringing out new models every six months or so. Google is depending on the carriers to get OS updates to their customers. That is the fundamental difference between Apple and the rest of the cell phone hardware industry. Apple considers you the iPhone owner to be its customer. The rest of the industry considers the cellphone carrier to the their customer.

I was having some problems with my internet service thanks to some hungry squirrels, but I was able to get it repaired. It is amazing to me how much we depend on the internet for communication, and other activities as well. I am also amazed, especially at work, how inefficient something like email is. I will get messages with questions and it sometimes takes 4 or five emails to get a result that is satisfactory to both parties. This is why groups like HAAUG still exist. Yes you can get a wealth of information from the net, but talking face to face with another person allows both parties to come away from the experience knowing that they, and each other, understood what went on. Do not get me wrong: email is a great way to get information to another person quickly; but I still like talking on the phone or meeting someone face to face. It allows me to ask the questions that might not get asked in an email exchange. Despite the length of this column I find it very hard to communicate in written form. And, I suspect there are many others like me out there.

# **Editorial: Take Your Apple To Work**

Like many HAAUG members, I remember the days when Apple computers were no stranger to the halls of commerce. In fact, during the early to mid 1990s, part of my responsibilities as an IT support professional included providing support to my company's population of Mac users. (Incidentally, most of that support was in the form of answering questions regarding the Windows applications that were running on the PowerMacs that had Windows cards installed.)

But then, changing circumstances led to Apple's banishment from many workplaces. The perception that Windows PCs were cheaper (due in part to Microsoft's allowing PC vendors to include a "free" copy of Office with every PC purchased), and the desire to achieve the nirvana of standardization, were two of the major players in this shift.

A new shift seems to be underway, and Apple products (led by the iPad and, to a lesser extent, the iPhone) seem to be making their way back into the business world. And, in a nod toward the reality of a new generation of knowledge workers, some companies are even reevaluating their policies concerning the use of "personal tech" on the job.

These are exciting times to be in IT support, to be certain. Of course, there are some minefields which need to be navigated, and carefully.

The first minefield has to do with the need to separate personal "stuff" (data and apps) from business "stuff" - something the iPad and iPhone, with their single-user paradigm, aren't all that good at. But, there is hope - since iOS naturally sandboxes data, and provides some limits on sharing data across apps, companies have a natural choke point for managing data. Actually, they have two: if they write apps using HTML 5 instead of XCode, the data can remain where it belongs - on the corporate systems, where it can be backed up, and access-controlled, and all those other things companies do to protect their valuable information.

The second minefield is one that Microsoft had to navigate during the last decade. I am speaking of security vulnerabilities and the patches needed to fix them. Despite our protestations to the contrary, Microsoft has done a very good job here - their OS and apps are getting more secure with each version, and their patches normally apply without problems. Compare this to the recent Security Update for OS X, which caused application crashes in Lion, and broke Rosetta apps in Snow Leopard. This is one area where Apple needs to learn from what Microsoft has done, and get their act together - because when the result is a business disruption, failure (of security patches to install and work properly) is NOT an option.

The last minefield (at least, the last I will talk about here) is the need of Corporate IT staff to learn to live in a world where they don't control everything. Many corporate IT types are scared witless of the barbaric hordes of Apple/Android/homebuilt devices getting on their network and messing things up. This is a case where standards have to be carefully thought out, and communicated to the user community. While not an easy task, the result (if done properly) will be an IT environment which really does help users to be more productive, while saving the company some significant dollars.

## QuickTip

M a y b e e v e r y b o d y already knows this, but I missed it in all the new features of iOS 5. The iPad mail app adds a new gesture to show and hide the message list window when in portrait orientation.

I always use my iPad's Mail app in landscape mode because I get to see my message list in addition to the message detail. And for some reason, I find it tedious to push the mailbox button at the top left of the screen to see the message list. iOS 5 added the ability to swipe right anywhere on the message window to pop up the message list and to swipe left to hide it again. Nice! Not having to move my finger six inches has somehow made portrait mode much more bearable for me.



## QuickTip



This hint describes how to easily see all the emails in one conversation

without having to open them and scroll through.

If you have your emails 'organized by conversation' you will see in the email list in the left column the number of emails in that conversation. You can just click on the email showing in the left-hand column and hit the Right arrow key. This causes all the emails in that conversation be shown in a drop-down list by date, one on each line, below the latest one. To undo the list, press the Left arrow key.

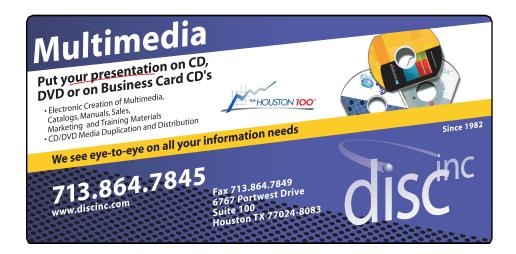

**Attendees:** Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Michael King, Rick Roberts, Ed Truitt, and Greg Wright.

**Call to order:** 1:17 p.m. by President Philip Booth, a quorum of voting members of the board being present, following the conclusion of the December General Meeting.

**General Announcments:** Philip Booth thanked those who led the panel discussion on photography, including Andrew Polk, Michael King, Ed Truitt and Greg Wright, at today's General Meeting.

#### **MONTHLY REPORTS:**

**Secretary – Open:** Phil Booth announced that following last month's board meeting, the minutes of the board meeting held on October 15, 2011, were approved as submitted by an electronic vote of the voting members of the board. The board unanimously approved the minutes of the board meeting held on November 19, 2011, as submitted.

It is coming up on tax season again, which means it is also time for the scammers to fire up their spamming programs. Follow a few common-sense tips, and hopefully you won't fall victim to their evil, scamming ways!

**Tip 1:** The IRS does not initiate official communications with taxpayers via email. If you get a notice about your refund, or advising you of a delinquency, it is very likely a scammer.

**Tip 2:** If you are still concerned that the email may in fact be official: *Don't click on any links* that appear on the email, and *don't open any files* that are attached! In fact, if you are to hover your mouse over the link, you might be surprised where that URL takes you! Last I heard, the IRS does not use servers in .ru land (Russia) to host taxpayer-interactive web apps, nor do they use Hotmail (regardless of the country) for their email.

**Tip 3:** Even if there are no links, or file attachments, be careful about responding. For example, the email my provide a toll-free number to call: this number may very well lead to a call center specializing in phishing and identity theft. If you feel you have to call the IRS, look up their number in the local phone book, or get it through an official web site (e.g. <a href="http://www.irs.gov">http://www.irs.gov</a>) and dial the number yourself.

Last year saw a rash of scams revolving around the failure/rejection of electronic payments made through the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS). So far this year, I have been getting a rash of emails from "INTUIT INC." asking me to correct my information as part of the "Internal Revenue Service [IRS] Name and TIN Matching Program". Whether it is one of these, or something else entirely - don't fall for it!

## QuickTip

As you know, Lion locks files that have not been changed



for 2 weeks, so that you have to unlock them before editing them.

There is a control to change the length of time before a file is 'locked' by Lion.

In System Preferences » Time Machine » Options, there is a control to set the length of time after the last edit before files are locked.

The options are 1 day, 1 week, 2 weeks (default), 1 month, 1 year.

I presume that there's a corresponding plist setting that you can 'defaults write' to values not in the dropdown list.

# Digital Photography: New MILCs Announced

If you are one of those who held on to some of their Christmas cash, and are in the market for a new camera, you may be in luck. Several vendors have just announced, or are about to announce, new offerings in the MILC (Mirrorless Interchangeable Lens Camera) genre.

The MILC - also known as EVIL (Electronic Viewfinder Interchangeable Lens) camera, combines many of the features found in the DSLR with the small size and light weight found in the Point & Shoot (P&S) cameras. The genre is well represented by the Micro 4.3 (M.4/3) offerings from Olympus and Panasonic, and Nikon recently entered the field with their J1 and V1 models.

This type of camera is getting increased exposure in the enthusiast and even the pro circles. Trey Ratcliffe (author of several books on photography, as well as the popular app 100 Cameras in 1 for the iPad [iTunes link] and the iPhone), recently explained in his article DSLRs are a dying breed - 3rd gen Cameras are the future why he will no longer be buying any new DSLR equipment - bodies or lenses. While his opinion is shared by a minority of the pro community at this time, the need for a large, heavy mirror and pentaprism has passed (mostly), and the iPhone has proven that smaller can be better (or at least as good) as single-purpose P&S or entry-level DSLR cameras.

The first announcement came from Pentax. Their new camera, the K-01, is an slr-style body with a 16 megapixel, APC-C size sensor; a 3 inch LCD screen; and built-in (sensor-shift) IS. It will shoot from ISO 100-25600. The camera is designed to accept Pentax K-mount lenses. It does not come with an eye level viewfinder. It comes in several colors, and has a kit lens (the 40mm f/2.8) which is the thinnest "pancake" lens I have ever seen. It should be available in March, and can be pre-ordered at Amazon.com for \$899.95.

The second announcement has been in the rumor mill for some time, and was made public on Feb 7. It is the long-awaited M.4/3 version of the venerable Olympus OM 35mm film camera. The images of this new camera reveal an SLR-like body style, but with an EVF where the optical viewfinder normally resides; an extended grip/battery pack; and a tilt-able (but not fully articulated) OLED screen. The camera has the designation of OM-D (for "Digital"), though it is also called the E-5M. The price (body only) is \$999.99. Two features that set this camera apart (other than the built-in EVF): the 16 MP sensor that will go up to ISO 25600, and the fact that the body is weather-sealed (like the E-5 DSLR.) There is also a new lens: a weather-sealed 12-50mm zoom, this lens is already appearing on the B&H site at a price of \$499 (list.) The OM-D is available for pre-order on Amazon.com, either body-only or with a lens.

Is 2012 the year you will get something new in your camera bag? The thought is certainly crossing my mind!

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
