

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

I had the day off on March 16th, and as I had decided that I wanted an iPad, I went and stood in line at the Galleria on the launch day for the new iPad. This was my

second time to be involved in a launch day, since I bought my iPhone 4 the first day is was available. I find it interesting that Apple fans can now be considered the "non-thinking drones", listening to (and mindlessly following the orders of) their "Great Leader", of the 1984 Apple Ad.

Dear HAAUG,

Apple has "the launch day" down: I got in at the end of the line, a store employee came by and asked me what kind of iPad I wanted, and handed me a card with my iPad configuration on it. "We can only guarantee we will have it if you stay in line." he said: that being said, I wasn't planning on leaving. That was at 7:15, so I had forty five minutes until the store opened. The line did not grow much longer, so I figured that the store would have the stock. I opted to go to the Galleria store instead of the new store in Highland Village, because I did not know what the parking would be like. More on the new store later.

Apple dropped the green flag, and the line was off to the races! I doubt that I was in a moving line more than 10 minutes: Apple must have had every employee in the store, so as fast as one person was finished, another went in. Once I got in the store and gave the card to an employee, she left me looking at the smart covers while she went to get the iPad. (White, 32 gig, ATT) She was back, I handed her my credit card, and the transaction was finished quickly. She then pointed me toward the expert that was assisting in the setup of the machines, and I went through the setup. Total time in the store: maybe 20 minutes. I was back in my car at 8:37. So I am an iPad owner and now I have to fill it up with apps.

We had a very successful meeting in March. I want to thank Doug Smith for a great presentation on cable alternatives. I also want to thank the members who participated in the Apple TV lottery. The club made \$292, which was \$190 more than the cost of the Apple TV. To put it in another perspective: that \$192.00 is a little more than two months rent for the Bellaire Civic Center. This will allow the club to bring in more speakers like Bob LeVitus. We are contacting some of the Mac luminaries to see if we can get them to come to a meeting.

A committee of the board is in the process of auditing the clubs financial records from the last three years. The committee should finish the audit with in the next two months, and will publish the results when they are finished. I want to assure the membership that the club's finances are good: even though we have not performed this important function in the past few years, the club is solvent.

After the March meeting, several of us decided to go see the new Apple Store in Highland Village. Apple has created a beautiful store. It has glass walls at the front and back, so you can see through the store. it also has a glass roof. This store is the

Security Beat

Last month, this column was devoted to the Flashback trojan - a nasty piece of malware that targeted Macs, exploiting a vulnerability in Java that Oracle had patched back in February (but that Apple had not yet gotten around to issuing a patch for.) Since then, a number of things have happened: a Russian security firm released a report indicating more than 500,000 Macs were infected with Flashback, which was later confirmed by well-known security vendor Kaspersky (that number later climbed to over 600,000, before dropping as systems were dis-infected); instructions for determining if your Mac was infected, consisting of a series of Terminal commands, was published; Apple released, not one, not two, but *three* Security Updates for Java in a period of about a week; and Apple has also released a standalone removal tool for the most common variants of Flashback worm, intended for systems running OS X "Lion" which don't have Java installed, which you can get here.

With the third security update, Java on OS X is now at Java SE 6 version 1.6.0_31. In addition to this, Apple configured the Java web plug-in to disable the automatic execution of Java applets. If you want to re-enable this feature, you can do so via the Java Preferences application (in the **Utilities** subfolder):

however, you should note that if the plug-in detects that no Java applets have been run for "an extended period of time" (<u>per Houston Chronicle tech blogger Dwight</u> <u>Silverman, this is actually 30 days</u>), it will disable automatic execution once again.

QuickTip

While the small, sleek aluminum remote that



comes with the Apple TV is nice, it may be one too many. The Apple TV can work with many other infrared remotes, and <u>an</u> <u>Apple technical document</u> outlines the procedure for having the Apple TV "learn" your remote.

You'll need to use the Apple remote to set this up, and you do so by choosing Settings > General > Remotes from the Apple TV's interface. Choose Learn Remote, and press the six buttons that the Apple TV needs to learn.

Some remotes may not work, so read Apple's technical document for more information.

QuickTip

In previous versions of OS X, you used to be able to quickly

search for messages from a given domain just by typing it in on the search field. On Lion, this is a pain, because Mail tries to guess the actual sender a never lets you look at all the messages.

As a workaround, if you type "from:@domain" you will see messages from all email addresses from that domain. You can also use "to:@domain" to look for the messages that were sent to an email address at a given domain.

largest Houston store, and will take some of the load off of the Galleria store. Go by if you have a chance.

Last, but not least: Mort Butler, a long time HAAUG member and leader, passed away on March 23rd. Mort served in many leadership positions: in his last post as the Software Librarian, he was responsible for creating the many monthly member CDs. Mort was a field service engineer in his early career, and a freelance Macintosh support consultant. After retiring, he moved away from the Houston area. We send our sincere sympathies to Mort's wife and family for their loss. While this additional layer of protection may prove irksome for those of us who infrequently use Java applets, those who either (1) use Java applets often, or (2) use Java applets never, should see little impact from this. Except, of course, for the latter group, who will be protected against malicious Java code automatically running in an outdated, un-patched version of the software.

Now that the brouhaha has subsided, let's take a look at what lessons we can take away from this:

This wasn't a "Mac virus"...: it was actually a Trojan downloader, which targeted a vulnerability in the Java application running on Mac OS X.

...but that doesn't really matter! Because, if you find yourself with an infected Mac, does it really matter whether it was a "virus", "trojan", "fake A/V", or whether it exploited a vulnerability in the OS, in an included application (e.g. Safari, Java), or in a 3rd-party app (e.g. Adobe Reader, Microsoft Office)?

Patch, Patch, Patch! Apple still has a ways to go to get where Microsoft is with their security updates. That being said, if you are presented with a security-related update via Apple's **Software Update**, by all means install it - STAT! Same goes for security patches to 3rd-party apps. Better yet: if the app offers a feature to automatically check for and install updates, enable it.

The old paradigms don't necessarily hold true any

longer...: It used to be that, by avoiding the lessdesirable locations on the 'Net, you could remain fairly save from malware. Not any more: so many "legitimate" web sites have been compromised, that your Mac can pick up something nasty from almost any place.

...but, there is no need to get *too* **paranoid.** By taking prudent steps, and staying aware of what is happening out in the world, you can continue to keep your Mac running, safe and sound.

QuickTip

The other day on Twitter, Macworld



senior editor Dan Frakes mentioned that he had accidentally discovered an undocumented keyboard shortcut to delete messages in Mail. My guess is that he just leaned on his keyboard, but he figured out, after deleting a number of messages, that this shortcut is Control-H.

This makes sense, as this is the Unix keybinding for the Backspace or Delete key (see this Wikipedia article), and OS X uses these shortcuts, at least in Cocoa applications; you can use the Control-H shortcut to delete text in those applications that use the Cocoa text input framework. But its use to delete messages in Mail is interesting. If anyone discovers other apps where this works, post them in the comments.

"Mark my words: you can create content in an iPad. And it's only going to get better."

Last month, I looked at the newly-released Photoshop Touch for iPad, and ended with the quote above. Little did I know that the next shot in the content creation battle would come almost before the ink was dry (figuratively speaking). <u>iPhoto for iOS</u> was released a little over a week after <u>Adobe Photoshop Touch</u> made its debut: at half the price (\$4.99 vs. \$9.99), it is certainly more budget-friendly. Like the Adobe product, iPhoto for iOS is not compatible with the original iPad: however, it will run on an iPhone (which Photoshop Touch won't do.)

When you open the app, you are presented with a view of your current albums from the **Photos** app. When you open, and then touch the "Edit" button, a whole lot of little icons appear at the top and the bottom.

What are all these things? Simply touch the "Help" icon (the one with the question mark), and a whole lot of text bubbles appear, to tell you what each button represents. You will find a lot of features similar to those in iPhoto on the Mac, as well as some help items specifically related to the touch screen interface. One feature that I have found particularly useful: on the "Share" menu, there is an option called "Beam". If enabled, this feature will allow you to wirelessly send images from iPhoto to another iOS device running iPhoto, provided that both are on the same wireless network (they use Bonjour for device discovery, which is why this

requirement exists.) I have used this to "transfer" photos taken with my iPhone to my iPad, where they can be edited in a larger screen. Of course, with the improved camera in the new iPad, you can also get some pretty good images without needing a separate device (the image being edited above was actually taken with my iPad.) Unfortunately, you can't use this feature to send images to iPhoto on the Mac (though you can use the Photo Stream feature of iCloud for this purpose.)

So, if you can only have one, which should you get: Photoshop Touch or iPhoto for iOS? I haven't decided on a clear favorite yet: both apps have a lot of features. However, if price is your main concern, or if you need something that will run on an iPhone, then iPhoto for iOS is your best bet.
