
Join us this month, as HAAUG member John Gaver helps us navigate the brave new world of self-publishing, including both eBooks and the "dead tree" editions.

Boss HAAUG Speaks

Monthly Address from the HAAUG President



The May meeting suffered a casualty when Dwight Silverman called in sick, and I hope that he feels better as I also recently suffered a bout of food-related illness. Ed Truitt ably filled in and gave the group an update on the Mac malware scene. Ed's job is in IT security for a major oil company. Ed is also writing a security column in the Apple Barrel, which I recommend reading.

I am still not going to go crazy at every malware rumor that is trumpeted in the Mac press, but If Apple releases a security update I will install it. I have been driving Macs for a long time, since System 7 days, and the quality of Apple Updates has improved. This is due to the architecture of OS X: we no longer have to modify the operating system for software to work. In versions prior to OS X, almost every piece of software added little pieces of code to extend the OS. These pieces of code were called "Extensions." When Apple would release an update you wanted to wait and see what broke and if there were any reports on the club's bulletin board about problems before you updated. Thankfully that does not happen now, for the most part. Well, almost never. But remember to keep a good back up just in case.

June's meeting will feature HAAUG member John Gaver giving a presentation on book publishing software and how to produce eBooks and self-published books. July will be the semi-annual SwapMeet: you can reserve a table by clicking on the link on haaug.org to reserve your table. Dwight Silverman has rescheduled his presentation for the August meeting. We have the summer set, and I want to remind you about the October meeting with Macworld Sr. editor Chris Breen.

The big Apple news will be the Keynote at June's World Wide Developers Conference (WWDC). I know that Apple has released a copy of "Mountain Lion", and there are rumors of a new version of iOS that will be discussed. By the meeting we will know more about the direction of both operating systems.

Security Beat

This month, on the Security Beat, we are going to talk about something *other* than Mac-targeting malware (promise!) In fact, we are going to talk about the three pillars of security, and segue from there to a quick product review. In addition, I will be starting a Q&A section, in which you ask the questions, and I provide the answers (or at least I give it my best shot.) And, in that light, I want to start out by apologizing to the person who asked me the first question during last month's main presentation. I promised I would explain the answer further in this column, but alas I suffered from a security failure, and completely forgot what the question was about! So, please feel to remind me what the question was (or send in your question) to abe@haaug.org.

With that, let's talk about the three pillars of computer security. These pillars are:

- **Confidentiality** - only folks who are supposed to see data, can see it;
- **Integrity** - you know that data is not changed, unless it is supposed to be; and
- **Availability** - you can get to the data when you need it, where you need it.

Rating your data with respect to each of these pillars will help you determine what you need to do in order to properly protect your data. For example, the question I was asked? Well, if I had rated it properly based on **availability**, I would have taken the action I needed to in order to make sure I didn't forget it (most likely by writing it down somewhere - in effect, backing it up.)

You know what else needs backing up? The contents of the hard drive(s) connected to your Mac, as well as the storage on your iDevice(s)! With iOS 5 and iTunes/iCloud, Apple has done a pretty good job of providing a way to backup your iDevices. With Time Machine, Apple has also taken a significant step toward making backups of OS X safe and easy. But, there is a gotcha: the Time Machine backups are in the same physical location as your Macs - what if you have a fire/flood/tornado hit the building where the machines, and all the backups, are kept? To protect against this, your best bet is to keep at least one backup of your essential data somewhere else - the "off-site storage" option.

While off-site storage used to involve shipping media (tapes and/or disks) to a storage facility, "cloud storage" gives us a new option: simply copy the data into the cloud, and store it on someone's data center somewhere. Storage options like [Dropbox](#) make this simple: create a folder on your local hard drive, and copy/move the files you want to back up into that folder, and they are automatically 'synced' to the cloud. With Dropbox, you have an additional advantage: clients exist for iOS, Android, and Blackberry mobile devices, as well as the Windows and Linux operating systems.

One disadvantage of using a service like Dropbox, however, is that you only have the latest copy of a file available. What if you need the version of a file from last week, or last month? Enter [Arq](#) from [Haystack Software](#), an online backup utility for OS X

QuickTip

I got sick of running my cursor up to the top of the screen to see my battery life, the time, etc., and I realized that there is a simple way to display the menu bar when in full screen mode. Just invoke the Spotlight keyboard shortcut, which by default is Command-Space. Use that key combination once to show the menu bar, then again to hide it.

HAAUG Board of Directors Meeting – Saturday, April 28, 2011

Location: Bellaire Civic Center, 7008 South Rice Avenue, Bellaire, Texas.

Attendees: Philip Booth, Jim Connell, Michael Epstein, Clair Jaschke, David Jaschke, Michael King, Rick Roberts, Doug Smith, Ed Truitt, and Greg Wright.

Call to order: 12:30 p.m. by President Philip Booth following the conclusion of today's General Meeting, a quorum of voting members of the board being present.

General Announcements: Philip Booth announced that Jonathan Magnus' presentation on microcontrollers at today's General Meeting was well attended and well received. He thanked Jonathan for his excellent presentation and for his many contributions to HAAUG.

MONTHLY REPORTS:

Secretary – Jim Connell: The board unanimously approved the minutes of the board meeting held on March 17, 2012, as submitted.

Treasurer – Clair Jaschke: Clair Jaschke submitted written financial reports for March 2012 to the board. At the end of last month, HAAUG had \$13,168.01 in its bank account. Clair has paid all bills she has received. After last month's reports Clair and Phil moved \$5,000 from the checking account to a certificate of deposit at JP Morgan Chase Bank in accordance with the prior approval of the board.

Vice President – Greg Wright: Greg Wright announced that the Main Presentation for next month's General Meeting is still being developed and will be announced shortly. At the General Meeting on June 16, 2012, John Gaver will present "How to Publish an eBook." The Semi-

Annual Swap Meet will be held on July 21, 2012. Phil Booth announced that Chris Breen has agreed to be the speaker for the Main Presentation at the October General Meeting. The board discussed the options for expanding the bandwidth at Bellaire Civic Center so as to allow presentations via iChat at the General Meetings.

Membership – David Jaschke: David Jaschke reported that HAAUG had 180 members at the end of March 2012, a decrease of one member from February 2012 and a loss of 11 members from March 2011. Five new members joined and two members, including one lapsed member, renewed their membership last month. David announced that he has acquired a Square credit card processor that will allow him to process credit card transactions in a convenient and secure manner at the General Meetings. The cost of the device was rebated. The transaction fee is less than three percent. The dues have not yet been updated on Kagi and early renewal transactions on Kagi are not currently being processed.

Media and Communications Administrator – Ed Truitt: The deadline for submitting articles for the May Apple Barrel is the first weekend in May. The board discussed options for fulfilling the duties of the webmaster. Ed reported that the advertisers shown in the Apple Barrel and on the website need to be reviewed and updated. Phil will update the HAAUG Hotline.

somewhat obsessive about my iPad having a proper cover, I also carry my Smart Cover along, and attach it when using the iPad in tablet mode.

Is the Logitech Ultrathin Keyboard Cover usable? Perfectly. In fact, I wrote the first draft of this article on my iPad using it (along with the Evernote app.) Which was a whole lot easier for me than transporting my Macbook Pro along with me to the local B&N. Is it a better accessory than the fold-up keyboard? For me, probably not, because I still prefer the full-size keys. But, given the problems using the older device with the new iPad, along with the reduced weight and bulk of the new rig, the Logitech Ultrathin Keyboard Cover is a good compromise. And so, I will keep both in my accessory arsenal, at least until a new iPad comes along that doesn't work with either one of them.

which also has a client for iOS, allowing you to read your files on your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch.

What does Arq do? Arq provides an interface to schedule and manage your backup, and a front end to Amazon's [S3 cloud storage service](#). You create backup sets, select which folders/files you wish to include in each backup set, and each hour Arq will copy changed files (called "incremental" backups) to the cloud. In order to protect your data from prying eyes, Arq encrypts the data before sending it to the cloud, using an encryption key that you control - the important thing here is that neither Haystack Software nor Amazon have access to the decryption key, so your data is "safe" from prying eyes. It also means that you need to remember that password, because if you ever forget it, you will not be able to decrypt the files. Amazon's S3 storage is high-availability, structured so that even if 2 complete data centers are lost, the data is still available. And, for those who mind their online expenditures, Arq and S3 let you set (and enforce) a budget.

I've been using Arq for the past month (it comes with a free 30-day trial), and tested it out against the folder which contains all my files related to the Apple Barrel. It has worked like a champ, and I have been able to access (and therefore recover) previous versions of the documents I create (hint: testing out the ability to recover your files from a backup is a critical component of making sure your backups are working - because if you can't recover the files, the backups aren't going to do you very much good, are they?)

[Arq](#) is available for OS X (\$29 one-time charge; free 30-day trial; Amazon S3 usage charges extra), and [Arqview](#), the viewer app for iOS, is available in the App Store (\$4.99.)

QuickTip



This hint solves a long standing problem when playing classical music on an iPhone. When using the iPhone Music app (iOS 5.1), the full entry (e.g. name of artist, album or song title) for an item can be too long to be displayed. Tap and hold entry to see the full entry pop up. Tap and drag your finger down the list to make the pop up change as you drag. This works for album titles, song titles, and artists names.

Review: Logitech Ultrathin Keyboard Cover for iPad

As a proponent of the “iPad is a device for doing real work and not just limited to media consumption” philosophy, I am always on the lookout for accessories which help make this a reality. For awhile, I was more than satisfied with my [Logitech Fold-Up Keyboard for iPad 2 \(reviewed in the January 2012 Apple Barrel.\)](#) But, when I got my new iPad, I found one slight problem: the slightly thicker form factor of the new iPad meant that my beloved keyboard/cover fit very tightly (and, for some folks, not at all.)

So, I felt it best to search out a new keyboard, one that would work with this slightly thicker iPad. And, if it ended up making the total package a bit thinner and lighter than the iPad 2 with the fold-up keyboard, so much the better.


Once again, James Kendrick came to the rescue, with [his review](#) of the [Logitech Ultrathin Keyboard Cover](#) for the iPad 2 and new iPad. Alas, it was about a month before I was able to find one of them available for sale, but finally I managed to locate one at the local Best Buy, and I went down and picked it up (as an aside: Best Buy’s website-ordering and in-store pickup is very convenient.)

First things first: unlike the fold-up keyboard, this cover replaces the Smart Cover, which makes the iPad look a bit like a Macbook Air when the cover is closed. It attaches as a cover using the magnetic strip on the side of the case: and it also makes use of this feature to attach securely as a keyboard (unfortunately, this only works in landscape mode, although the iPad will sit in the groove in both landscape and portrait mode.) Unlike the fold-up keyboard, the keys are slightly smaller/closer than on a full-size keyboard: this makes speed typing a bit more problematic, though one can get used to it (at least, I did.) I have found, however, that I do tend to make more mistakes, and that my hands also tire a bit faster, when using this device.


The ultrathin keyboard/cover has one more disadvantage over the fold-up keyboard: it is a cover, not a case. When using the iPad in tablet mode, you really have to detach the Logitech keyboard/cover from the iPad, which means you need somewhere to put it where it won't get in the way (or left behind.) Because I am
