Basic DSL: High speed comes home

Many Houstonians now have the opportunity to get onto the high-speed lane of the Internet. Many Mac users probably will not need this service. Those who do are those downloading megabytes of material (programs, photo albums, books, movies etc.) and want to accomplish in minutes what has taken hours with 33.6 modems. Others, like myself, want to videoconference with the family. Gamers would like interactive shootouts. To do this well requires greater bandwidth than an analog modem provides.

As an example, using CUSeeMe (White Pine Software, Nashua, NH or <http://cuseemworld.com>) and QuickCam (<http://www.quickcam.com>), grayscale images with a 33.6 modem are displayed at two frames per second in a herky-jerky fashion and accompanying voice transmission has been unsatisfactory. I would like to do a lot better than that, so I have explored the new options.

Cable service would have been lovely, but Time Warner still has not begun Roadrunner service in Houston, although they are taking orders for it (www.timewarnerhouston.com). In my case, I would have to reroute our present cable service at considerable cost. ISDN lines are available, but are more costly and slower than the Digital Subscriber Lines being offered by the phone companies and various ISPs.

Southwestern Bell offers ADSL (Asymmetric Digital Subscriber Line) service. Go to <http://www.swbell.com> to see if your phone is capable of

connecting to this service. Mine was, and I placed the order for the basic DSL service. Pricing information is available at (888) 792-0999 or through e-mail to sales@swbell.net. Aside from hardware costs, the monthly charge is about what I was paying for the extra phone line, in-line service, and for the deteriorating service of Netcom. The service is compatible with any computer using Ethernet and operating systems through OS 8.5.1 (8.6 should be OK).

Basic DSL service is \$39 per month with a one-year contract. Southwestern Bell Internet Service for ADSL subscribers is \$10 per month for unlimited service and high-speed transfers throughout the

net. They guarantee a minimum of 128 KBPS service upstream and up to 1.5 MBPS downstream, whereas if the connection is handed off to another Internet Provider, the only guarantee is from your machine to their nearest switching station.

The downside is that ADSL is a little more expensive than the cable system. The hardware (an Alcatel 1000 modem, the POTS splitter, a Kingston KNE40T Network Interface Card, which you may not need but take it as they include it in the package) costs \$199 plus a \$14 installation fee. With the SWB package comes a dynamic IP number, three POP e-mail boxes and a three meg Personal Home Page. News Server access and an Extra Access Analog Modem Access

Account are also provided.

This latter feature is a great plus. I have access to my mailbox and the Internet via the 33.6 modem and Windows machine at my desk at no extra cost. I can also dial in from my Notebook (if I only had one) to connect from any line in the USA at four cents per minute, a non-option on cable

There are other DSL providers in Houston primarily servicing the business community. For example: Verio (www.verio.com) service can be provided at much higher rates of transmission and cost.

The big day arrived on May 11. Randy Herzstein came over to watch since he was scheduled to get an enhanced installation on the 13th. The installer arrived. He neatly disconnected my extra phone line, installed the POTS splitter on the incoming phone service and routed the digital service over the extra line to the jack where my SupraXpress modem used to reside. Now all that remained was for him to plug the Alcatel modem to that line, connect the power (which we did via the UPS) and connect the modem to the Ethernet connector on the rear of my Performa 6115.

Whoops! The Performa has the old style Ethernet connector, not the newer standard one. Never fear—Randy was here. And in a flash, he went to his house and returned with the proper Ethernet adapter, which did the mating job. I booted up and was on the Internet via Netscape Communicator. The installer left, Randy stayed and configured the

Andrew was late because of an accident, so Useless but Neat was not held. Larry McLoughlin was ill, so there was no Internet SIG. The club's Mac died again, so Clair had no machine for her Quicken SIG, so it was cancelled.

In June Andrew of Useless but Neat and Joe of PowerBook will both be out of town. Unless someone wants to take over for a month. they will be cancelled. And the Games SIG is without a computer since they have been using Andrew's. Also Internet is uncertain for June because David doesn't know if Larry is well yet.

Volunteer Manager Peter Gingiss was absent and no report was given.

Apple/Mac Librarian Mike Brouillette was absent and no report was given.

Publicity Chairman Kimberly Reeves was absent and no report was given.

Jeff may have found a new computer for the club.

Lyda McGhee will bring her digital camera to the next meeting to photograph board members, officers, SIG leaders, etc so Jeff can create real name tags.

The most Mac-friendly Internet Service Provider (ISP) in Houston

Setup includes a one time, non-refundable \$45 charge, six months of service for \$60 and sales tax of \$8.66 for a total of \$113.66. Renewals will be available for six months at \$64.95 or twelve months at \$129.90. HAAUGNet applications available at next meeting.

Only current HAAUG members can join HAAUGNet. Other terms and conditions apply (see below). Support will be via HAAUG Heaven. HAAUGNet members will enjoy unlimited internet access and access to 1,000's of new groups. Join up, save money AND support HAAUG.

The purpose of HAAUGNet is to advance and promote low cost access to the Internet for HAAUG members. HAAUGNet is intended to assist in the collaboration and exchange of information between and among members, SIGs, officers and the general public.

HAAUG membership is required to obtain a HAAUGNet account and to renew a HAAUGNet account. Annual HAAUG membership dues are \$45 to join (\$40 for students) and \$40 to renew.

The goal of HAAUGNet is to promote education and training in innovative technology. To achieve this, the system must provide quality, equitable and cost-effective access, communication, and technical resources to the PC community in Houston and Texas.

First Class Client to route me through to HAAUG Heaven. Bits and bytes now jump out of the monitor faster than my processor can handle them.

The Star Wars Episode I trailer (25 MB at 480 x 216 pixels) took 4.5 *minutes* to download at 82 KBPS. With my 225 megahertz G3 upgrade card reinstalled (that's another story), the same trailer downloaded in 2.4 minutes. By contrast, I downloaded it at my office using a 133MHz Pentium and 33.6 K modem taking 85 minutes at 3.4 K!



Beachware offers Mac-friendly games

I read in the San Diego MUG of a special offer by BeachWare and I contacted them by email to see if HAAUG members could take advantage of it.

BeachWare responded they are a small company within an hour of San Diego and couldn't do that because their CDs are so low priced to begin with (most software is priced at either \$11.95 for download or \$19.95 for CD).

They did offer to let me preview a couple of their CDs, and sent me NIGHT SKY INTERACTIVE and CASINO. All of their CDs are capable of running on both Mac and PC platforms. Each of these titles had Mac requirements of 256 colors, CD-ROM drive, and 4 Megs of RAM.

The first thing I learned was that my Mac was very unhappy when I tried to run these CDs in its standard set of Conflict Catcher extensions. The Mac started fine and I could load and run each of the CDs but after I quit the Mac froze. I contacted BeachWare and they suggested that I run the CDs in their own extension set. I have never had to do this for a CD before.

NIGHT SKY INTERACTIVE is a solid astronomy text-based primer. It is like what you expect to hear and see visiting a planetarium in educational value except for the still pictures. It would be wonderful for a child who has an interest in learning about astronomy.

CASINO is just like it sounds. You can select from six slot machines, two different poker games, blackjack or keno all for the purpose of losing your money to your

hearts content. If your money runs out, you can go head for the ACM (Automatic Cash Machine) to get more or pawn your shoes, watch or house. If you like to gamble but not lose real money, you would be happy with this software.

You really need to go to BeachWare's website to see the range of their products like BOMBER BLITZ, or CAVERNS OF ATLANTIS & SUB HUNT that you can download and register for \$11.95. In BB, you are the pilot of a bomber avoiding ground-to-air missiles that can not only decimate your plane, but obliterate your bombs in midair while trying to destroy (or defend) the two enemy cities and their three guns. I did not try these. I'll leave that up to you.

You can also download Freeware like Classy Clicks, a collection of a dozen classy and professional click sounds in .AIF format for the Mac.
