When I first got the Mac in 1987, I was probably typical in thinking that using the mouse was a great way to get around a computer. Historically, it was innovative on Apple's part when those ugly DOS machines could only work by using keystrokes.

After ten years of the mouse, my wife finally complained. Oh happy day! I had wanted a trackball for many years but could never quite justify it. Now there were two of us under the same roof with the same vision! My telepathy was beginning to work...

We (it had to fit her, too) were somewhat surprised at how few trackball gizmos you could actually find in stores to try. Thanks be that one of them was the Kensington Turbo Mouse 5.0. The two things that

the back of the box that it came in, and large size ball. I wasn't that delighted by the price (about \$102 mail order), but the idea of being able to program each of the four buttons on the thing

was mind-boggling! It would really be *my* Turbo Mouse, but I would let her use it, too. If she didn't like it, she could still use the mouse that lay quietly on the mouse pad but still connected via the Turbo Mouse.

I now understand what the term "elegant" means in computerese. Compared to the mouse, the Turbo Mouse is truly elegant. After loading an extension, you can program one button to do one click, a second button for two clicks, a third button for dragging, and the fourth button to call the Application menu (all open apps) and change on the fly without having to go the upper right segment of the monitor.

Now you know how I have my Turbo Mouse buttons set. But there are other things you can do too, like opening files, folders and apps with one easy click. You can also adjust the speed of the mouse for pixel-by-pixel control for fine and detailed work. Do read the box!

Another thing that I really like is that the cursor always snaps to the default setting of a dialog box which means most times you don't even have to guide it there. (For some reason, it won't do that on the dialog box for opening First Class software used for HAAUG Heaven BBS.)

The last thing that really makes it worth its salt is that it locks menus down when you click at the top of them. Then you just scroll down to what you want to do. These features sure facilitate using the Web. Boy, is this livin' or what?

Boycott Suggested

I recently read a post on the BBS about someone who went to an Egghead store in the Houston area and was disgusted with the lack of selection for Macintosh computer software. He returned his preferred customer card to the manager and told them as a Mac user he would no longer need it.

Since coming to Houston, almost two years ago, I have been increasingly dissatisfied with the major chain stores and their (lack of) Macintosh software selection.

I wonder if it is a "Houston thing," because over the New Year's holiday, I was visiting relatives in Dallas and went to a Wal-Mart and found *lots* of titles available for *both* pee-cee and Mac, but here in Houston our Wal-Marts have fewer than 10 titles for Mac (mostly Disney who does almost all their recent software for both platforms in one box - Bravo!).

Why does Dallas get more Mac software at Wal-Marts than we do? I also have a grudge against Circuit City who has fewer than 10 titles for Macs too.

I propose that *all* HAAUG members boycott buying ANY computer product from any store that does not give Macs at least 15-20% of the shelf space, since Macs are about 16-17% of the market. I mean boycott purchases of diskettes, zip carts, cables, mice (mouses), mouse pads, paper, *everything* - until they treat us fairly.

I also think HAAUG should put a list of those stores (chains and independents) that *do* give at least 15% shelf space to Mac titles and sell at least *one* Mac machine on a regular basis. The list should be both on the BBS and in the newsletter (with constant updates).

A lot of people are predicting the doom (not DOOM the game) of Macintosh, and some of that comes from the fact that you can't find Mac software or machines without a treasure map and secret decoder ring. Plus, if retailers are not willing to sell

Mac software, then more people are going to go to the pee-cee, simply because it is easier to get software for windoze (18)'96.

If you really support the Mac OS and what it stands for, then you have to be willing to *really* stand up and fight. Because no one out there besides us cares enough.

Without software what good is an OS. It is bad enough that for most software makers, we Mac Maniacs are an afterthought at best, only a few applications are actually written with the Mac in mind first and pee-ceeds as an afterthought. If Mac is truly to survive *this must change*.

Retail outlets only understand one thing - money! So I encourage you to follow me - I pledge to practice what I preach. I will not buy any more computer hardware, software, accessories, disks, etc. from *any* retailer that does not give Mac a fair share of the titles and space in the store.

I doubly encourage those of you who may have the power to affect more than just your personal buying habits. As the head of my school's only Mac lab (publications), I have total control, and will not buy anything (even if I have to sacrifice a few good dollars) from a retailer who does not fully support my machines.

As a group, HAAUG is more powerful than any one of us is individually. If we can actually pull off boycotts like this and *really* promote those stores that will give us some support for our platform and our OS, then we may have a chance at being part of the rebirth of Macintosh, instead of just sitting on the sidelines and hoping things will get better.

Macintosh Disk of the Month

Gauge Series.sea

This is a set of itty bitty utilities from Newer Technologies that tell you things like how fast your CPU is running and what the real bus speed is, in megahertz. It's interesting even if you don't understand it. According to their docs, the SCSI one is a little flaky, so be careful. I've run all the others with no problem.

WeatherTracker.sea

This is a really nice program to use with your ISP to get weather reports any time you want them. I have it set up to download data from Denver, Boulder, Hobby, and Houston. My brother lives in Boulder and sometimes the only report available for the area is Denver. That way I can see how cold my sibling is today.

Folder Icon Cleaner 2.0.2.sea

This is a program for getting rid of all those icons I keep pasting all over the place on the Disks of the Month. Drag any folder that has an icon other than the standard folder icon on it over this program and it will ask you do you really want to waste this lovely icon. Tell

it you do, and it will. Finder won't refresh immediately (for me) so you'll have to close the folder the icon folder was in and open it again to see the results.

Sounds

Lily Tomlin and Gilbert Godfry (whoever that is). System 7 users can double click on the files to hear the sounds. System 6 users need to open them with something like SoundMover to hear them.

Fonts

Funk and EBrantScript - the fonts on this disk. Funk is a true type display font. EBrantScript is a Type One script font. To install them drop them over your system folder (the suitcases and postscript fonts that is) and finder will put them where they belong with System 7.x or use SuitCase or MasterJuggler to open the suitcases.

RefinancePro™ .sea

This is a little program for helping you decide whether refinancing some loan would be advisable, in their opinion.

Rockets Screen.sea

This is a really cool StartupScreen for all Rockets fans. I believe that when you decompress it, it will be named StartupScreen, but if I'm wrong, rename it

StartupScreen, place it in your System Folder, and restart. Then while your inits run rampant as you start up each day you can see the pretty Rockets screen.

GURU 2.2.sea

This is another program from Newer Technologies. It's all about Ram and how much one can install in which machines. It has Apple, Power Computing, Motorola, APS, Radius, Daystar, Performas, Supermac, Printers, and monitors all covered. It tells you all about the different types of computers and what kind of Ram they will support and then some. It tells you a bit about the drives that work with the computers and things too. It's really a marvelous little program.


from the south

From Pasadena, Galveston, Clear Lake, and other points South, get onto I45 north towards downtown Houston. Take the Elgin/Cullen exit and turn left onto Elgin. Go under a group of overpasses then bear right onto a ramp that leads you to Calhoun.

From most areas Southwest, West, and North, take the most convenient freeway to downtown Houston and get on Interstate 45 (Gulf Freeway) South. Take the Calhoun/UH exit and follow the road as it curves to the right.

At the 3rd light, turn right into "UH Entrance #1." The University Center will be ahead of you, the first building on the right. You can park free in the first parking lot on the right.
