So, we invite everyone to join us as we embark on this journey of discovery together.

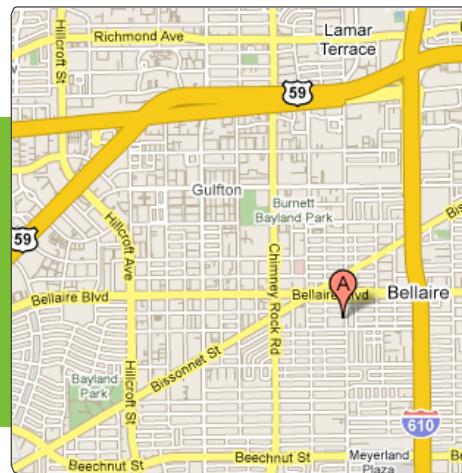
The SIGs start at 9am and the Main Presentation begins at 11:15. We'll see you there on the 17th!

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President



We had a successful April meeting, with a lot of people at the meeting to hear from the Houston Chronicle's Dwight Silverman. His topic this time was down sizing. The Silvermans are empty nesters, and decided to move into a 900 square foot apartment from a three bedroom town home. This required a significant amount of technological down grading on Dwight's part. He went from a loft office to a cupboard near the kitchen. His talk highlighted what he let go of and what he kept and how he is working. Even though his talk was out of the ordinary, he faced what many of us are facing as our lives change: the need to let go of some of our stuff as we transition to smaller housing. I can relate as I need to seriously get rid of lots of stuff that I thought I needed. Well, there is always the HAAUG SwapMeet coming this July. Dwight also highlighted his method of cutting the cord, and saving on pay TV, and discussed ways of saving on cell phone data. Thanks Dwight for a great presentation.

Apple made some news last month with the announcement of the calendar first quarter results. From the Apple press release: the company posted income of 45.6 billion with a net profit of 10.2 billion. That works out to \$11.62 per share. If you are an Apple shareholder, you can expect a dividend of \$3.29 per share, and the Apple Board approved an unprecedented 7 for 1 stock split. This means you will have 7 shares of stock for each share you now hold. It won't be worth more: you will just have more shares. The estimated price per share will go from \$525 to about \$70.

In other Apple news: the MacBook Air line was updated with new processors, a better battery, and 802.11ac Wi-Fi support. Another upgrade is the \$100 price decrease.

The jury in the Apple/Samsung patent trial delivered a mixed verdict by ordering Samsung to pay Apple \$119 million - far short of the \$2.2 billion Apple had asked for. The same jury also ordered Apple to pay Samsung \$158,000 for violating one of the Korean company's patents. I am sure that there will be appeals.

Ed Truitt is more of a security expert than I am, but I think we should change the "HeartBleed" bug name to Heart burn. Major software firms have kicked in significant sums of money to support a protocol that we all used. The Open SSL software is the basis for the security for almost every website. Yet as important as this software is, it was not supported to any great extent - so when the flaw was found, we had the "When in danger, when in doubt, run in circles, scream and shout" reaction from Tech community. The noise almost

"When in danger, when in doubt, run in circles, scream and shout!" - standard operating procedure upon finding a new software bug which affects security; see also, the story of my life.

It appears that we have entered another epoch of "Permanent Crisis Mode" with regard to security flaws in the software we have become dependent on. Two events in the past month have brought this into sharp focus: first was the heartbeat information disclosure bug in some versions of OpenSSL (a.k.a. "HeartBleed"), followed by a 0day remote code execution vulnerability in Internet Explorer (a.k.a. "the first permanent 0day in Windows XP"). In both cases, the vulnerabilities received lots and lots of media hype, fueled by dire warnings (*"Stop Using the Internet!!!"*) and predictions of total collapse of the Internet, if not of civilization itself.

So, how much danger were/all we all in, really?

First, HeartBleed: this bug was actually pretty serious, primarily because OpenSSL is used in so many applications. And not just the expected ones, like web server and encryption software and operating systems: the OpenSSL libraries are included in many user-mode applications, as well as being embedded in the software that controls many of our network devices (*routers, switches, and firewalls - Oh My!*) As most users would have no way of knowing whether their applications used these libraries or not, my first recommendation was (and still is) "check with the vendors who support your applications."

Now, for the "rest of the story": while the danger this bug presented sounded really, really scary (*"All of your Passwords and Credit Card Numbers Are Belong To Us!!!"*), the reality is not nearly so terrifying: to date, there have been no confirmed cases of the dreaded "data leakage", and despite all the conspiracy theories to the contrary, it appears that the NSA neither had this bug inserted into OpenSSL so they could monitor all of us, nor knew about it beforehand, and used it to monitor all of us.

That being said: make sure your applications are up to date, and on web sites where the operators have admitted being vulnerable, change your passwords - but do so **after** the web site has patched, and issued new SSL certs (they should announce when this is done.)

Now, on to Internet Explorer:

Within weeks of Windows XP reaching End of Life, a new vulnerability was discovered affecting every version of Internet Explorer on every version of Microsoft Windows - including XP. Its existence was announced by a security firm called FireEye (who makes network appliances that detect the dreaded "APT"), and Microsoft confirmed that they had seen this vulnerability exploited in "limited, targeted" attacks. The vulnerability allowed execution of code in the context of the logged-in user, and said user had to be "enticed" to open the malicious content: this

QuickTip

With the latest versions of Preview.app (since OS X v10.8, I believe) which save versions of files rather than the old standard Save dialogues, it took me a while to figure out how to Save As... and encrypt a PDF file with a password.

While clicking on the *File* menu, press the *Option* key, which causes the *Duplicate* menu item to become *Save As...* instead. Then you'll see the familiar *Save As..* sheet with the *Encrypt* checkbox. Enabling this allows you to set a password for the PDF file.

[**carko adds:** I tested this, and it works as described. This may be common knowledge, but serves as another example of why it's often helpful to explore the modifier keys in an application before getting too frustrated.]

- It has 5 USB ports for charging;
- It delivers 40 watts output;
- It charges many different types of devices;
- The PowerIQ™ Technology allows you to plug whatever device into whatever port, and delivers the power needed to charge that particular device.

This translates to a whole lot of convenience in a small (2.28" x 3.58" x 1.02") package. Especially when you consider it will charge the following, *all at the same time*: an iPad Air, an iPad Mini, an iPhone 5s, an iPod Touch, and a Kindle Fire HDX. It will be a definite addition to my suitcase on the next family vacation.

HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Saturday, March 15, 2014

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 South Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, David Jaschke, Clair Jaschke, Jack Adair, Greg Wright, Mike King, Mike Epstein

Call to Order: By President Philip Booth at 12:56 PM, following the conclusion of the March General Meeting.

General Announcements: Phil thanked everyone for a good meeting. We are very happy with the attendance this month.

MONTHLY REPORTS

Secretary - Jack Adair: Minutes of the February meeting were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report - Clair Jaschke: Clair presented the financial reports for February, as well as a revised report for January that includes the 2014 budget. Our checking account balance as of the end of February was \$10,322.64, and we have \$5,012.52 in our certificate of deposit, for a total of \$15,335.16. All the bills are paid and the checks are deposited. We have earned \$2.17 so far this year on our CD. The CD matures in April; they will roll it over automatically if we don't talk to the bank; we could consider negotiating for a better rate.

Clair again said that the 2013 books were ready for audit, and that we will do the audit in April.

Vice President - Greg Wright:

Greg indicated that he still needs presenters for next month. Upcoming meetings are:

- Saturday, April 26 (later meeting due to Easter weekend)

- Saturday, May 17
- Saturday, June 21
- Saturday, July 19 (SwapMeet)

We need to finalize the arrangements for Chris Breen's visit in October.

Membership - David Jaschke: Dave reported that we ended the month of February with 164 members, which is up by three from January, and down from 180 members as of February 28, 2013. We had 11 transactions in February, which included one new member and two lapsed members renewing. We had three transactions by KAGI and two by credit card. We also had two 2-year renewals.

HAAUG Electronic Communications Systems - Ed Truitt: Ed was absent this month. He was loading the announce list into Mail Chimp. This will be a backup in case of failure of the primary. The Apple Barrel was published on schedule. The first Saturday in April will be the deadline for the April Apple Barrel.

NEW BUSINESS: The 2013 audit will be postponed until April.

Phil and Greg will work on a committee for MacFest. This will happen at the George R. Brown Convention Center in November 2014.

was not an automatically-spreading "Internet worm." However, that didn't stop the dire warnings, including this one from the Dept of Homeland Security: "Stop using Internet Explorer." As Mac advocates, we can certainly applaud such statements of non-support for our mortal enemy at Microsoft; but so many people, so many sites, depend on IE to function on the 'Net, that this translates into "Stop using the Internet!"

Microsoft, seeming in response to pleas to "protect XP users", included XP in the resulting patch, though reports of a new wave of attacks, specifically targeting XP users, may have also played a part.

Most of us weren't in too much danger from this one - at least not until it was publicized, then hyped, in the press (which means every two-bit script kiddie knows about it, and sample exploit code is all over the place.) Even business users were fairly safe - unless they happened to be in industries that were subject to the "limited, targeted" attacks, in which case vulnerable systems (mainly Vista and Win7 running IE 9-11, without EMET or other mitigations in place) might be a problem.

If you use IE (and a lot of us Mac users have a Windows VM running under Parallels or Fusion), then apply the patch which is now out (and doesn't appear to break things.) If you are using an old version of OS X (10.6 "Snow Leopard" or earlier), the advice I give to XP users applies to you, as well: upgrade to a newer version of the operating system, or quit using your machine in a hostile environment (e.g. on the Internet.)

And don't be surprised (or alarmed) when the next crisis hits.

Incipio offGRID PRO Removable Battery Case

As the (former) proud owner of an iPhone 5, there were two things I tried to learn to live with: the “sleep” button that worked when it felt like (which wasn’t often); and a battery which always seemed to be drained when you needed it the most.

About the time I finally got tired of the non-functional sleep button and traded my iPhone 5 in for a 5S, I also found what I hoped would be a solution for the battery life issues: the offGRID PRO Thin Removable Battery Case from Incipio. While it seemed a bit thinner than the battery/case from Mophie, what sold me on the Incipio case was the fact that it came with two batteries, and a second charger which could hold both batteries, providing a total of 4000 mAh of charging capacity for any device with a USB connection.

So, I took it home, and I almost returned it. The reason: it flat out didn’t work. That’s right: when it was plugged in to external power, it would charge, but otherwise, zilch - zip - nada. Nobody at the store where I bought it know what was going on, but they suggested I call Incipio support. Which I didn’t do (even though I should have.)

Just before I was ready to give up, one of the kind folks at [TechOne Centre](#) (in the Downtown Tunnels) caught up with me and asked if I had removed the tape over the battery terminals: he had the same problem with an offGRID PRO that someone had given up on, and discovered this tape when he checked the batteries out. When I got home, I unpacked the case and checked, and sure enough there was a very thin, very small, very transparent piece of tape over the terminals of both batteries. I removed them, and *voilá!* I had power!

Since then, I have kept this case on my iPhone pretty much full time. When the charge gets to around the 60% mark (normally, about mid-afternoon), I simply push the button on the case and hold it for 3 seconds, and the phone is charged back up in 30 minutes or so. I haven’t used the external charger a lot yet, but being able to top off both batteries at the same time is a useful feature.

The Incipio offGRID PRO has a list price of \$79.99, and is available from brick-and-mortar stores as well as from the normal [online](#) venues.
