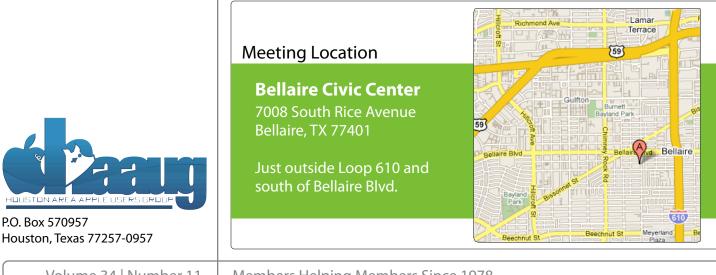

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President

The October meeting was a great success with a large crowd attending the presentation by Macworld Sr Editor Christopher Breen. His remarks explained the

changes to Apple and the Mac Interface. It was great to have him here in person, and he has tentatively agreed to return next year. Chris's visit attracted people from as far away as San Antonio and even Michigan. This month our meeting will be photo centric as we welcome Reagan Atkinson from Houston Camera Exchange, for his Digital Camera Update.

Dear HAAUG,

Just like an abundant Fall harvest, we were blessed by a bounty of Apple news at the end of October. On October 23, Apple hosted a "small" announcement event. I read many sites that either report or comments on Apple news; not one site I consulted had any rumor that Apple would announce anything but the Mini iPad. I was surprised when almost all of Apple's product line was refreshed. The first announcement was a new 13" Macbook Pro with a Retina display. This joins the 15" MBP with Retina display that was introduced earlier this year. The iMac was redesigned; Apple removed the optical drive allowing it to make the computer thiner. You can specify either the Core i5 or i7 quad core processors, and an array of hard drives including Apple's Fusion drive - a hybrid solid state drive (SSD) and hard drive. The Fusion Drive will automatically move files and applications between the SSD and the hard drive depending how often it is used. The Mac Mini was also given a refresh, with new processors, Thunderbolt, and USB 3.0 ports.

The star of the show was the new smaller iPad Mini, but Apple also released a newer version of the iPad with a new processor, and the Lighting connector replacing the dock connector. So for all those folks who bought a third generation iPad, you (we) now have an iPad that does the same thing that it did 24 hours earlier. It is just not the latest and greatest. Why Apple did that is anyones guess, but I am sure that they wanted to unify the line with the same connectors as the new iPhone and iPod Touch.

A few days later, Apple released its fiscal 4th quarter financial results. In what has become the expected outcome, the company reported record results. Some of the highlights include: sales of 30 million iPhones in the quarter, with most being iPhone 5s; the company reported revenues of \$36 Billion with net profit \$8 billion; and Apple declared a dividend of \$2.65 per share payable in November. Even though the quarter beat the last year's results, many analysts decried the report that the results were not as good as they, the analysts, had predicted. In spite of the nay sayers, Apple is still a going concern and will be around for a while.

When it rains, it pours - Apple announced a major management shakeup, with Scott Forestall removed from his job as head of iOS development, and John Browett (recently hired as head of retail) was fired. Several Apple managers have had their duties expanded. Forestall was retained as a special adviser.

Security Beat



VIRUS

In the last month, three security updates have been released by Apple. Let's begin today by going over each one of them briefly, shall we?

Java for OS X 2012-006 and Java for Mac OS X 10.6 Update 11: released back on October 16. This update is available for Mac OS X v10.6.8, Mac OS X Server v10.6.8, OS X Lion v10.7 or later, OS X Lion Server v10.7 or later, and OS X Mountain Lion v10.8 or later. This update signals a major change in direction for Apple on Java support: when you apply the update, it completely disables the Java applet plug-in, and directs the user to install the latest version from Oracle's web site. While having the latest version of Java is always a good idea (this update fixes no fewer than 20 vulnerabilities, including some in the dreaded "arbitrary code execution" category), updating Java is always problematic, as many Java applications tend to break when Java is updated. For this reason, Apple has provided a means to re-enable the original Java applet plug-in (see the "Quick Tip" in the sidebar on this page for more information on how to do this.)

<u>Safari 6.0.2</u>: released on November 1. This update is available for OS X Lion v10.7.5, OS X Lion Server v10.7.5, and OS X Mountain Lion v10.8.2. This update fixes two vulnerabilities in Webkit, which if exploited successfully could result in arbitrary code execution (which is tech-speak for "your computer is now the property of the bad guys, to do with as they see fit.")

iOS 6.0.1 Software Update: also released on November 1. This update is available for iPhone 3GS and later, iPod touch (4th generation) and later, and iPad 2 and later. In addition to several bug fixes, this addresses vulnerabilities in the iOS kernel (1), in Passcode lock (1), and in Webkit (2). Exploitation of these vulnerabilities could allow an attacker to execute arbitrary code, to access the Passbook bypassing the lock screen, or to bypass security protections built in to iOS. This update can be downloaded directly to the iOS device over a WiFi connection (about 70 MB), or installed via iTunes (about a 700 MB download.)

In other security-related news:

Hurricane Sandy slammed the eastern US, from the Atlantic coast to the Great Lakes. NYC and New Jersey were especially hard hit, and some popular web sites experienced outages when the large data centers in the area went down. Unlike other disasters of this type, Sandy didn't produce a significant number of scam "donation" sites seeking to rip off those looking to assist the storm victims. A reminder: in the aftermath of a disaster, it is always best to donate to a known charity, such as the <u>American Red Cross</u>.

<u>Spotted over on CNN Tech</u>: the latest list of 25 most common passwords has been released. The most common password (gleaned from password lists

"This update uninstalls the Apple-provided Java applet plug-in from all web browsers. To use applets on a web page, click on the region labeled "Missing plug-in" to go download the latest version of the Java applet plug-in from Oracle."

If you wish to re-enable the original Java applet plug-in - which is not uninstalled, as claimed above, but simply disabled - Apple has published a <u>technical note</u> explaining how to do this. There are a few Terminal commands, including creating a couple of symlinks. The technical note also explains how to disable Java Web Start.

The technical note also gives a URL where you can download the <u>Oracle Java 7 JRE</u>, which will be the future version of Java for OS X.

example. To do this, use an address with your name, a plus sign (+), then a tag. For example: myname +tag@icloud.com. This also works with mac.com and me.com addresses.

With these tags, you can set up rules in Mail or another e-mail client to sort or redirect messages as desired.

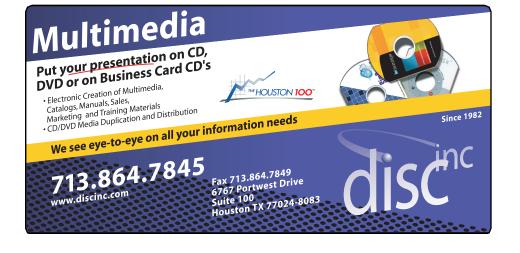

With iOS 6, you can now add different signatures for different e-mail



accounts, but you can also add logos, links and styled text.

If you have an HTML or styled signature in Mail on OS X, do the following: 1. Send an e-mail to your account with the signature from OS X. 2. Open the e-mail on your iOS device, then tap and hold the signature text. 3. Select all the text and images of your signature, and then copy it. 4. Go to Settings > Mail, contacts and Calendars > Signature. In the text field, tap and hold again to display the Paste menu and paste your signature.

Only styled text (bold, italic or underlined), plus images and links will be copied. Text colors or font sizes will not.

[kirkmc adds: We had <u>a hint</u> giving a much more complex way of doing this back in April. This is very easy to do, requires no third-party software or futzing around with backups. Though, to be fair, think carefully if you really need images and logos in your email signature...]



One of the things I have always liked about photography is the "look and feel" of different film types. The saturated reds of Fujichrome Velvia; the contrasty grain of Tri-X; the warm tones of Kodachrome; even the odd looks of cross-processed and "expired" film stocks, each of these imparts a personality to the image. While I like the ease of use, the instant feedback, and the flexibility of modern digital cameras, one thing I miss is that element of "personality". Digital images so often seem flat, and the noise that passes for "grain" is actually quite annoying. While it would seem to be an exercise in mathematics and programming to replicate the look of film in the digital world, in fact there are few products that bridge this gap. One of these



programs is Exposure by Alien Skin Software. I like this program (a lot!), and it faithfully reproduces the look of films (both current and vintage), but it is a a plug-in for Adobe Photoshop and Lightroom, and works only on a Mac or Windows PC. There are some programs (such as Instagram, Hipstamatic, and Snapseed) that work on iOS, but their "film types" tend to be more stylistic than realistic (i.e. they don't map to actual films in use), and they tend to be getting more complicated, with many different controls added (I suspect per user request) which give you flexibility, at the expense of ease to use and intuitiveness.

And then, I get a PR pitch for a new app called <u>Alt Photo</u>, an iOS app from Alien Skin Software. For \$0.99, I thought "why not?"

I am glad I did, because this app provides specifically those two elements that I feel are missing (or being taken out of) other apps. There are few controls (you can see them along the top of the screenshot on the left) and provide you with the ability to select the film type to use (I have selected "tintype, with scratches"), border, and brightness. Adjustments/selections are made by swiping. You have the option of saving the image to your Camera Roll (the green button on the lower right), or sharing it to several services, including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and Flickr (via the button on the bottom middle.) You can use the built-in camera to take a photo, or you can select an image from the Photos app to manipulate.

This app id not a general image editor: it does one thing, but it does it pretty well (for a V1.0 product.) In future updates, I would like to see more film types added.

Alt Photo is currently available in the iTunes App Store, at an introductory price of \$0.99. It is compatible with the iPhone 3GS, iPhone 4, iPhone 4S, iPhone 5, iPod touch (3rd generation), iPod touch (4th generation), iPod touch (5th generation) and iPad, but it is optimized for the iPhone 5. It requires iOS 5.0 or later.
