We'll see you there on the 18th!







Apple announced its third quarter results, showing the company is still selling iPhones, iPads and Macs. Quoting from the press release: the company had revenue of \$35 Billion with a net profit of \$8.8 Billion for the quarter that ended on June 30. They also declared a dividend of \$2.65 per share. This is not bad for a company that was on its last legs only 15 years ago. The next event for Apple is a rumored release of a new iPhone and the release of iOS 6 in September. There is speculation of a half size iPad that might be shown at that time, but that is speculation at best.

The Board meets after every meeting, and I am happy to say that we have the rest of the year planned out. We also have a stable location for our meetings, and we have money in the bank. What I would like to see is some new faces helping out. It is very important that we have a few new faces in the leadership. Security Beat

We now have a new "cat" to put on our Macs: OS X 10.8, a.k.a. "Mountain Lion". While this is being called an incremental upgrade from Lion, there are some security features I feel are worthy of mention. These features range from "playing catch-up to Windows" to "potentially game-changing".

The first feature that merits discussion here is Address Space Layout Randomization (ASLR). This one sort of falls in the "playing catch-up" category, as it has been implemented in the Windows OS since Vista. Although present in OS X since 10.5 ("Leopard"), it became an effective mechanism for protecting applications from arbitrary code execution exploits with OS X 10.7 ("Lion"), and in Mountain Lion this protection has been extended to the kernel and kernel extensions. ASLR makes the job of the bad guys much harder, as they are unable to reliably predict where vulnerable code actually resides in real memory, which makes "stack-smashing" type of attacks much less likely to succeed. ASLR, along with User Account Control (UAC), has led to recent versions of Windows being much more secure, and its incorporation into OS X at this level should help Mac users keep their systems (relatively) malware-free.

Another feature from "Lion" that is being enhanced in Mountain Lion is the use of "sandboxing" to help reign in applications. In the strictest sense, sandboxed applications are prohibited from reading from (and, more importantly from a malware-prevention standpoint, writing to) areas of the system (such as memory or file system) that the application doesn't "own". From what I can tell, Mountain Lion uses a less-strict form of sandboxing, in which applications must explicitly request (and secure) your permission before performing such operations against resources on your Mac not owned by the application. This will improve security by preventing rogue or poorly-written applications from damaging your system or files without giving you an opportunity to intervene: however, I fear that, unless this is implemented well, it could easily turn into the type of "just click OK to make the annoying message window go away" scenario we saw with UAC in Windows Vista, and with invalid SSL certificates in almost every browser out there. (Note: I have not yet actually seen this in action, and so I am forced to speculate a bit.)

Another feature that has seen an incremental improvement is "software update": in Mountain Lion, checks for updated software are made on a daily basis. In addition, the expanded use of the Mac App Store provides an easy mechanism to monitor for updates to applications: this will help protect against exploits targeting out-of-date, vulnerable apps (such vulnerable apps are a favorite target of the bad guys.) I have used a software monitoring application, Secunia PSI, to help protect my Windows system for several years, and I am glad to see this type of protection extended to OS X.

And, finally, we arrive at the potential game-changer. A new feature in Mountain Lion, called <u>Gatekeeper</u>, will help keep your Mac safe by providing you (or your IT administrator, if you provide, or have someone who provides, that function) with a

QuickTip

By default Gatekeeper allows you to run apps from the Mac App Store



and from verified developers. You can change this setting in the Security preference pane. If you use this setting, or the Mac App Store only setting, you can still run unsigned apps. Just Control- or right-click on an app and choose Open. Gatekeeper will display a dialog asking if you're sure you want to open the application.

[kirkmc adds: There is an extensive article on Macworld about Gatekeeper, but I felt this would be good to mention as a hint. I think most readers of this site won't use the restrictive settings, but you may work with others who do, or administer computers, and may want to launch unapproved apps on those computers from time to time.]

QuickTip

Applications such as TextEdit and the iWork apps have the

new iCloud storage window. This window displays when you open the applications, or when you choose Open from one of the apps. If you click on the iCloud button, it shows a linen-background panel; if you click on On My Mac, you see a standard Open dialog.

If you have a lot of files on iCloud, you may want to make folders to group them. This isn't obvious from the panel, but if you are familiar with iOS, the trick is easy. Just drag one file on top of another to create a folder, just as you do with apps on iOS. Double-click on the name to change it. You can move files into and out of folders, and when there are no files left in a folder, it disappears.

Adjourned: 1:03 p.m.



means to limit from where applications can be installed. The options (from most to least strict) are:

- Allow apps downloaded from the Mac App Store only;
- Allow apps downloaded from the Mac App Store, and from "identified developers";
- Allow apps downloaded from anywhere

The idea is that apps downloaded from the Mac App Store, being vetted by Apple, will be the safest to download; and apps from "identified developers", while less secure than those from the App Store, will at least have a "paper trail" which will identify the authors of malicious/mis-behaving apps, and will allow Apple to block such apps by revoking the developer's certificate.

This feature, if implemented and used properly, can almost guarantee a malware-free Mac. The main weakness I see in the current implementation is that it only checks when an app is downloaded and run for the first time: if this were extended to check each time an app was launched, one could "lock down" a system quickly, and prevent potentially unsafe apps previously downloaded an installed from running (at least without specific user authorization: check the Quick Tip in the sidebar on Page 3 for details.) Gatekeeper brings the level of protection from potentially rogue apps previously found in iOS and corporate IT environments to the Mac-using consumer.

While not all Mac users are able to upgrade to Apple's newest cat (and many of those who can, would be well advised to wait until their critical apps are tested and updated as necessary, to work properly under Mountain Lion), whose who do are positioned to reap the benefits of the improved security available with this new version of OS X.

QuickTip

S in ce Mountain Lion was released, I find that my Macs go



to sleep when I don't want them to. I had my Energy Saver preferences set to 15 minutes, but I've noticed that when something is active, such as a download, they got to sleep after 15 minutes, rather than continue with the download. This is not only incorrect behavior, but it's very annoying. What's worse, when I changed the setting to Never, they would still go to sleep during long downloads.

The Ask Different blog pointed out that there is a new command in Mountain Lion called caffeinate. This keeps the system awake, or, as the man page says, "prevent the system from sleeping on behalf of a utility."

Run it as follows in Terminal:

caffeinate -u -t 3600

3600 in the above command is the number of seconds to keep the system awake. What's interesting is that you can effectively set your Mac to shut down at a specific time (that is, the built-in sleep mechanism will start counting when that time runs out). You can also run the command alone to keep your Mac awake until you stop it by pressing Control-C.

Review: Olympus M.ZUIKO DIGITAL ED 12-50mm F3.5-6.3 EZ Lens

Early this year, Olympus announced a new "dream camera" - the OM-D EM-5. At the same time, they announced a new kit lens - the M.ZUIKO DIGITAL ED 12-50mm F3.5-6.3 EZ lens. While I haven't purchased the EM-5 (yet), I did pick up the 12-50 zoom lens from Amazon.com. Since April, it has become my main "go to" lens, and is the one most likely to be mounted on my Olympus PEN E-P3.

The 12-50mm zoom lens has a 35mm equivalent focal length of 24-100mm, very close to Canon's 24-105mm "L" zoom, another favorite lens of mine. I have found this range (from wide angle to medium telephoto) a good all-around lens for general use, as it handles landscapes/scenics as well as portraits. The maximum aperture of F/3.5-6.3 is a bit too slow for low-light work (when I tend to use my 17mm f/2.8 or my 45mm f/1.8), but works fine for well-lit shots (especially given the in-body image stabilization Olympus built into their digital cameras.)

This lens also has a "close-up/macro" mode, providing 0.72x magnification and a closest focusing distance of 7.87 in. at 86mm focal length (35mm equivalent.) Olympus designed this lens to be both dust and splash proof, to complement the E-M5. The AF system is powered by a very quiet motor, to minimize distracting lens noise while shooting video. And (again, a first for M4/3 lenses from Olympus) it has both a manual and motorized zoom mechanism, which also enhances the video-shooting experience.

But, enough of the dry recital of specs and features. How does this lens work in real life, and what kinds of images can it make?

I have used it in a variety of shooting situations, photographing everything from my lunch (yes, I am one of those people) to flowers to the downtown Houston skyline to the animated beasts at the special exhibit of DINOSAURS! At The Houston Zoo. I have used both the manual and motorized zoom functions, as well as the macro setting. All of them work smoothly, though I do seem to have trouble remembering "zoom in" vs. "zoom out" when using the motorized zoom. The AF tracks smoothly, and locks in quickly and accurately. It is incredibly quiet. The lens has a filter size of 52mm, allowing me to use the same filters as I use on my other M4/3 lenses (a nice cost-saving measure.) As you can see from the images of the hibiscus and the downtown skyline, the lens gives good resolution across the focal length range. And, at a weight of 7.4 ounces, it is a featherweight which provides heavyweight performance.

The only downside to this lens: it doesn't come with a lens hood (though you can buy one for \$35 from Olympus.) For a lens with a list price of almost \$500, this is something I would expect to be included.
