

Have no fear! Intel is here!

Important information for the discerning Mac user

I still remember the days when PowerPC was the king of CPU's, and the G3 was the envy of all the Intel users.

As most, if not all, of you are aware, the PowerPC is fallen way behind the performance curve. For Mac's to even compete, Apple had to stick 2 CPU's in each Power Mac! While Dual G5's may sound impressive, it is not cost effective.

The simple fact is, neither Motorola nor IBM was willing to fund the R&D for a product that would only sell about 3-4 million units a year, another casualty of the Wintel juggernaut. Instead they focused their attention to another market, vastly more profitable market, game consoles. For example, the Nintendo GameCube is powered by, yeup, a PowerPC (code named Gekko). Nintendo sold some 20,000,000 to date. If I am right, that number exceeds ALL the Mac made since the first one was made!

Playstation 2 and Xbox have to date sold more than 100,000,000 units. That is 100 MILLION. The new Xbox 360 and Playstation 3 are expected to sell double that, maybe even triple, in 2 years. That number exceeds PC sales in that same period! And you know what, BOTH are powered by PowerPC chips!! The biggest profits are to be made in game consoles, is it any wonder that IBM and Motorola are not interested in a minuscule 4 million unit a year sale?

Enough about the why and wherefore. Now on to what it means to us, the Mac user.

Unlike previous transitions, this one may be totally invisible. Unlike the 68K to PowerPC transition, there is no emulation of the system. OS X will run natively on the x86 chip. With “Rosetta”, any old PowerPC code will be instantly converted to x86 on the fly into memory once it is started. The older app may start slowly, but once loaded it should run quickly (note, does not change the app on the drive itself, only what is loaded in memory). In fact, the only way you may know if the Mac is running on Intel is to see an “Intel Inside” logo on the front!

The UNIX core of OSX also made it easy for Apple to compile Intel versions, since most of the hard work was already done to be cross CPU, it only needed a little extra effort to keep it that way. In fact, the possibility of switching of Intel existed since day 1 of the then “Rhapsody” (pre OS X name) code. It was wise of Jobs and Apple to have a Plan B in case the CPU of choice did not work out. And so it has come to be.

Perhaps the only casualty to this switch could be OS 9. While it does run as an app in OS X and could translate under "Rosetta", something in OS 9 or some apps may simply not like it and not work. That is really unimportant since the old System is a finished chapter and only very few people will still need it.

My personal opinion to the debate is this:

While I am disappointed that in the long run the PowerPC lost due to lack of support by Motorola and IBM (those 2 owe Apple BIG, because PowerPC would not exist for game systems without Apple!), it does present a new opportunity for the Mac faithful. For the first time we can truly compare Mac and Windows on a totally even playing field and see which it truly the best OS (Mac, of course)!

A Study of Apple Technology in Japan.

I am 30,000 feet in the air (give or take a foot) as I write this, coming back from nearly 3 weeks in Japan. As usual, I am stunned by what I see in the field of computers and peripherals in Japan.

The PC industry in the USA has stagnated, and the Mac too has become formulaic. For the last 2-3 years it has been pretty much the same set of ports and slow introduction of things like Wireless and dual layer DVD-Recorders. While Apple has been keeping up, it still is slow to adopt such things like its FireWire 800 in its new iMac G5 line. Still, Apple is far better than most US PC makers that are slowly building in FireWire (IEEE 1349) and wireless, and building out the fossil of a device, the 3.5" Floppy!!

What do they have in Japan?

Laptop wise, imagine a new 17" Powerbook with readers for all 10 types of digital camera memory readers, built in cell phone, IRDA, built in 2MP camera (for video conferencing), and a new screen that looks better than a CRT!

But WAIT, lets throw in a TV TUNER for FREE!

Yes, you can watch your favorite Samurai Drama as you take the train home (if you are lucky and find a seat)! Or save it to the drive to see later.

In the US, the iMac has no rival as an all in one. In Japan, its just another of the crowd. Just like the laptop above, they are crammed with everything, and for good reason. In the very space limited Japan, an iMac like computer will soon become the multimedia/entertainment center for the whole house. Video inputs are important to hook up the PlayStation or Nintendo to.

Apple should look to Japan more to see features and trends to keep it ahead of the cutting edge in the USA. I have said this before, I will say it again.

But the real competition in Japan is not from other computers, but cell phones. Four years ago they were tiny, but still had cameras (new feature). Now they all have cameras, but are ENORMOUS. Why? Simple. They ARE the Personal Computer, literally! The features and capabilities have surpassed the Palm and PocketPC's (aka, WindowsCE) of the world. We use our computers for the internet most of the time, anyway. What is better than a computer that is always connected, but highly portable, easy to use, and is a phone too! This is the trend in Japan, and I am seeing this happen in the US too.

If its not in Japan now, it will be by next year where the cell phone is dropped on a cradle that is hooked up to a monitor, mouse, keyboard, 100GB hard drive, and USB ports for, well, it is a portable computer.

One thing that Apple is doing extremely well is, iPod! Nearly half of all the musical players I saw were some form of iPod. Unfortunately the iPods I saw were in pockets or bags, so I do not know which one (but my brother-in-law has the iPod Photo).

But Apple could do 10 times better. If Apple simply sells the iPod Shuffle at railway stations loaded with a small selection of popular songs, they will completely dominate the PMP in Japan. The railway in Japan is what makes Japan work. In Tokyo alone, at least 15 million people use the system every day!! That is 15 million chances to sell an iPod. That is 15 million chances to sell an iPod every day!! In the whole of Japan the number is somewhere around 40-50 million! Oh, and people routinely carry \$500 with them, and its not big deal to drop \$100 for something.

iPod accessories will also go big in Japan. Vending machines in Japan are very common, and will be a perfect place to get iPod accessories, like disposable battery packs! Heck, in Japan they even have vending machines to CHARGE CELL PHONES!

Sales in Japan will easily exceed the US, if Apple only put more effort and ingenuity over there.

And yes, I did visit the Ginza, Tokyo Apple store. Gorgeous!!

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

There were no announcements.

REPORTS:

Secretary: Tamara Lewis

Tamara presented the approved March Board Minutes as well as the draft for the April minutes, which were approved.

1st Vice President: Doug Smith

2nd Vice President: Casey Sivula

Casey reported that the May meeting will once again be held at the Rice Media Center. The Board agreed that between the two facilities that the Rice Media Center was a great facility to hold future General Meetings. A small discussion was held regarding the issue of finding a person to be in charge of letting people into the parking lot. The Board agreed that an hourly rate of \$15 to \$20 for four hours would be a paid to the selected parking lot attendant. Casey reported that the Rice Media Center has been officially booked for the third Saturday of each month for the rest of the year with the exception of the July Swap Meet, which will be at the Bellaire Civic Center, and that the month of December has been booked for the second Saturday. On average, HAAUG is doing very well budget wise, spending around \$400/month in comparison to \$600/month on General Meeting facilities fees.

There was a small discussion regarding the availability of internet as a result of a low resource of IT support at the Media Center as well as the possible parking issue at the Media Center during football games at Rice. The Board concluded that there shouldn't be any conflicts in regards to Rice's posted football schedule.

Treasurer: Barbara Long

Barbara announced that the current reports have been emailed out to the Board. There is currently \$12,931.82 in the bank, a month-to-date loss of \$1,933.78, and a year-to-date profit of \$1,522.56. She also reported that the Park Plaza for MacFest 2005 has been paid, and that there has been a decline in membership for the last two months.

Boutique Manager: Barbara Long (acting)

Barbara stated that the HAAUG Boutique had sold 3 caps at the April General Meeting and that new MacFest 2005 merchandise will be up on the web soon.

Membership: Morton Butler

Morton reported that there are currently 349 members to date in May. Last year's membership at this date was 510 members. Casey mentioned that she predicts that membership will increase with the new stability in General Meeting location.

He also reported that announcements regarding membership status and MacFest were sent out, including 198 expired membership, 68 alerts, 8 renewal, and 2 new membership notices equaling a total of 300 MacFest announcements mailed out. Barbara thanked Morton for his effort in getting the word out regarding the upcoming MacFest.

Rick reported that at the April General Meeting the attendance of SIGs was moderate, including 1 attendee at the new OS9 SIG. Rick also addressed the need for more SIG leaders. He requested that a short meeting between SIG leaders, and those interested, be held following the Board Meeting. Casey asked that all Board Members volunteer their time at this upcoming MacFest and that a list of jobs-needed will be sent out soon for people to sign up.

There was also a call for volunteers to help setup for the May General Meeting.

John made note that the old HAAUGHotline number has been forwarded to the new number and that the system is now in its infancy stage the Board was encouraged to send all comments to hotline@haaug.org. He reported that a bill has been officially sent to the Treasurer and internet/phone provider.
