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## Utilities to expand OS X

A bevy of utility developers now offer several Mac OS X utilities to extend your experience with the new operating system well beyond the stock configuration. Here are just a few that allow users to add functions to OS X.

### Default Folder X

Apple has never done a good job of making it easy to open and save files. Mac OS X is in many ways a step back

even from Mac OS 9. In earlier versions of the Mac OS, savvy users fixed Apple's Open and Save dialogs with utilities like Power On Software's Action Files (the successor to Now Software's Super Boomerang) and St. Clair Software's Default Folder. Only Default Folder has made the jump to Mac OS X so far, and in doing so, it has fixed a number of Mac OS X's Open and Save dialog navigation problems in Carbon (though not yet Cocoa) applications.

We wrote about Default Folder X 1.0 when it shipped; it's well worth it for anyone frustrated by Apple's clumsy and inconsistent Open and Save dialogs. The recently-released Default Folder X 1.1 offers a variety of small feature improvements and bug fixes, including the option of showing free disk space and icons in Default Folder's menus. Compatibility has been improved with a number of programs,

# Create flow charts, technical drawings easily and quickly with ConceptDraw

ConceptDraw is an application for creating business and technical drawings easily, saving you time and providing a clear illustration of your ideas. The program comes with more than 70 libraries, which enable you to draw all kind of charts and diagrams, flowcharts, UML diagrams, web site plans, network diagrams, floor plans, time lines, organization charts and many more.

ConceptDraw Standard features powerful drawing tools, text editor, functions to program behavior of the objects and HTML export. It is Internet-enabled and easy-to-use.

I have been using ConceptDraw for the last

two months, and have done four drawings. For example, I produced a network layout in 15 minutes. It was very easy to do. The library of images had everything I needed.

The flow chart I did was just as easy. The technical



drawing was easy, but it seems not to let me do the drawing in scale and no 3D drawings. either. I will check into that; I could be wrong.

Layering, grid and snap to objects work well. You can also draw segments and figures, group objects into more complex ones, and connect them with intelligent connectors. I did im-

# What's your Mac doing when you're gone?

For most of us, the answer to the question posed in the headline is "nothing." For others participating in the well-known Search for Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence (SETI) at Home, the answer is "at least a little something."

SETI is an example of distributed computing, the idea being that a massive number of ordinary desktop computers can solve problems that would otherwise require a supercomputer. If your problem can be divided up into small pieces and you can get people to let you use their computers for free, this technique can give you tremendous computing power at very low cost.

While some consider the SETI@home effort to be a complete waste of time, others realize that the odds of finding anything from radio telescope data are low. A more recent effort has begun at Stanford University that can lead to understanding and maybe even treatments or cures for Alzheimers disease, Parkinsons dis-

ease, Lou Gehrigs disease (ALS) and Mad Cow disease (CJS), among others. It is called Folding@Home (<http://folding.stanford.edu>), and it lets your Mac fold proteins, provided you're using OS X. It is critical to understand the dynamics of protein folding since flaws in this process are the keys to these diseases.

There are both graphical and command-line versions of Folding@Home available for Mac OS X as well as a Folding@Home screen saver. The graphical version looks like the picture shown below. To make it fun, your per-


sonal statistics tracking the work you've done are maintained and you can join teams simply by entering the team number the first time you start the program.

Even though Mac OS X is the third platform for which Folding@Home was released (following Windows and Linux), four of the top 50 teams are Mac OS specific. There is also a small Apple Computer, Inc. team that's currently in 82nd place. In the top 100, there is one Linux team, one BeOS team and zero teams boasting about using Windows (surprise!).

Another fact that should make Mac users proud is that—while 27% of Windows users who signed up are actually doing work and 29% of Linux users—a whopping 55% of Mac OS X users are cranking out results for medical science!

Feel free to join me on the MacAddict4Life team (team number 18) and lets get folding!

including the heavily used Microsoft Office X. Default Folder X 1.1 is \$35 shareware and is a 1.5 MB download.

### CopyPaste-X & PTHPasteboard

For most people, Apple's implementation of the clipboard is sufficient. Select something, choose Copy or Cut, and the selected item replaces whatever was on the clipboard and is ready for pasting. Applications like Nisus Writer and utilities like CopyPaste cleverly extended the clipboard by making it possible to access multiple clipboards. That functionality has arrived in Mac OS X thanks to CopyPaste-X and PTHPasteboard.

Both utilities track recently copied or cut items (20 for PTHPasteboard and between 10 and 200 for CopyPaste-X) and let you paste any one of them into other applications with a keystroke or a click in a palette. Both also save the recently remembered items through restarts, but CopyPaste-X goes beyond this in making these clipboards editable, storing user-defined clipboards permanently for repeated use, and providing full drag and drop to and from the CopyPaste-X palette.

If your needs are minimal, PTHPasteboard is probably sufficient, but for a full-fledged multiple clipboard utility, CopyPaste-X is the only

way to go. CopyPaste-X is a 1.3 MB download and costs \$20 shareware. PTHPasteboard is a free 123K download, although donations are accepted.

### USB Overdrive

Apple ships only single-button mice with Macs, but many people prefer mice or trackballs with buttons, scroll wheels, missile launchers, and so on. Some vendors of these alternate pointing devices have provided Mac OS X drivers (Kensington is a notable example), but for many devices, the only way to bring them into the world of Mac OS X is through Alessandro Levi Montalcini's USB Overdrive. Currently in beta for Mac OS X, USB Overdrive lets you program multiple buttons and access scroll wheels.

Alessandro is extremely up front about the fact that USB Overdrive is currently a beta, so be sure to read all the release notes and known problems, and send in detailed reports of anything you experience. USB Overdrive beta 4 is a 617K download; it will be shareware when released.

### Snapz Pro X

Though the Mac OS has, since time immemorial, offered the capability of capturing an image of the screen, and even though Apple enhanced this

screen capture capability to capture just windows a few years back, everyone who's serious about taking screenshots uses a third party utility. The same truism applies in Mac OS X.

There have been numerous such programs over the years, but Ambrosia Software's Snapz Pro is the screen capture utility of choice for many people, TidBITS staff included. Snapz Pro X makes it possible to take professional screenshots in Mac OS X. Although it isn't quite as snappy as it was as an extension in OS 9, it's still the only game in town for screenshots.

Snapz Pro X 1.0.2 costs \$30 (\$50 for Movie Capture); a licensed version also ships for free with most new Macs. The utility is a 13.1 MB download.

### Font Reserve and Suitcase

Another area in which the Mac OS has never met the needs of serious users is in font management. With 15 or 20 fonts, it's not a big deal. With the font-intensive projects many users have, a font management utility like Suitcase or Font Reserve is essential. Both utilities help you gather fonts from the various locations Mac OS X stashes them. Then you can group them into sets, and activate and deactivate them at will to keep the current set at a manageable size. Font Reserve 3.0 costs \$90; Suitcase 10 is \$100.

## iPhoto update includes brightness controls, mail integration and more

Apple has rolled out iPhoto 1.1, a free update including new brightness and contrast controls, integration with Mac OS X's Mail application for simple e-mailing of photos to friends, and controls for setting favorite photos as desktop backgrounds and screen saver slide shows.

iPhoto requires Mac OS X version 10.1.2 or later and a Macintosh with a built-in USB port. A Mac with at least a 400-MHz PowerPC G3 processor and 256MB RAM is recommended.

## Fetch lives on in version 4.0.2

Fetch, the popular Mac FTP (File Transfer Protocol) client, has been updated. Fetch was among the first FTP clients for the Mac, and version 4.0 is one of the first for Mac OS X. Version 4.0.2 offers dozens of improvements in performance, compatibility, and features, such as support for long file names on OS X and the ability to duplicate remote files. Users can download and run a free 15-day trial copy from the Fetch

Softworks web site. Single user licenses for Fetch 4.0.2 are available for only \$25, and the 4.0.2 upgrade is free for existing customers of Fetch Softworks.




