Opera browser alternative to Explorer and Netscape

Opera Software recently released the final version of Opera 5.0, their Web browser for System 7.5.3 through Mac OS 9.2. Opera boasts fast page rendering, easy keyboard navigation, flexible searching from within the browser interface, page zooming, and a host of tweaky configuration options. Although not perfect, Opera appears to provide highly credible competition for Internet Explorer 5.1 and Netscape 6. Opera's free to use in banner mode (similar to Eudora). If you wish to support Opera directly, it costs \$40 new, or \$20 for students and senior citizens. Opera 5.0 requires a PowerPC-based Mac running System 7.5.3 or later, and it's a mere 2 MB download.

QuarkXPress 5.0 shipping

Quark has begun shipping QuarkXPress 5.0, a long-simmering upgrade to the company's industry-leading page layout software. The new version includes a tables feature for working with tabular information,

layers for managing separate design elements, plus improved AppleScript support and color enhancements. QuarkXPress 5.0 also features Web publishing and XML export tools for designers using the program to create files not traditionally associated with page layout. Although Quark has stated that a Mac OS X version is under development, QuarkXPress 5.0 runs only under Mac OS 9 or the Classic environment of Mac OS X. The program is priced at \$900, with upgrades available at \$300 for registered owners of QuarkXPress 4.

RagTime: Free page layout program a download away

What page layout program is less expensive than Deneba's Canvas, Adobe's PageMaker or Quark Express. (No, MacPublisher is not the

answer.) RagTime is.

RagTime 5 is being offered by a German company that provides the software in both Mac and PC versions as a free download from their web site. However, it is a 50 MB download, so a fast connection is recommended.

RagTime was a pretty big hit in Europe, but not very successful in the United States when first released here in 1986. The idea of RagTime was to integrate word processing and spreadsheets into one program.

FileMaker Pro web solutions touted

FileMaker Pro Solutions Developer George Bigham outlined the database and web solutions provided by FileMaker Pro during the Main Presentation at the February HAAUG meeting on the campus of Rice University.

Bigham said FileMaker Pro offers solutions that “normal human beings can use” compared to Microsoft Access, “which normal human beings cannot use.” He pointed out that Microsoft doesn’t offer a Mac version of Access, which he suggested might be a blessing.

FileMaker Pro is a robust, multi-platform flat and relational database capable of creating dynamic web content, Bigham said. He pointed out that several large organizations—including local ones such as Rice University and Compaq—use FileMaker Pro extensively.

FileMaker Pro 5.5 adds several new features, including a revamped and improved web publishing feature. “The newer versions have gotten the web stuff way lots better,” Bigham said.

Another enhancement to the FileMaker Pro lineup includes FileMaker Pro Mobile, which enables

users to export databases to their PalmPilot and compatible devices, then synchronize the hand-held version with the one on their desktop computer or server.

Bigham touted FileMaker Pro as a database solution simple enough for normal people to learn easily, yet powerful enough to handle any database or web-publishing need. For those who want to learn more, he suggested they “come to Rex’s SIG and bug him unmercifully with questions.”

The FileMaker Pro SIG led by Rex Covington meets at 12:30 PM after the Main Presentation.

Eliminate web formatting with Word's Paste Special

If you've ever pasted text from a Web page into a Microsoft Word document, you've undoubtedly noticed that the formatting from that Web page flies in right along with the text you've pasted. To get around this problem, simply choose Paste Special from the Edit menu and in the resulting dialog box, select Unformatted Text.

If you routinely face this situation, why not create a Paste Special macro? To do so, select Macro from the Tools menu, select Record New Macro from the Macro submenu, enter a key combination to fire the macro, click the Close button, perform the aforementioned Paste Special routine, and click the Stop Recording Macro button to save your macro.



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SIgnificant Changes

After many years as SIG Co-ordinator, David Scheuer turns over the reins to Philip Booth

The new (Philip Booth) and retiring (David Scheuer-shown below) SIG Coordinators were asked the same set of questions recently posed to new board members. Scheuer's answers also serve as the short history of special interest groups in HAAUG. Read on...

DAVID SCHEUER

HAAUG member since?

The Apple II was current; the Apple II+ was just coming out. Atari had a hot new desktop. Trying to decide which to buy. So I think it was late 1979 or early 1980. Rhea Kramer was still typing the "Barrel" on mimeo forms and then cranking them out on blue paper for our then-current president Mike Kramer. I decided on the II+, by the way voting in favor of floating point basic, instead of integer basic, the main difference back then.


Previous office(s)/position(s) held in HAAUG, including SIG leader?

Been a board member. Can't remember when. Probably 1985/1986. Did a few SIGs over the years. We had at one time a "random" room with tables and space for informal SIGs. I used to haul in my 512Ke and set up under a sign that said, "no questions are stupid here." Much later I used an empty room and called the SIG "The Miscellaneous SIG," both early day "Mac One-on-one" versions, which is why I created that SIG. Fortunately, others volunteered and it now gets along without me. Recently started the stock SIG. Mostly I prefer to either listen or kibitz at other people's SIGs. Back in 1997, I tried a CD trading room session at 3:00PM for members to come in and swap used games. It kind of

petered out, the CD level wasn't that high back then. Might work now however.

Number of years in current or previous position?

Unsure. Perhaps 1985 to 2001—17 years or so. Shortly after the Mac came out, I got one—the 128K—on January 15th 1984. Lyle Washington was "SIG Coordinator" and there were only Apple II SIGs. But by the end of the year there were three MAC SIGs, and still at least seven Apple II series SIGs, I was sitting next to Lyle at

board meetings and he asked me to handle the Mac SIGs separately (although in coordination with him), and thus created the new position of Mac SIG coordinator. Lyle died of cancer some years later and I inherited the position of SIG coordinator. Our club disk library is officially the "Lyle Washington library" in his honor.

The last real Apple II SIG was AppleWorks under Wayne Bockleman, which kept going until 1996 as I recall.

The longest running SIG was "Games" run by Bob Lewis from early 1985 to 1997 or '98, or so. At least 12 years, maybe longer. It was also one of our best-attended SIGs until almost the very end. I attribute that last year decline to the "graying" of our membership. People used to bring their kids back then. Bob sometimes ran a Utilities SIG, which included how to squeeze a little more out of an over-age Plus, later how to hop-up a IIsi. And of course some actual utilities.

First Mac you ever used was?

128K. Unless a Lisa counts, I had one of those on my desk at work in 1983.

Current Macintosh you use?

B&W G4/400. Of course it has 1.5Gigs of RAM and I recently installed a 100 Gig HD when Sam's rebate brought the net down to \$120. All at the bargain prices as you would expect from "The Mac Shopper."

Do you work in a Mac-friendly office or school?

Used to. I'm retired. But I did work in Mac-friendly environments until then. I was the Mac support person amongst other tasks. Actually when I started, I was Apple II support, later Lisa support. Then we got the Macs in. Another task was Systems Manager to a 1 Meg mini-system that filled a major part of a floor. The power filter (surge suppressor) was 6' by 12' by 3' and cost \$25,000. The 100 Meg (yeah, Meg, not Gig) hard drives were the size of washing machines, and the stepping motors that moved the heads weighed in at 70 pounds and could crack walnuts. I know because I had to help haul a couple up two flights of stairs one Sunday (elevator went out) when we were doing a hard drive upgrade. A printer card, a simple parallel printer card was \$2,495 and it was comparable in size to the motherboard in my G4. We ran that system around the clock processing seismic data.

Power user of what software program, if any?

Getting out of date and out of practice. Used to be a heavy user of Excel and Photoshop, back when an employer corporation paid to put the latest and greatest on my desk, where they further paid me to learn it. Now I'm retired, it's out-of-pocket, and I'm gradually falling behind. However, I'm working intensely on "Tomb Raider" (for six months now) but I still haven't gotten lead game character "Lara" out of her back yard training ground. I keep running her into walls, but she's very patient with me. Just says "Oh no, that's not the way."

Even though you didn't ask: Influence on the family?

Major. My son Jack became a summer

First Mac you ever used was?


One of the first all in ones 128/512 (Rented at Kinkos) Bought a Quadra 840AV in 94.
